MARITIME MEDICOES

Annual Meeting in Charlottetown—Proceedings this Forenoon.

The Maritime Medical Association began its ninth annual session this morning. The meetings are held in the Provincial Assembly rooms, and are well attended.

The proceedings were formally opened by His Honor Lieutenant Governor McIntyre, who delivered the address of welcome.

The president of the association, Dr. R. Macneil, of Stanley, then delivered his address. The address was an able production and contained much valuable information. It was referred to a special committee.

Dr. Koddick, who was to have addressed the meeting on medical registration, was unavoidably absent. The subject was however, discussed by several members of the association.

An interesting and valuable paper on asthma and its treatment was read by Dr. Chisholm, of Halifax.

The afternoon session will last from 2:30 to 4 o'clock, and will be made up of addresses and papers.

From 4 to 6 o'clock there will be a garden party at Government House.

The evening session will continue from 8 to 11. The programme includes papers by: Dr. Cushing, Boston; Dr. Robert Morris, New York; Dr. James Bell, Montreal; Dr. R. N. E. McKay, Halifax; Dr. McLeod, Charlottetown; Dr. Homans, Boston and others.
