TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Sir Charles Tupper's Election. AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 10. The election court met at 3 p. m., having with consent of counsel, adjourned from 10 a. m. Judge McDonald presided. The adjournment was to enable the respondent Sir Charles Tupper, to be present. The petitioner, Mr. Pipes, and Sir Charles were both present in court. Mr. Condon, for the petitioner, stated that he had on September 27th received notices admitting bribery by agents of the respondent. Mr. Townsend, for the respondent, then made the same admission. Judge McDonald at once gave judgment, and on motion of counsel granted the following order: "I do determine that the respondent, Sir Charles Tupper, was not duly elected or returned at the said election, and that his election and return were and are wholly null and void, and I do order that all costs, charges and expenses of, and incidental to, the presentation of petition herein, and to the proceedings consequent thereon, be defrayed by the respondent." Sir Charles goes to Ottawa to-night.

Sunday Shaving. SIR.—There appears to be quite an agitation in the tonsorial profession over the continuance of certain tonsorialists to open their saloons on Sundays. The person writing in the DAILY EXAMINER of the 3rd inst., over the non de plume of "Hair Dresser," breathes the right spirit of an agitator in the great cause of Sunday law and order, and I, for one, and hope every Christian and right thinking person will help him to succeed in the great undertaking he has espoused. I observed in yesterday evening's Patriot a letter signed "Citizen," and I was glad to see that some individual outside of the profession has taken up the cause, for it has encouraged me to take up my pen and lend a helping hand.

It may seem a trivial matter, and perhaps some people may laugh at it, but when you look into it it is quite a serious thing, for if we do not close the few that are kept open the many will feel privileged to open also. Outwitting the Police. LONDON, Oct. 10. An immense meeting under the auspices of the National League was held on Sunday at the confluence of the Suir and Barrow Rivers in Ireland. The water was covered with the boats and barges bearing the participants. The usual resolutions denouncing the course of the Government in Ireland were adopted. The police were completely outwitted, having no knowledge whatever of the meeting.

An Immense Meeting. DUBLIN, Oct. 10. An immense meeting was held in the round room to-day to protest against the prosecution directed by the Government against the press. Thomas Sexton, M. P., presided. Several English journalists were present. After an address by Wm. O'Brien, resolutions were read declaring that the struggle for the freedom of the press must be continued. The resolutions were carried amid great enthusiasm.

A Vitriol Thrower Sentenced. TORONTO, Oct. 10. Edward Graham, who on Aug. 12 last, threw vitriol in the face of Louis Sivert, was to-day sentenced by the Police Magistrate to imprisonment for life. The courtroom was crowded, and when the sentence was delivered, there was vigorous applause. Graham, who is believed to be insane, never moved a muscle.

Alliance between Italy, Germany and Austria. BERLIN, Oct. 10. The alliance between Italy, Germany and Austria has been renewed for five years. It reserves the right to maintain an absolute neutrality in the event of a Franco-German war.

Fever Spreading. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 10. A telegram from Dr. Wall, president of the Board of Health of Tampa, to-night, says: "Fever spreading. Six new cases, one death to-day." Several patients in a critical condition.

Cholera's Ravages. NEW YORK, Oct. 10. A child, 18 months old, died of cholera, at Swinborn Island, yesterday. This is the seventeenth death on the Island among the Alesia's passengers—a total of twenty deaths in all.

A Missing Warship. LONDON, Oct. 10. A steamer and three warships are searching for the British gunboat Wasp, which, it is feared, was lost in the recent typhoon while on the voyage from Singapore to Shanghai.

The Emperor of Brazil. BADEN-BADEN, Oct. 10. It is stated that the Emperor of Brazil has announced his intention of abdicating the throne, because of his impaired health.

Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, Oct. 11—10 a. m. Fresh or strong winds, mostly south and west; generally cloudy with occasional rains.

A DOCHESTER, N. B., despatch of the 10th is to the effect that Captain Sturdevant, the prisoner's friend, was found dead in his bed on Sunday morning. He had been sleeping at Mrs. Richard Cook's, and was apparently in good health the night before. He lectured in the Methodist Church on Friday evening, and on Saturday afternoon obtained permission to address the convicts at the prison on the following day, but before that time the end had come. His death was caused by heart disease. Capt. Sturdevant was well known in Charlottetown.
