**ANNOUNCE FUND GOAL**  
OTTAWA (CP)—A total of \$16,750,000 is the goal set by 67 community chests across Canada in their 1956 fund-raising campaigns which will start shortly. The Canadian Welfare Council said that last year 65 community chests raised \$15,800,000 for the health and welfare operations of 1,020 agencies. This year an estimated 1,075 agencies will rely on the community chest red feather campaigns for funds.

**Lists Three Drawbacks To Salk Vaccine**  
NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—A Yale scientist Sunday night listed three drawbacks of the Salk polio vaccine. He said intensive laboratory work is being carried on to correct them.

Dr. Joseph L. Melnick, a professor at the Yale school of medicine who helped to develop a test for the vaccine, said it's impossible to be absolutely sure the vaccine is safe until it has been given to children.

He added that tests indicate repeated shots may have to be given over a period of many years to insure protection. "We are not happy," he said, "at the prospect of inoculating children year after year with the Salk vaccine, for it contains monkey kidney protein which might produce allergic states if inoculated repeatedly over the years."

He said studies in Connecticut showed many children vaccinated in 1954 had lost their resistance to polio during the year. They had to be re-inoculated this summer.

Speaking over a Yale radio program, Dr. Melnick cited figures to indicate the vaccine now in use has many advantages. Children who got the vaccine this year averaged only three paralytic polio cases in 100,000, while nine of every 100,000 unvaccinated children were stricken.

their first turn-in on Friday the 23rd at 7:30 o'clock at the Legion hall Grafton Street.

In the course of his excellent address Dr. MacMillan said "It is quite possible to conquer disease and during my 47 years of medical practice several diseases have been conquered in the laboratories of the world. In the early days of my practice I discovered 75 cases of smallpox in one day. You never hear of it now. We have conquered. We have also conquered Diphtheria and have reduced the T. B. deathrate in P. E. I. from what was the highest of any province in Canada to now the lowest."

Our great problem against cancer is increased due to the increased age of our citizens but people are living 27 to 28 years longer than they did at the turn of the century. More people are living in the 70s 80s and 90s and these are the cancer ages — thus when we say the death rate in cancer is not decreasing — this is the reason. However, there is no doubt in my mind that we are saving lives by our educational program in P.E.I.

We must provide money for Cancer courses for doctors, but right now cancer education is saving more lives than research. Early cancer is curable and when people report to the doctor early they are saving lives."

Dr. MacMillan said further, "If the women who have made this country great, they have been the advocates and the workers in public health. Now that they have taken up the fight against cancer we are assured of success. I foresee this will be the most successful City Cancer Campaign to date and your contribution in work and money will save lives."

**50th Anniversary Of Guernsey Breeders Ass'n**  
Fifty years of progress in the Guernsey Breed in Canada was recently observed last night by the Prince Edward Island Guernsey Breeders' Association at a delightful banquet meeting held at Birch Court.

The National Secretary, Miss Shree Hodgins told the breeder and his wives that Prince Edward Island has done a great deal for the promotion and improvement of the breed throughout Canada. He noted that some excellent herds of Guernseys had been started on the Island as far back as 1903, two years before the National organization was begun.

The Secretary stressed the importance of co-operation between the members of the Association, reminding them that a little group that has conflicting ideas. **Moves To Stamp Out Obscene Literature**  
MONTREAL, (CP)—Warrants were issued Monday for the arrest of the editor and distributor of the publication Midnight in the City move against publication and distribution of allegedly obscene literature.

Named in the warrants were John Vader, editor and publisher of Midnight Publication Company, a weekly, and the Canadian News Company, distributors.

A summons was also issued against Hebdo Press, printers of Midnight.

In applying for the warrants, Roland Dansereau, lawyer acting for the Montreal police department, told Judge Rodolphe Carrière "This is part of the campaign launched by police against the publishers for the good of the public."

Meanwhile, police awaited the surrender of Jacques Sauriol, member of the Quebec provincial board of censors and also reporter and editorial writer for the French-language weekly Nouvelles et Potins News and Gossip. He is wanted on a warrant charging defamatory libel.

SEIZED COPIES

In raids on newstands and a printing establishment last Friday police seized copies of Midnight and Nouvelles et Potins. Gaston Houle, 38, editor of Nouvelles et Potins, surrendered to the court Saturday and was released on \$1,500 cash bail. Sauriol, a candidate for the majority in Montreal's last municipal election, was reported at that time ready to surrender today.

Vice-buster Pacifico Planter, assistant police director, said today no city-wide raids on newstands are projected "for the moment." The Morality squad is charged with surveillance of newstands and any seizures would be made "in ordinary course of events."

Mayor Jean Drapeau last week struck out at what he described as the "yellow press" and called for a halt to "the distribution of filth and corruption through such yellow sheets."

**Soviet Union Signs Agreement With Finland**

MOSCOW (AP)—In a burst of diplomatic speed, the Soviet Union signed agreements Monday restoring the Porkkala military and naval base to Finland and extending their friendship treaty for 20 years.

At the same time, negotiators in the Kremlin finished drafting a new treaty with East Germany hailed as granting "real sovereignty"—which is to be signed today.

The Russians promise to withdraw their forces from the Porkkala base within three months of ratification of the agreement and the 20-year extension of the friendship and co-operation treaty will begin as soon as ratifications are exchanged. The original friendship treaty, signed in April, 1948, would have expired in 1958.

Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin signed for the Soviet Union and Premier Urho Kekkonen and Defence Minister Emil Skog for Finland.

SATISFIED AT LAST.  
At a reception afterward, Finnish President Juho Paasikivi recalled in proposing a toast that exactly 11 years ago, Sept. 19, 1944, Finland lost Porkkala in an agreement giving Russia a 50-year lease and said: "I am in Moscow for the seventh time for negotiations on state affairs concerning Finland and the U.S.S.R. but this is the first time I return home satisfied."

With completion of the Finnish-Soviet agreements, the Russians have been calling for American troops to quit their European bases.

American sources at the United Nations pointed out that the Soviet withdrawal from Porkkala would move Russian forces only 30 miles across the Gulf of Finland. American withdrawal from Europe would roll back U.S. forces about 3,000 miles.

The East German Communist party chief and deputy premier, Walter Ulbricht, said a treaty between the Soviet Union and East Germany "granting us real sovereignty" will be signed today at the Kremlin.

FREE TO SET POLICIES  
Premier Bulganin said the new pact would "confirm that the German Democratic Republic (Red East Germany) is free to settle recent years" said Mr. Ryder. "Traffic in the four Atlantic provinces has increased as much as 50 per cent in certain areas."

**Demand For Newsprint Up**  
MONTREAL, (CP)—Newsprint exports, production and domestic consumption showed a steady increase in August, the Newsprint Association of Canada reported Sunday.

Shipments to all markets during August totalled 534,621 tons, a three per cent increase from the 1954 figure of 518,844 tons. Production for August reached a total of 530,539 tons, an increase of 7.2 per cent over last year's August, figure of 503,145 tons. August production was 101.4 per cent of rated capacity, compared with 100.4 per cent last year.

Domestic consumption was 34,924 tons in August.
