Recent Triumphs In Surgery.

Cleansing of the wound itself was almost a surgical heresy a few years ago. Fouled bandages were the rule, and the thicker and more abundant the discharges the more "laudable" they were considered to be. Hence in the older works on surgery the so called "laudable" pus was as much a sign of safety as it is now of danger. Cleanliness of instruments, now a prime consideration, was then entirely ignored. Oftentimes the same instruments would be used at different times upon the dead as well as the living body, and a celebrated operator of that day was accustomed to hold his knife between his teeth when his hands were temporarily employed in the wound. If a cut healed rapidly, it was a rarity sufficiently great to court comment. Now, the exact opposite is the fact. The former result was rather an accident of cleanliness than the deliberate acknowledgment of what should have been the rule. Consequently the most careful surgeons—those who possessed instinctive habits of neatness and cleanliness—were the most successful.—George F. Shrady in Forum.

RECENT INVENTIONS.
