Basically the concern centres around lack of money, since the increasing problems of the cost of school construction and of obtaining more teachers could be solved if sufficient money were available.

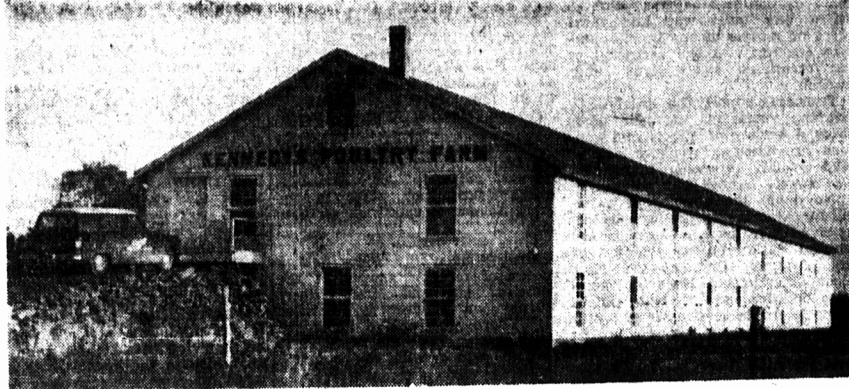
The school situation is not a happy one and will probably become worse before it grows better.

There is plenty of money for automobiles, radios, television, cosmetics, comic books, chewing gum, and cigarettes.

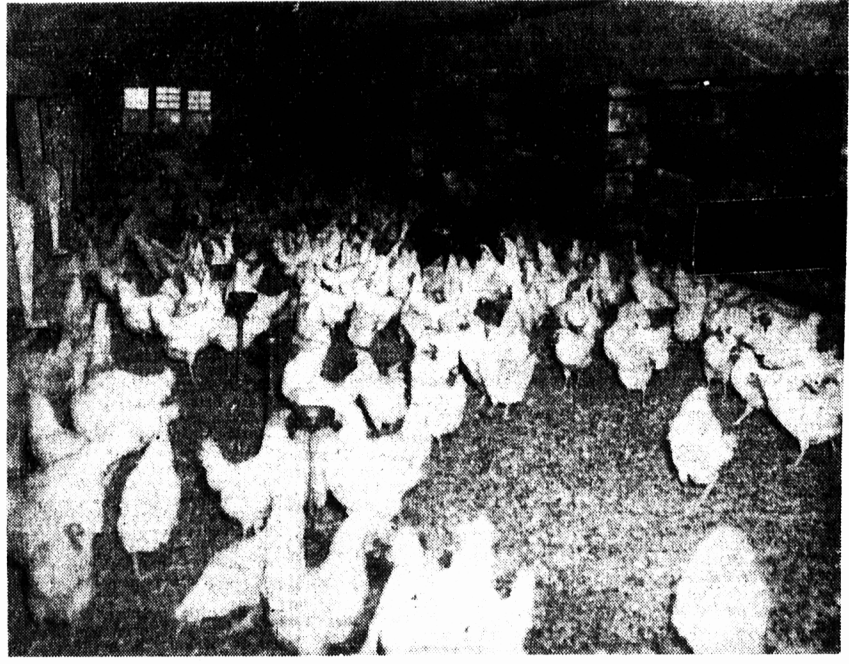
What the present situation actually indicates, if one troubles to read the financial and labour news, is not so much a lack of money as an increasing reluctance to spend money for education in proportion to other activities.

Modern Equipment

The ground and second floors on which the hens are housed, are identical in equipment and utility. On these floors the flock has full range freedom over a deep layer of plane shavings.

More than a dozen large Daylight lights on each floor are automatically controlled to provide the necessary light to make a 13 or 14 hour period of flock activity each day.

Four Times Daily

To avoid deterioration through animal heat after laying, the eggs are gathered four times daily in wire bottomed pails.

The laying hens are under production for approximately a year, after which they are sold to the local packing houses to be processed as fowl or canners.
