[Upbraiding laughter.] She admires him for his bigness, strength, and prosperity, she likes to hear of his punching the heads of other boys. [Laughter.] She anticipates and will be proud of his future success in life, and both likes him and laughs at him for his affectionate, loyal, though somewhat patronizing friendship for herself [great laughter]; but of no nearer connection does she dream, nor does his burly image for a moment disturb her virgin meditations. [Laughter.] In a world apart, secluded from all extraneous influences, nesting at the feet of her majestic Mother Canada, dreamer her dream, and forebodes her destiny—a dream of ever-broadening harvests, multiplying towns and villages, self expanding pastures, of constitutional self government and a confederated Empire; of page after page of honorable history, added as her contribution to the annals of the Mother Country and to the glories of the British race, of a perpetuation for all time upon this continent of that temperate and well-balanced system of Government, which combines in one mighty whole, as the eternal possession of all Englishmen, the brilliant history and traditions of the past with the freest and most untrammelled liberty of action in the future. (Tremulous cheering.) Ladies and gentlemen, I have now done I have to thank you for the patience with which you have listened to me, and once again for the many kindnesses you have done Lady Dufferin and myself during our stay amongst you. Most heartily do I congratulate you upon all that you are doing, and upon the glorious prospect of prosperity which is opening out on every side of you. (Applause.) Though elsewhere in the Dominion stagnation of trade and commerce has checked for a year or two the general advance of Canada, here at least you have escaped the effects of such sinister incidents, for your welfare being based upon the most solid of all foundations, the cultivation of the soil, you are in a position to pursue the even tenor of your way untroubled by those attenuations of fortune which disturb the world of trade and manufacture. You have been blessed with an abundant harvest, and soon I trust will a railway come to carry to those who need it the surplus of your produce, now—my own eyes have witnessed—imprisoned in your storehouses for want of transport. [Cheers.] May the expanding finances of the country soon place the Government in a position to gratify your natural expectations. [Great cheering.] His Excellency concluded by proposing the health of the Mayor and Corporation of Winnipeg and the prosperity of the capital of the Prairie Province.

At the close of the entertainment, their Excellencies held a reception in order to give the citizens an opportunity of saying farewell, of which a great many people in the city and its neighborhood availed themselves. At five o'clock the Vice-regal party embarked on the steamer "Minnesota," and amid the cheers of the assembled multitude took their departure from Winnipeg.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday morning, John Arnold appeared for vagrancy and drunk; was discharged on condition that he leaves the city. Archd. McNeill, farmer, was fined \$3 and costs or fourteen days, on complaint of Clement Benoit, for being drunk and incapable. Henry Coombs was fined \$1.00 for obstructing his sidewalk with carriages. Patrick Lamb, John McQuillan, Peter Percival, John Goodnough and William Power, were each fined \$1.60 and costs for loafing on the street corners. Francis Mullin, Kenneth McDonald, were each fined 75 cents and costs for a like offence.

But just as he was beginning to realize something like remunerative returns for his great outlay in this pursuit he was called away. AFFAIRS IN FRANCE.

GAMBETTA'S MANIFESTO.

M. GAMBETTA has issued a manifesto to the electors of the Twentieth arrondissement of Paris, the text of which is telegraphed to the New York Herald. In it he says:—

"Citizens, after four long months of excesses, administrative pressure and the most deplorable proceedings relative to official candidatures, France at last speaks. She will say in a few days what she thinks of the men of the 16th of May, the allies and protectors of the men of the 2d of December, the servants of Henry V., and the agents of the syllabus and the Pope, who are all sheltered under the patronage of the President, doubtless for the better protection of republican institutions.

THE CABINET'S REACTIONARY POLICY.

"France will say what she thinks of the personal policy of the Chief of the State and the aristocratic and retrograde pretensions of the De Broglie Cabinet; of the unjustifiable dissolution of the Chamber of Deputies; of the miserable war waged by the government against newspaper hawkers, schoolmasters and other defenceless victims; of the projects and plots of this coalition of monarchists who are preparing for her three years of intestine conflicts and divisions, to be followed in 1880 by a terrible crisis, and perhaps revolution."

ENFORGOTTEN INSULTS.

The manifesto, after strongly censuring the unlicensed violence of the reactionary press, says:—

"France will pronounce on the policy inaugurated by the letter dismissing the republican Ministry, on the order of the day to the troops at the Longchamps review, on the Presidential Message of the 19th of September and on that system of government which the chief of the Executive power vindicates as a right above the constitution."

WHAT MUST COME.

"France will declare for the Republic. She will say she intends to make an end of anarchy and dictatorships, withdraw the nation, as well as the individual, definitively from clerical rule and insure that public force shall never be employed except in the service of the law. I confidently declare that France, despite the manoeuvres against the freedom of her vote, will scorn the official candidature and its agents, spurn the royalists, Césaires and clericals—both knaves and partisans of violence.

GAMBETTA'S CONFIDENCE.

"She will condemn dictatorial policy and leave the chief of the Executive power, who is transformed into a plebiscitary candidate, no alternative but to submit or resign. We, ourselves, sure of the support of the country, shall know how to make it will prevail over a powerless and incorrigible minority. The union of all good Frenchmen will keep us discreet and render us invincible for the country and the Republic."

WILL THIS HASTEN A CRISIS?

The conservative papers strongly censure M. Gambetta's manifesto, some of them declaring that the real crisis has now begun. The republican papers warmly praise the manifesto.

TEMPERANCE.—A Temperance Meeting has been announced for the Prince Street Methodist Church this evening, to commence at 8 o'clock. As Temperance is the order of the day, no doubt many will avail themselves of the opportunity of enjoying music, and several addresses on the Temperance theme.

MONTREAL, Oct. 11.

Flour is moderately active and firm. The English wheat market has an upward tendency. Prices are unchanged.

A petition will be forwarded to the Minister of Justice, asking that the charge of murder against Sheehan and McAllister of murdering Hackett, be investigated. The Grand Jury having thrown out the indictment against them.

The election of Hon. Mr. Laurier will be opposed.

John Hearn, of Quebec, has been made a Legislative Councillor.

A fire at Ottawa yesterday, destroyed a block of wooden buildings. Loss, \$13,000.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 10.

All first-class (Serbian) militia brigades except those of Belgrade, Shabat and Valisno, marched to the frontier. The second class follow in ten days. Money and a hundred boxes of shoes have arrived from Russia.

Servia's negotiations with Russia have come to a satisfactory close. The Cabinet Council resolved upon warlike measures for the middle of November.

KARAJAL, Oct. 10.

A Russian official despatch, dated yesterday, says: "In consequence of the occupation of new positions by our troops in the recent operations, the enemy last night abandoned most of his positions, including Kizil Tepe and Began. Retreating, we pursued him, and during the night occupied the line of Chadschivali, Sarbartan and Keelweeklan."

LONDON, Oct. 10.

It is denied that the Porte demanded the recall of the Italian Consul at Rustchuk.

The Russian police have discovered a fresh Nihilist plot. Numerous arrests were made in Moscow and Kiev.

The Russians commenced parallels before Plewna under the superintendence of Todleben.

Heavy masses of troops being sent to Bulgaria certainly indicates their purposes to prosecute active operations during the autumn.

It is reported that the Porte demanded an explanation regarding Servia's purpose in arming and negotiating with Russia and Roumania. The Porte declares it will be obliged to send a special Commissioner to Belgrade to inquire whether its Suzerain rights are not being tampered with.

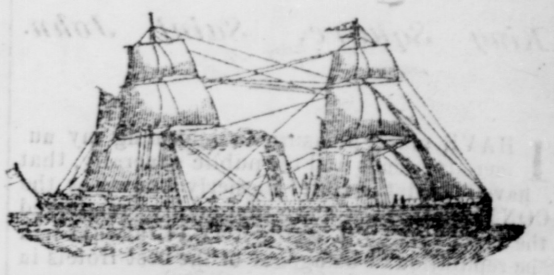
