Preview Of Montague's Drama Festival Entry At Geo'town

The many citizens of Georgetown who attended the premiere performance of George Bernard Shaw's "Pygmalion" performed by the Montague Dramatic Workshop in the Town Hall on Monday night, enjoyed a rare dramatic treat.

"Pygmalion" is one of Mr. Shaw's most entertaining plays, and Elizabeth McGowan as producer and director of this performance has left no stone unturned to prove this to an appreciative audience.

Eliza Doolittle, a young cockney girl, whose racy dialect is the object of Professor Higgins' academic interest, is the subject of a bet between Higgins and his friend, Professor Pickering. Higgins' self-imposed task is to train Eliza in both speech and manners to be a lady undistinguishable from the others in 'polite society.'

The problems that arise during the process are the very pith of humor, and the audience wonders if Mr. Higgins will succeed against such overwhelming odds. The stiff job is, however, carried to success. Eliza, after a due course of training, is passed off on society as a perfect lady; while her freaks of speech, including swearing, seem but part of the prevailing fashion, and occasion no surprise. The metamorphosis is, however, only physical, as Eliza herself realizes after she mingles with the upper crust guests in her triumphal ball-room scene. The great problem of

the play is what is to be done with the transformed Eliza—a problem which is still left open as the curtain falls.

One cannot but admire Mrs. McGowan's representation of characters; they deviate very little, if any, from Mr. Shaw's original concept. The cast thoroughly understood their roles, and none of the subtle satire and humor of the original English play was lost. The high standard of acting was sustained throughout the performance, and combined with excellent direction produced a thoroughly enjoyable entertainment.
