HARDLY BROTHERLY FEELINGS.—The daughter of a wealthy and influential Baptist in the west recently married a Methodist minister and joined the Methodist church. Whereupon a Baptist minister writes to the Western Recorder of Louisville, saying that she ought to be expelled from the Baptist church on the ground of walking disorderly. In joining the Methodist church he says she "has turned her back upon New Testament doctrine and church order, and give her adherence to an unscriptural order, and to the maintenance of doctrines contrary to scriptural teaching."—Exchange.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, the charge of interfering with a peace officer in the discharge of his duty, brought against P. S. Brown by Joseph Hurry, was dismissed, the prosecutor not appearing. "There was nothing whatever in the case," said Mr. Brown to THE EXAMINER today, "and the charge was withdrawn. Some furniture belonging to a tenant of mine was seized and Hurry was put in charge of it. This he did, and when he returned to the house to remove his vigil he found the door locked. That's the whole story."

AN UNFORTUNATE OCCURRENCE.—John P. Murphy, a well known farmer of South Shore, met with a terrible accident at Scott's Mill, Cyclic River, yesterday. It seems that Mr. Murphy was standing in the mill, when a thumb-screw projecting from a wheel in a moving lathe struck his face, caught in his overcoat and lifting him off his feet whirled him around several times, or until the miller, who was standing by, could run to the other end of the building and stop the machinery. While Mr. Murphy was being whirled about his legs came in contact with a box and one was badly fractured and the other one was severely injured. Drs. Conroy and Marchison were on the scene with all possible despatch, and did what they could for Mr. Murphy, who was suffering great pain. This forenoon he was removed to the Charlottetown Hospital, where he is receiving every attention. One of the legs may have to be amputated. Mr. Murphy is about forty years of age and is married.

SUFFOCATED BY GAS.—We regret to hear that Mr. Frank Davison, painter, formerly of Charlottetown, was so overpowered by escaping gas in Boston a week or two ago, that he died from the effects. It seems that Mr. Davison, who was working at his trade in Boston, had gone to board at the residence of Mr. Joseph Godfrey, Haver Street. In the room in which he slept was a patent gas heater, with the working of which it seems he was not familiar. He did not turn off the gas properly before retiring, and during the night was awakened by a feeling of suffocation. Realizing what was the matter, he seized the key of his bedroom door and sought to open the door and get outside in order to obtain some fresh air. In the darkness which prevailed, however, he failed to find the door, and, succumbing to the effects of the gas, he fell unconscious to the floor. In this condition he was found next morning, one hand tightly clasping the key. Everything possible was done to resuscitate him. But the deadly gas had already done its work, and in a short time he "passed to that bourne whence no traveller returns." Mr. Davison was about 32 years of age, and was unmarried. He left Charlottetown for Boston about four years ago.

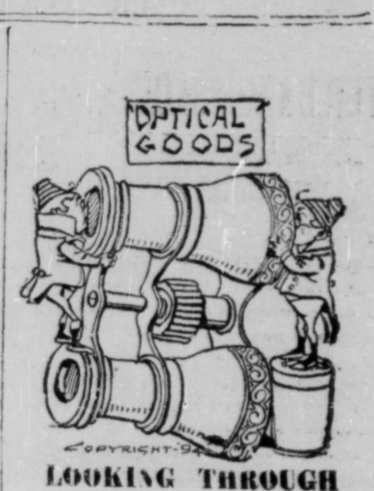
