Clyde River Man Fined \$125 On Impaired Driving Charge

Charged with driving while impaired by alcohol, at his appearance in city police court yesterday, Winston A. Smith, Clyde River, pleaded not guilty and instead entered a plea of guilty to the lesser offence of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, at his appearance in city police court yesterday.

The latter plea being accepted by Magistrate A.J. Haslam, a fine of \$125 and costs of 20 days was imposed. Counsel for the defence was Lester O'Donnell.

For failing to stop at the scene of an accident in which the car he was driving had been involved, John Melvin Ferguson of Charlottetown, was fined \$25 and costs or ten days. The accused was represented by Allison Gillis, who told the court that the damage to the other car had amounted to only \$12.

Two men charged with street fighting, John Bryan Arbie, Summerside RCMP station, and Frank Dow, Charlottetown, were remanded until September 21.

An Alberta man, Howard Francis Shanahan, was fined \$25 and costs or ten days for disorderly conduct. Corp. Keith Wakelin testified in the case.

Economic Growth Signs Outlined To Rotary Club

"Prince Edward Island is not an industrial province by any standards, but sometimes in such areas, the strongest fight for new industries and economic development takes place. This is the case of 1962", Kenneth A. Ross, general manager, the Halifax Board of Trade said in addressing the luncheon meeting of Rotary at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Mr. Ross, who was introduced by chairman William Peters, referring to a recent article in a Maritime publication went on to list in confirming pieces of evidence of the province's growing industrialization, frozen food plants, more fish processing plants, possible glass industry, trial and test most processing, larger tobacco acreage, and diversified use of potatoes.

Figures given by the speaker by the Provincial Secretary's office were used to "refresh your minds on what you now have, so that you will build on this sound economic basis for the future."

ASSURED MARKET
Mr. Ross continued "Today the farmer plants his crop he has an assured market. Potatoes, those not consumed directly go into cans and frozen foods. Surplus berries, small vegetables - peas go to the fast-freezing and canning plants Marketing, excellent highways - P.E.I. has 1,000 miles of paved roads today, bringing farmer and consumer together quickly."
"We are short 2,000,000 pounds of butter and 2,600,000 pounds of cheese annually in these Maritime Provinces. Here's an opportunity unlimited", the speaker stated.

SEES OPTIMISM
"If I am delighted with the optimism and confidence which radiates here", Mr. Ross said and pointed to his seal foundation as reflected in increased electricity consumption", 108,000,000 kilowatt hours in 1962 to 148,000,000 in 1963, and take the crudgery out of farming."

"Today the average family income on P.E.I. is \$3,541 compared with \$2,358 eight years ago."
