SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Sir Thomas Esmonde's Reception.

NEW YORK, May 25. The attendance at the reception to Sir Thomas Esmonde, at the Academy of Music to-night, was very large. The boxes and platform were crowded by political leaders. Every reference to Chamberlain, Salisbury, Balfour and Churchill was loudly hissed, and the names of Parnell and Gladstone were vigorously applauded. Besides Esmonde, Governors Green, of New Jersey, Lounsbury, of Connecticut, Biggs, of Delaware, ex-Postmaster-General James Charles Adams, ex-Judge Davis and Rev. W. T. Lloyd were speakers. All declared that Chamberlain was greatly mistaken in saying that Americans did not favor Irish Home Rule.

News Notes from Ottawa.

OTTAWA, May 25. Sir Charles Tupper's appointment as High Commissioner for Canada will be gazetted to-morrow. Justice Fournier, accompanied by Mr. Burpee of the Privy Council Office, are en route to Halifax to administer the necessary oaths to Gen. Sir John Ross who will be the administrator of the Government until the arrival of Lord Stanley. The latter is expected to arrive at Rimouski about the 15th prox., and will come directly to the capital and take his oath of office here. The militia department has decided that the militia of New Brunswick shall muster at Chatham, on June 26, and those of Nova Scotia at Aldershot on 4th September.

Lord Russell's Successor.

HALIFAX, May 25. General Ross, the successor of Lord Russell, commander of the Imperial forces, at this station, arrived by the Caspian to-day. He has a distinguished military record. He served through the Crimean war, Indian mutiny and Afghanistan war. He took part in the battles of Alma, Inkerman, the siege of Sebastopol, and the capture and capture of Lucknow. He accompanied Gen. Sir Frederick Roberts in his famous march to Candahar, and was second in command when the Afghans were routed and practically annihilated. In personal appearance he is short and stout. Lord Russell leaves to-morrow for home.

A Sensation.

DUBLIN, May 25. Bishop O'Dwyer, of Limerick, has caused a sensation by sending a letter to the Mayor of Limerick, giving warning to Catholics who attend League meetings announced to take place on Sunday that they will be guilty of a grievous sin, in view of the admonitions of the Papal rescript. The bishop regrets that national organization should be risked for the sake of upholding the Plan of Campaign, which is condemned by both Gladstone and Parnell.

The Pope Will Explain.

LONDON, May 24. The Chronicle says the Pope will issue a brief reply to the letter of adhesion from the Irish bishops, and will explain that the Vatican does not disapprove of the Irish National aspirations within legitimate bounds.

Elected.

NEW YORK, May 26. Rev. J. M. Thorburn was to-day elected Missionary Bishop to India and Malaysia by the Methodist Conference.
