

MISCELLANEOUS.

The population of Berlin is 1,081,230.
The Marquis of Bute has bought the fee simple of a house and grounds in close proximity to the Mount of Olives.
The Vatican has threatened to break off relations with France if the decrees are enforced against any more religious bodies.

The German budget for the past fiscal year showed a surplus of 896,000 marks. Crop prospects at present are anything but encouraging.

The Constantinople of to-day, says a correspondent, resembles a city of the Middle Ages, where everyone wore a weapon where-with to defend his life.

Much alarm is caused by the undoubted connection between Fenianism and the land agitation in Ireland. Public tranquility, it is said, is threatened unless the compensation bill is passed.

Mr. Gladstone says, in the event of war between Russia and China, England would enter into friendly negotiations with Russia concerning matters in the East touching British interests.

The following is the formula of the new oath to be taken by the French regiments on recovering their new regiment colors next month:—In the name of the regiments I swear on my honor to remain faithful to the constitution and to defend this flag until death.

A curious mistake was made at a Middlesex division court lately. The defendant in his offset had added in the year of our Lord as 1880, which brings to one's recollection a scene at an Irish bank: Lord Squander—Overdrawn, Mr. O'Hagan, why I cast up the pass book myself and it showed over a thousand pounds in my favor. Mr. O'Hagan—Ah my Lord, it's a trifling mistake you've made, you've cast the year of our Lord into pounds. Troth, its rollin' in riches we'd all be, if we could only discount Anno Domini!

In a speech in the House of Lords a few nights ago, the Bishop of Bath and Wells, said that they had heard lately of half-penny post cards being made the instruments by which libellous matter was disseminated, and it was not impossible that if, as proposed, the restrictions on inscriptions on tombstones were removed they might be used for malice. To show that this objection was not imaginary, he cited a case in which a man's widow, assuming that the doctor who attended him had mistreated him, that the nurse had neglected him, and that his brother had taken advantage of his death to deprive her of her husband's property, obtaining permission of the clergy of the parish to erect a tablet in the parish church, and put up one inscribed:—

Neglected by his doctor,
Ill treated by his nurse;
His brother robbed his widow,
Which made it all the worse.

The clergy was treated with an action for libel, and it was with difficulty the matter was brought to an amicable settlement.

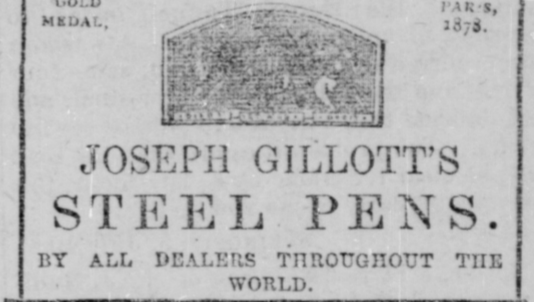
