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POSITION OF MINE OPERATORS STRONGLY CONDEMNED BY BOARD

President Urged to Use His Influence to Have Laws Passed to Prevent Strikes

LABOR BODIES ASKING THE PURCHASE OF COAL LAND

And the Granting of Funds for Relief to the Strikers—John E. Mitchell Meets the Manufacturers Committee and Holds a Session with Closed Doors.

DENOUNCED POSITION OF MINE OWNERS.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 7.—(Special).—The city board on legislation have passed resolutions denouncing the position that the mine operators took before the President.

URGE PRESIDENT TO USE HIS INFLUENCE.

They urged the President to use his influence to have laws passed giving the government such control of the mines and railroads that it will be impossible for such conditions to again arise as at

present. URGES PURCHASE OF COAL LANDS. The labor bodies in Montana are passing resolutions urging the government to purchase the coal mines and that funds be voted for relief to the strikers.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT URGES MINERS

He Asks Them to End Strike in Interests of the General Public of the United States.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—There was only one development of importance in the coal strike situation. Frank P. Sargent, com-

missioner of immigration, and for many years chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen had a long interview with President Roosevelt to-day, and left Washington very soon afterwards. Mr. Sargent indicated that the interview concerned the coal strike, but he would not discuss the matter. From the fact that he always has been influential with labor organizations, it is generally believed that he is entrusted with a message to President Mitchell of the miners' union. It was also said that Mr. Sargent is to meet Mr. Mitchell in Philadelphia and deliver the message of the president, urging that the miners end the strike in the interests of the public. While the many propositions have been under discussion, it is almost certain that the administration is taken up only one plan at a time. The present plan is outlined in the Associated Press despatches Saturday and Sunday, and contemplates an end of the strike by the action of President Mitchell and his associates, and a full investigation of the mining conditions later.

CLOSER TRADE RELATIONS WITH NEWFOUNDLAND AND WEST INDIES

The chief speakers at the banquet were Premier Murray, Attorney General Longley, Judge Wickwire and D. G. Fraser, M. P., of Guysborough.

CLOSER TRADE RELATIONS.

JUDGE OVERRULES POINTS.

St. JOHN, Oct. 6.—(Special).—Judge Landry today over ruled all the points raised by Higgins' counsel Daniel Mullins and then sentenced the youthful criminal to be hanged on December 18th, next.

NO SIGNS OF UNEASINESS.

Higgins showed no signs of uneasiness on hearing the fatal sentence pronounced by the Judge.

STOCK MARKETS WEAK.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—(Special).—The Scotch Coal miners are in receipt of numerous demands from America asking for prompt shipments of coal.

LARGER CAR GOES OF FREIGHT. They are arranging for freight consisting of over forty thousand tons.

HE PROPOSES TO DRIVE VESSELS AT RATE OF 50 KNOTS AN HOUR

A Brooklyn Inventor Promises to Revolutionize Modern Warfare and Give Unheard of Speed to Largest Vessels Afloat.

New York, Oct. 5.—Across the Atlantic in three days or less, a revolution of modern naval warfare, and unheard of speed for the largest vessels afloat is what William Werner declares he has made possible by the invention of a new turbine motor. Fifty knots an hour as the minimum of speed for vessels like the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, is what Mr. Werner believes his invention will accomplish.

Mr. Werner is a civil engineer and an inventor. He has a working model of his new invention that drives a small boat through the water at terrific speed, and seems to beat out all he claims for it. He has not applied for a patent for his device yet because he is under contract with a foreign government not to impart

any information concerning his invention. After having failed to interest American shipbuilders Mr. Werner says he sought assistance abroad to have his invention applied to some large steamship which involved an expedition beyond his means. The fact of his discovery having come to the knowledge of naval officials of a country which Mr. Werner refused to name, a confidential agent of that government was sent to Brooklyn to negotiate for the purchase of his secret. Mr. Werner says that where his device is used, steamship propellers will be reduced one half in size, at the same time gaining enhanced power of propulsion. His invention, he says, has a capacity of 25,000 or 30,000 horse power, and he is certain he can attain a speed of 50 knots an hour.

OPPOSITION LEADER MUCH IMPRESSED

Hon. R. L. Borden Speaks Enthusiastically of the Possibilities of Western Canada

WINNIPEG, Oct. 6.—Mr. R. L. Borden, leader of the Conservative party, spent Sunday in Winnipeg, after speaking at Minnedosa on Saturday night.

"We have had a very interesting trip, so far, but it has been a little too rapid to allow us to secure as full a knowledge of Canada's great West as we would like to have. Many things have impressed us, among them the immense wheat fields of Manitoba and the Territories, the mineral, lumber and agricultural resources of British Columbia, and the scenery of the Rockies, the beauty of which defies description.

"We have obtained an impression of the Western country which we could not have secured but for this visit, and we are going to the East again as the best possible immigration agents for the Western portion of Canada. It seems strange that our young men, in the Maritime Provinces especially, should leave their homes, and go to the United States, when there are open in the West-

ern portion of their own country such magnificent opportunities, not only of obtaining a competence, but a fortune, in a comparatively few years."
