TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] The Franchise Bill OTTAWA, July 4. Last evening the House of Commons went into committee on the Franchise Bill to consider the amendment proposed by Sir John Macdonald. The amendment was concurred in, and Dr. Jenkins moved an amendment giving to Prince Edward Island the suffrage with registration. After Mr. McDonald (King's) and Mr. Lockett (Prince) had spoken strongly in favor of Dr. Jenkins' amendment, Dr. McIntyre moved in amendment to the amendment "that the Provincial qualifications continue to be the qualifications for the Dominion elections in P. E. Island." Sir John Macdonald said the Government proposed to accept Dr. Jenkins' amendment. Dr. McIntyre's amendment to the amendment was then put to the House and lost on a vote of 52 to 95. After several amendments were voted down, Dr. Jenkins' amendment was carried by 114 votes for, and 17 against. After some twenty-four amendments were voted down by a uniform majority of fifty-two, the Franchise Bill passed its third reading.

ANOTHER DESPATCH. OTTAWA, July 4. The House of Commons, last evening, concurred by 114 to 17 votes in Dr. Jenkins' amendment continuing qualification to Island voters entitled to vote under the local law at the passing of the Act. This applies only to the present generation. Thus, all who now have the right to vote will have the right to vote as long as they live.

Dominion Political Notes. OTTAWA, July 4. The Government will to-day consider the Newfoundland fish importation matter. The question of what form of recognition of the services of our troops in the Northwest will be most appropriate, is to be discussed by the Government, to-day. The question of subsidies to the various railways is to be discussed in the House of Commons to-day, and also, all the matters connected with the supplementary estimates for 1885. The indications at present are, that the House of Commons will finish its protracted labors on or about the 16th of the present month.

A Novel Dinner. LONDON, July 4. To-day Cyrus W. Field will give a dinner party, the novelty of which will be telegraphic communication between the dining hall and the White House at Washington. The toast of President Cleveland's health will be delivered by cable to the guests at the dinner.

The New American Consul. HALIFAX, July 4. The new American Consul for Prince Edward Island, Mr. Henry M. Keim, arrived here last evening en route to Charlottetown.

Cholera in Spain. MADRID, July 4. There were thirteen hundred and fifty new cases of cholera and six hundred and sixty deaths in Spain yesterday.

PUBLIC TEA.

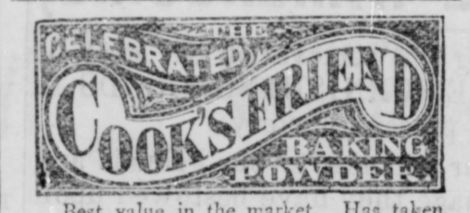
THE Baptist Church at North River intend holding a Public Tea on Monday, 13th July next.
