Last evening marked the opening of "The Haven" restaurant at Montague, under the management of Mr. Cecil Drake and Mrs. Nan Nicholson.

Some 300 customers were served a delicious goose and chicken dinner.

Mr. Drake is well known throughout this district, and in horse racing circles having operated a general store at Cardigan North for several years, and owned several fine race horses including Belle Worthy, who won recognition on Island raceways. Mr. Drake brings to this business a thorough knowledge of wholesale and retail business, having operated such a fruit firm at Halifax for twenty-three years. He was born in Newfoundland, but later settled in Halifax, eventually coming to the Island to enter business fields here. Mrs. Nicholson is also well known in Montague and vicinity, having been a valued member of the nursing staff of the King's County Hospital for many years.

Premier's Right

A below-stairs charge that the Prince Edward Island Premier at times failed to conform to Federal Liberal policy, in no way detracts from his noble services to the party over the years, he continued.

Sinclair's Record Cited

"How about Jimmy Sinclair?" he asked. "Not so many years ago everyone was saying Jimmy had committed political suicide while he posed Mackenzie King's anti-conscription policy on the very floor of the House of Commons. Yet here he is today a Minister of the Crown holding the important Fisheries portfolio."

Only opposition to Premier Jones' nomination to the senate comes from "the Liberals". The Guardian's informant said, "The Premier had thrice led his party to success at the polls at Provincial elections and had won resounding electoral victories when Liberals were taking losses in other Provinces. Effect of these Prince Edward Island victories on the morale of the party in other Provinces could scarcely be over-estimated, he declared.

Today there are 19 vacancies in the Senate of Canada, including the vacancy in Prince Edward Island. And despite pleas of non-Liberals that the Upper House is fast becoming a "one-party" chamber, there seems little likelihood that Prime Minister St. Laurent will deviate from the traditional policy of rewarding outstanding party stalwarts by Senate appointments. It seems certain the vacancies will be filled within the next few months, and probably before Parliament rises for the Easter recess of 1953.

Morell Makes Plans To Go "Over The Top"

The first of next week's series of Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics will be held in Morell on Monday afternoon, November 3rd. This will be the second clinic of this kind to be held in this busy little centre and Rev. F. McKenna is again heading up the preliminary arrangements. Morell's first clinic held in May, 1951, was one of the most outstandingly successful morning clinics ever held and produced more than 100 donors.

Father McKenna, and his energetic Committee, is hopeful of having an even better response at next week's clinic since it is to be held in the afternoon, and at a time of the year when the farmers and fishermen are not quite so occupied as they are in May. Cards have been sent out to prospective donors in Morell and the near-by sections, and posters have been put up in the different stores where the list of those signing up as donors is growing daily as more and more citizens realize that it is their responsibility to provide the blood so badly needed to keep this service functioning efficiently.

to disseminate useful information, and to achieve useful objectives for the country on local, provincial and national levels.

Of the first of these two objectives, Mrs. Turner Bone pointed out two instances in which the council had clarified what has been for many a puzzling situation. With regard to the sale of so-called "salacious" literature, she pointed out that it is only necessary to draw the attention of the Provincial Attorney General to such offences against the Criminal Code, and she also explained to her audience the recent changes in the Criminal Code concerning cases of sex perversion.

Thrift Campaign

As an example of its second aim, she told about the thrift campaign carried out by the Council last year, which resulted in greatly increased personal savings across the country for the year.

Mrs. Turner Bone suggested the formation of a local council here, and went on to explain the organization as carried out on the local level. At least five organizations are required to form a local council, each of which is represented by its president and two other delegates. Such a council is in fact a federation, with each member organization remaining a separate entity, not bound to accept or implement decisions of the council. There are no restrictions as to race, colour or creed, and it is possible for organizations of which the membership is partly male to be represented, and individuals also may join.

The council, has, as well as the usual slate of officers, a number of committees, to deal with such important fields as child welfare, housing, economics and taxation, citizenship, arts and letters, to name only a few of the spheres in which councils can operate for the good of the community.

Three local councils are required to form a provincial council, but each council is linked directly with the national office in Ottawa of the Council of Women, and its operations need not be channelled through a provincial council.

Mrs. Turner Bone was introduced by Miss Wanda Wyatt of Summerside, and thanked for her interesting and inspiring address by Mrs. J. A. Lawson. A delicious tea was served, following Mrs. Turner Bone's address.


