END OF RAIL STRIKE TO AWAIT PASSAGE OF SPECIAL BILL

Three Canadian Destroyers See Action In Korea

OTTAWA, Aug. 29 (CP)—The Government's railway strike settlement bill instructs the railways to get the rail lines operating within 48 hours of the passage of the legislation. Pending a final settlement of the dispute, now in its eighth day, the workers are to receive a provisional wage increase of four cents an hour—the best offer made by the railways in the collapsed negotiations.
