DAILY MARKET QUOTATIONS

SUMMARY By THE CANADIAN PRESS - Toronto - Market mixed to heavy. Trading extremely heavy.

New York - Market higher; advance continued. Montreal - Market remained slightly higher; trading active.

CURRENCY Montreal (CP) - Stocks moved moderately higher on the Montreal and Canadian exchanges Wednesday, but trading among industrialists was pushed to the background by continued heavy activity in mining stocks.

New York Stock Exchange - The U.S. dollar closed at a premium of 7 1/16-16 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, unchanged from Tuesday's close. Pound sterling closed at \$3.01, 96-100, down 1/16.

NEW YORK NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market struggled another step higher Wednesday, acting for all the world like a sleepwalker who isn't sure of his footing or the direction he is heading in.

Trading was about 20 per cent under the daily average for the first eight months of the year. There was no major economic or business news to spur public interest, so Wall Street professionals accounted for most of the activity.

Market opened higher, although not by much. There was little movement in the first 15 minutes when more active buying sent values to their best level in most cases.

Oil, securities and some of the high priced growth issues were the market leaders. Dow Jones Industrial average gained 3 1/2 at 806.34 and Standard and Poor's 500-stock index was ahead 2 1/2 at 58.84.

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TORONTO'S NEW AIRPORT TAKES SHAPE

The spire outline of Toronto's new international airport takes shape work progresses on the \$83 million project. The finers radiating from the central structure are six, 170-foot long "serranys" designed to handle three lanes of planes apiece. The middle section will rise nine stories and accommodate 2,200 cars.

(Continued from page 1) exterior might be almost luxurious inside while others with a fishy outside appearance will be almost poor inside.

It is for this reason that householders receive a letter in advance of the examination explaining them with the needs of the assessing crews and asking co-operation in allowing them to examine houses. This examination must be thorough, from top to bottom, to enable the crews to note types of furnace equipment, plumbing and such items.

When all this work is finished every property owner will receive a letter explaining the results of the examination.

At present Jack Leiber, secretary, treasurer of J.P. Colman and Associates, the Toronto firm doing the assessing, is preparing a guide for the city in the form of a manual to be used in the actual tax valuation. It is being based on local conditions and costs of materials.

As well as a board of assessors will be set up of two city employees and two members of the public. This is being done to give the assessors the feeling that they are setting values when they are not familiar with local conditions.

EFFECTIVE IN '64 It is expected the new assessment for tax purposes will come into effect in 1964.
