**NORTHWEST ASSEMBLY.**  
 Reorganization of the Government  
 At the opening of the Northwest Assembly a day or two ago Lieutenant Mackintosh congratulated the members upon the many evidences of prosperity to be seen all over the Territories as a result of a bountiful harvest, and the sound condition and good prospects of all important industries. The wonderful discoveries of mineral wealth in hitherto unexplored parts of the Territories, and the almost absolute certainty of establishing a ready means of access to the new gold fields from the settled portions of the country, promise, he said, most beneficial results in the way of opening up new markets for staple products, while the building of the Crow's Nest Railway will enable stock raisers and agriculturists to avail themselves of the constant and increasing demand for food supplies of all kinds from the rich mining regions of the neighboring province of British Columbia. Continuing His Honor said: "Since the last meeting of the Legislature, important changes in the constitution of the Territories have been made by the act passed at the last session of the federal Parliament. In accordance with the provisions of that act, I have chosen an executive council, and can now congratulate the Territories upon having obtained a completely responsible system of government. In consequence of this change, a re-organization of the offices of the Government and the creation of public departments for the carrying on of the public service will be found necessary, and measures having those ends in view will be submitted for your consideration."

**MISS N.**—The Paullist Fathers, of New York, opened a mission in St. Paul's church, Summerside, yesterday. The mission will be continued throughout the week. The missions by the Paullist Fathers in other sections of the Province have been most successful.

**THEY CANNOT COME.**—The Halifax Herald says: The Wanderers have written the Abegweits of Charlottetown that it will be impossible to send a team from here this year. The Halifax men will be quite willing to play the P. E. I. footballists if they should decide to come this way.

**SUDDEN DEATH.**—We regret to learn that Mrs. Patrick Kehoe dropped dead at Albany yesterday. About eleven o'clock in the forenoon she sat down to write a letter and expired almost immediately. Mrs. Kehoe was about seventy-seven years of age, and so far as we can learn, had not been complaining of illness. The doctors say death was due to heart failure.

**RECENT FIRES.**—On Sunday, while the family of Larcise Perry, at Nail Pond, were at Mass at Tignish, the children started a fire in an on-building which was burned, together with a barn and all the years crops and the farming implements. The house barely escaped.—On Sunday night the lobster factory property of Woodman Bros., Alberton, situated at Kildare, was destroyed by fire. Cause unknown.

**POLICE COURT.**—This forenoon John Joy was fined \$25 and costs or two months imprisonment for selling intoxicants in a place not fitted up according to the Liquor Regulation Act. In imposing this penalty His Honor intimated that if parties persisted in violating the law in this respect the fine would be increased. The summons against Maggie Reid, charging an infraction of the Liquor Regulation Act, was dismissed. Alex McRae, for allowing a vicious dog to go un-muzzled and bite a boy, was fined \$2 or 10 days and was ordered to destroy the dog forthwith.

**A RIVAL FOR THE KLONDYKE.**—A few days ago Mr. Charles Law passed through Winnipeg on his way east, having in his possession a three pound nugget from the Cassiar range, east of Teslin Lake. This country, lately prospected by Mr. Law, is rich in placer and quartz, and is likely to outshine Klondyke. The region is much easier of access, being situated on the head waters draining out of the Yukon. Mr. Law believes he has discovered mountain quartz, from which all the gold on the Yukon and other streams originally came. He has a specimen from a solid ridge of quartz forty miles long, which contains more gold than quartz. The place is north of Cariboo, the Klondyke of fifteen years ago, and in the same range of mountains.

**A PLEASANT SURPRISE.**—Yesterday afternoon Captain Ranaghan took several of the younger members of the Fire Department and some veterans out for a cross-country run. The party started out St. Peter's Road to York Station, where they arrived in an incredibly short time after the start. Having rested and partaken of the genial hospitality of main host McQuaid of the Bird Emporium at York, they left on return to the city which they reached about six o'clock. During the run the young members showed some remarkable feats of speed illustrating the promptness which they display in responding to the call of duty. The veterans of the party also showed that spirit of dogged determination to get there which they have evinced on many a cold winter's night, while fighting the fire fiend in this city during the '70's and early '80's. The conduct of Capt. Ranaghan is highly commendable showing that he is fully alive to the health and efficiency of the brigade of which he is a popular and efficient officer.—Com.
