The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last evening at the office of the Canadian National Sugar Cane Growers Association with the president, Mr. John Mungall, in the chair. The meeting was held at the association through the courtesy of Mr. George Calbeck, manager and chief inspector of the association and continues the plan of adopted by the board of holding the monthly meetings on the premises of the various business firms as a means of having the members become better acquainted with the businesses of their fellow members.

Mr. Ross MacKenzie advised the board that the annual meeting and banquet would be held this year in the Anglican Church hall on Tuesday, January 24th and following the practice adopted last year the menu will be composed of Island grown food. A display of the products of various business houses and manufacturers will be a highlight of this year's meeting.

The president, Mr. Mungall, advised that the guest speaker this year will be Mr. Nelson Mann, general manager of Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, Moncton, N. B.

Mr. Fred Bingham referred to the very valuable assistance rendered the shippers of Summerside by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., in arranging for the CGS Brant the harbor open so that a number of ships were able to dock at the Marine Wharf and unload their cargoes of fertilizer and to take away many thousands of bushels of potatoes before the winter

A conducted tour through the premises was held during which Mr. Calbeck showed a large number of pelts held in storage in the vaults of the association. He explained the methods of pelting the various animals and how the skins were kept in top condition in storage.

Prince County Fish And Game Association Meeting

The regular meeting of the Prince County Fish and Game Association was held in Summerside, Kensington, Miscouche and Carleton Place.

A lengthy discussion took place on possible stocking of pheasant in Prince County, and a recommendation is to be forwarded to the Provincial Association dealing with this proposed project.

A report was given by Fred Semple and Glydon Willis on the quail that were raised during the year at the Kensington game farm. This report revealed that from five adult female birds, 62 young quail were saved, and it is hoped that they will eventually reach a stage where they will have good numbers of these birds to release each year.

Discussion took place on non-resident sportsmen should not be discriminated against in regard to open shooting dates. The branch went on record as favouring a year-round bounty on wild foxes as a measure to control this predator of game birds.

SUPERVISES REPAIRS AT S'SIDE ELECTRIC PLANT

Supervising repairs being made to a 1,600 horsepower engine at the Summerside electric light plant, Mr. George Morrison, plant supervisor, is seen standing beside one of the seven engines whose combined power last year generated more than 7 million kilowatt hours of electrical energy equivalent to

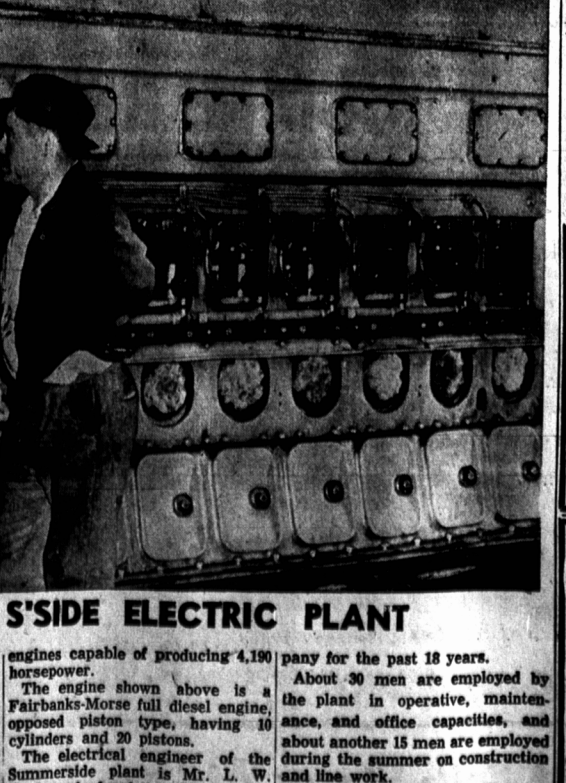
more than 5 1/2 million horsepower, resulting in a net revenue of almost \$75,000 for the town.

Mr. Morrison has been with the Summerside Electric Light Department for the past 26 years, in which the plant has expanded from three engines capable of producing 550 horsepower to the present seven

engines capable of producing 4,190 horsepower. The engine shown above is a Fairbanks-Morse full diesel engine, opposed piston type, having 10 cylinders and 20 pistons.

The electrical engineer of the Summerside plant is Mr. L. W. Hacker who has been with the com-

pany for the past 18 years. About 30 men are employed by the plant in operative, maintenance, and office capacities, and about another 15 men are employed during the summer on construction and line work. (Photo by Wotton).
