FOOTBALL MATCH YESTERDAY.

The Abegweit-Dalhousie Game a Draw.

Although yesterday was not an ideal day, quite a number of people were present at the C A A ground to witness the match game of football between the Dalhousie College team, the crack team of Nova Scotia, and the Abegweits of this city, which ended in a draw.

Although the game was void of points it was one of the fastest and most interesting that has been seen here for a long time. The teams, as the score will indicate, are very evenly matched and from the "kick off" until the referee's whistle sounded for the finish the ball was kept wandering up and down the field there being no apparent advantage on either side. In the "scrim" they fought hard for superiority but both seemed equally strong, while the passing among the halves of each team was a leading feature of the game.

As is known the Dalhousie team has an unbroken record of victories this season, and the Abegweits' success, with them yesterday places them among the best teams in the Maritime Provinces.

The grounds were in good condition until shortly before the finish when the rain commenced to fall which made it very disagreeable to the players.

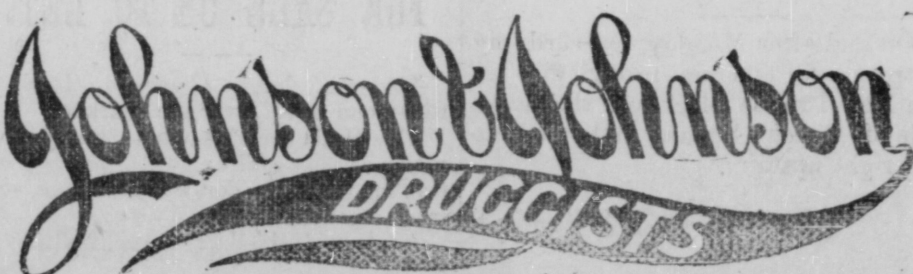

NEW BRITISH CRUISER.—It is announced from London that the drawings of the new first-class armored cruiser which the Admiralty some time ago decided to lay down at Pembroke Dockyard have been received at Pembroke, and a staff of draughtsmen are now engaged, preparing working plans, so that the construction may be commenced as soon as possible. The new vessel will be 500 feet long over all, and her displacement will be 14,100 tons. She will be protected for a considerable portion of her length by a belt of Harveyized steel, from 4 inches to 6 inches in thickness, and the fore part will be plated with armor 2 inches thick. When complete she will be the most powerful cruiser in the world.

ORGAN COMING.—The new organ for St. James' Church is expected to arrive this evening by steamer from Picton.

THE ULUNDA.—The Ulunda will leave Halifax for Liverpool, on the 9th November, calling at St John's, Nfld.

OFFICE ABOLISHED.—It is announced from Ottawa that the office of chief post office inspector, now held by M. Sweetnam, is to be abolished.

FOOTBALL.—The Dalhousie football team crossed to Picton in the Prince's to-day. They play a match this afternoon at New Glasgow and another at Truro tomorrow.

THE TIBER.—The steamer Tiber, of the Dobell Line, arrived this morning, and will leave about midnight for Halifax and St. John. She takes a good general cargo from this port.

LOADING AT SUMMERSIDE.—The barkentine Daisy and Rita, the former owned by Hon. John Yeo and the latter by Capt. Richards, of Bidford, have arrived at Summerside to load oats for Great Britain.

COUNTY COURT.—Judge Alley to-day gave judgment in the case of Mark Wright & Co vs Edward E Crosby. This was an action for breach of warranty in the title of a bicycle, and judgement was given for the defendant who, under all the circumstances, was held not to be liable.

A CORRECTION.—In the reports of the lobster meeting held at Summerside recently the date in the resolution regarding the season was given as from May 20th to August 5th. It should have been from May 25th to August 10th, an amendment having been carried to that effect at the meeting.

LAKE WINNIPEG.—The Beaver Line steamship Lake Winnipeg, after discharging a large cargo, left this afternoon for Montreal. She is expected back again about the 4th or 5th of November, when she will take in cargo for Liverpool. During her stay at Charlottetown the Lake Winnipeg was loaded with bunker coal by Peake Bros. & Co.

POULTRY STATIONS.—It is said that the Canadian Department of Agriculture is arranging to open a number of poultry-fattening stations, at present to be limited to Ontario and Quebec. A change is said to have come over the taste of food consumers in Great Britain in the direction of more poultry. Prof. Robertson found that a large part of three counties had in recent years become a poultry farm.

TURF NOTES.—A match race is to take place at Lunenburg, N.S., on Thursday between Peter Clinch, 2.24 1/2, and Ajalon, jr, for a purse of \$200. Peter Clinch gave a good account of himself at the recent meeting on the Charlottetown Driving Park.

The well-known horse, Warren Guy, which made such a record in the States the past season, was brought to Portland, Me, on the steamer St Croix from Boston a few days ago. Guy was kicked by another horse at Boston, and was seriously injured.
