## Dr. Wen Retains Senior Title; Acorn Ends Second

Dr. Wendell MacDonald has won the Seagram's Provincial Seniors Championships for the second year in a row. Saturday afternoon he defeated E. F. "Duck" Acorn 10-3 in the final game. Dr. MacDonald and his rink of Johnny Squarbrick, Jim Cameron and Wally Rodd will now represent Prince Edward Island in the Dominion Seniors, which is also sponsored by the "House of Seagram's", in Winnipeg from March 28 to April 1.

At the annual Provincial Seniors banquet, where the presentation of the trophy and prizes was made, it was expressed by many of the called upon speakers that they felt that this rink could win the Dominion Seniors. If they could it would mean the first National title for Prince Edward Island. When presented with "the Seagram's Stone" Dr. MacDonald said: "That the curling is very good at the Seniors, but we will do our best to win all we can." At last year's Dominion Seniors Dr. Wen finished with a 6-4 record, but two of the losses were very close and this year he has added strength of Johnnie Squarbrick on the team, who last year did not make the age limit.

**WEN'S TEAM SHARP**  
In the final game Dr. W. MacDonald's rink really began curling like people had expected them to throughout the bonspiel.

Over 200 people were on hand for the 3 o'clock game, but the game was out of Acorn's reach from the 9th end on.

"Duck" picked up one in the first end, counting a well guarded rock, but he had last rock that end and missed his free draw for number two. In the 2nd end with last rock in his favour Dr. Wen picked up a big two. When Acorn came up to throw his last rock in the 3rd end two stones were counting against him, his attempted draw only cut one of these out and now the score was 3-1 for Dr. MacDonald.

The Belvedere skip missed a chance for a game tying two in the 4th end when he hit and rolled out leaving himself with only one point. The 5th end seemed to be the turning point in the game. Acorn was counting one with only two rocks to come and instead of guarding as he had been in most of his other games he elected to play a double take out to tie; but he hit only one and rolled out himself leaving Dr. Wen number two. Dr. MacDonald hit the number one rock flush on and counted two giving him a commanding 5-2 lead with the game half over.

After that it was just a matter of Dr. Wen controlling the game and Acorn trying to get something going, which he never really did due to spotty curling by his team members and only half shots by himself. Down 6-3 going into the 9th end Acorn tried to shift to a draw game, but the Charlottetown rink came up with some fine chip shots and were lying 5 when "Duck" came up to throw his last rock. His draw attempt slipped through the house and gave Dr. Wen a 10-3 lead at which point Acorn's team conceded the game.

The Seagram's reception for all active and ex-senior curlers was held at 8:00 with Earle Annett representing the sponsoring firm. Lt. Governor W.A. MacDonald was in attendance, the Governor having been a former curler himself. The reception and banquet gave many old friends a chance to renew and relive old times. Dr. E.S. Giddings was chairman of the reception and banquet and the ladies of the Charlottetown Curling Club catered to the affair.

For the second morning in a row "Duck" Acorn met and beat Ed Tanton's team giving Tanton's rink the two losses which put him out of the competition and kept him out of the final game. Tanton was last year's runner-up. The morning game was to decide who would enter the finals against Dr. MacDonald. As usual a large crowd of 45'ers were on hand to see their leader play, but even their support could not change the trend of the game. After Tanton picked up one in the 1st end Acorn went on to win the next five ends in a row and built up a 9-1 lead in a game that ended after 5 ends by a 12-1 score.

Members of E.F. Acorn's runner-up rink were Edger Taylor, Norman Nicholson and Harry Bartlett curling out of the Belvedere Winter Club.
