Mr. Calder, who is a striking figure with his fine patrician features and grey beard, was born April 19, 1842, at Johnstone, Renfrewshire, Scotland. He came to Canada in a sailing vessel, starting the journey when only a month old. He was five months old when he landed. After living his early life in Eastern Canada, he came to Winnipeg in 1879.
