TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Burchall Murder Case.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., Sept. 24. Interest in the Burchall trial deepens as the case proceeds. The prisoner's nerve is the wonder of all. The crown witnesses to-day were several medical men who testified as to the condition of Benwell's body when found, also George Burnett, manager of the G. N. W. Tel. Co. at Buffalo, who deposed that Burchall went to Buffalo after the murder and sent a telegram to himself signed "Stafford House," and that the telegram was a blind by which it was intended to send Pelly to New York on a wild goose chase after Benwell. The theory of the defence seems now quite apparent. It is that Benwell was killed in a row, and for the purpose of concealment, his body was carried to the spot where it was found.

The International Exhibition. ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 24.

Canada's International Exhibition was opened to-day under most favorable auspices. The Lieut. Governor, Sir Leonard Tilley, was received by a guard of honor and, accompanied by a brilliant military staff, proceeded to the building and delivered an address, declaring the Exhibition open. The party then proceeded to Moosepath, where the horse and cattle show was opened by the Governor. The exhibits are nearly all in position, but many have been arriving all day and are yet to arrive. The Trinidad, West India, Jamaica, British Columbia and Manitoba exhibits are in position and attract great attention. The city is full of visitors.

The Tariff Bill. TORONTO, Sept. 24.

In a letter to Erastus Wiman, Senator Sherman says the McKinley Bill is not especially aimed at Canada, but is general in its application to all countries. He believes that with a little forbearance and moderation on both sides of the line, the feeling will become universal in the United States that special arrangements for reciprocity and trade should be entered into between the two countries. Whatever feeling there is in the United States for annexation, he said, grew purely out of the belief that annexation would be better for the people of both countries.

A Sham Battle. HALIFAX, Sept. 24.

The sham battle to-day between the attacking fleet and the defending army was in all respects a sham. The engagement lasted about twenty minutes and was little else than a salute fired by the ships as they sailed up the harbor and replied by the forts.

Asking for Disallowance. OTTAWA, Sept. 24.

The Government have received petitions from Manitoba signed by four thousand persons asking that the act passed by the Provincial Legislature abolishing the dual language and separate schools should be disallowed.

Goods Awaiting Shipment. LIVERPOOL, Sept. 24.

The warehouses of all the Atlantic lines are crammed with goods, which merchants are anxious to export before October. Freight rates have advanced from 40 to 70 shillings a ton.

The Races at Moosepath. ST. JOHN, Sept. 25.

The races at Moosepath yesterday afternoon were witnessed by about 700 persons, and were very exciting. In the three minute class, Lorin, owned by C. E. Walker, took first place; Nellie Bashaw, owned by H. C. Lydiard, Kentville, second; Minnie Gray, owned by D. Dwyer, Ch'town, third; and Golden, owned by A. N. Large, Ch'town, fourth. In the 2.37 class, Whistler, owned by Geo. Essory, Ch'town, took first; Lady Sim, owned by Johnstone & Moore, St. John, second; Blackbird, owned by E. Cameron, Ch'town, third.

The Methodist Conference. MONTREAL, Sept. 24.

A large number of reports were submitted to-day, and considerable work was done. The afternoon and evening were devoted to consideration of the superannuation fund of the West. The debate was laymen vs. ministers, and evoked considerable feeling. The whole matter was referred to a committee to report to the next General Conference. There was nothing of special interest to the eastern Methodists. The weather is unusually cold.
