Art Display By Japanese Children

More than a thousand children in addition to a large number of interested adults viewed the 66 exhibits of Japanese art now being shown at the art centre in the market building. The showing will continue daily until 5 p.m. on Saturday.

Miss P. E. Johnston, Director of the Art Centre and Supervisor of Art Instruction in the city schools enthusiastically referred to the collection as the best she has ever seen from the hands of children of any country.

The display, which is having its initial showing in Canada at Charlottetown, was arranged for by the National Gallery of Canada under the direction of Mr. H. O. McCurry as part of an exchange exhibition following the participation of Canada in Commonwealth Children's Art Exhibition in 11 Japanese cities last year.

Potato Case In County Court

The case of Philip Smith versus Russell Driscoll, an action for payment of monies alleged to be due on the sale of potatoes, opened before Judge C. St. Clair Trainor in Queen's County Court yesterday and was adjourned to a date to be fixed.

Mr. A. J. McDonald appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. M. Alban Farmer for the defendant who filed a counter claim for \$89 alleging overpayment. The original action is in the amount of \$130.00.

In opening the case Mr. McDonald admitted that the outset that his client did not have a license as a producer from the Potato Marketing Board. Judge Trainor then noted that it became necessary to decide on the basis of facts to be adduced through evidence. He mentioned the case of Rayner versus MacNaught heard before Supreme Court Justice M. R. McGulgan last November and said since no appeal had been taken from the decision handed down it would necessarily stand as a guide.

Mr. McDonald suggested an adjournment to permit counsel greater opportunity to study the matter as he had expected to argue on the facts only. He said he had thought that the matter of non-possession of a license would be introduced by the defendant in any event. Mr. Farmer stated he felt there was a good defence just on the merits of the case and was ready to proceed. However, when Judge Trainor suggested the attorneys agree on the matter he consented to the adjournment.

Also mentioned during the proceedings was the new famous Willis case in which the decision of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island was appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada.

The Rayner versus MacNaught case involved the non delivery of a quantity of potatoes previously arranged for as an agreed price. In part the defence was based on the fact that plaintiff did not have a license from the Board at the time of agreed delivery. Plaintiff had had a license but it had been cancelled by the Board for failure to obey a Board order. The Court found that contracts made by plaintiff prior to the legal expiry date of the license
