Double Claims After Holiday Seeking Workers For Souris

More than \$5,200.00 was paid out to residents of Charlottetown Tuesday at the National Employment Office. It was one of the busiest days in the past two months. Normally the daily total is only about half that amount but because the office was closed on Easter Monday the people who ordinarily would have been paid on that day were paid yesterday. In addition the claimants who report every Tuesday also received their weekly benefits. In a sense it was a double pay day and all told slightly over three hundred claimants called at the cashier's wicket.

The Employment Branch also had a steady procession of visitors, from town and country, asking about job opportunities. Very few jobs are available at the present time and most of the applicants were told that only an occasional employer is placing orders for men at the present time probably because of continued wintery conditions.

A few vacancies for labourers developed during the day and these were quickly filled. Quite a number of the job seekers inquired about the prospects for work in Labrador and in Gagetown, N.B. The local office does not expect to receive any orders for men from Labrador until late May at least, and possibly later. The possibility of large numbers of men being needed at the military camp in Gagetown N.B. is equally indefinite.

It is understood that some men employed by the City of Charlottetown will be laid off, at least temporarily, and the claims Branch of the local office expects that these will be applying for Insurance benefits in the next few days.

FISH PLANT

From Souris comes the information, that the large new fish plant in that town, which will be known as the Griffith Fisheries, will be ready for full operation on April 15. With the Eastern Packers of Souris also ready to open for business on the same date, the eastern town may have difficulty in supplying all the labour needed to keep the two plants going.

It is altogether likely that some fillers will be brought in from mainland points, since not enough skilled men are available in this province. A number of fillers have been recruited from Nova Scotia for the past few years and with two fish plants in operation still more will be required.

The town of Souris in fact has not been able to supply enough ordinary labor during the fishing season, for several years. The deficit has been made up, by the

Says Stories Re Ike's Golfing Are Inaccurate

WASHINGTON (AP)—James C. Hagerly, White House press secretary, Tuesday termed "completely inaccurate" a published report that President Eisenhower spent more time golfing at White Sulphur Springs last week than he did conferring with Canadian and Mexican leaders.

Columnist Drew Pearson wrote Tuesday that spokesmen for Prime Minister St. Laurent of Canada and President Ruiz Cortines of Mexico "both graciously stated that they were busy with other matters during Ike's golfing. Columnist Pearson added that "The fact is that he (Eisenhower) spent more time on the golf course than he did conferring with them."

Asked about the report, Hagerly said at a press conference: "As usual, it's completely inaccurate."

ELEVATORS DEPLETED

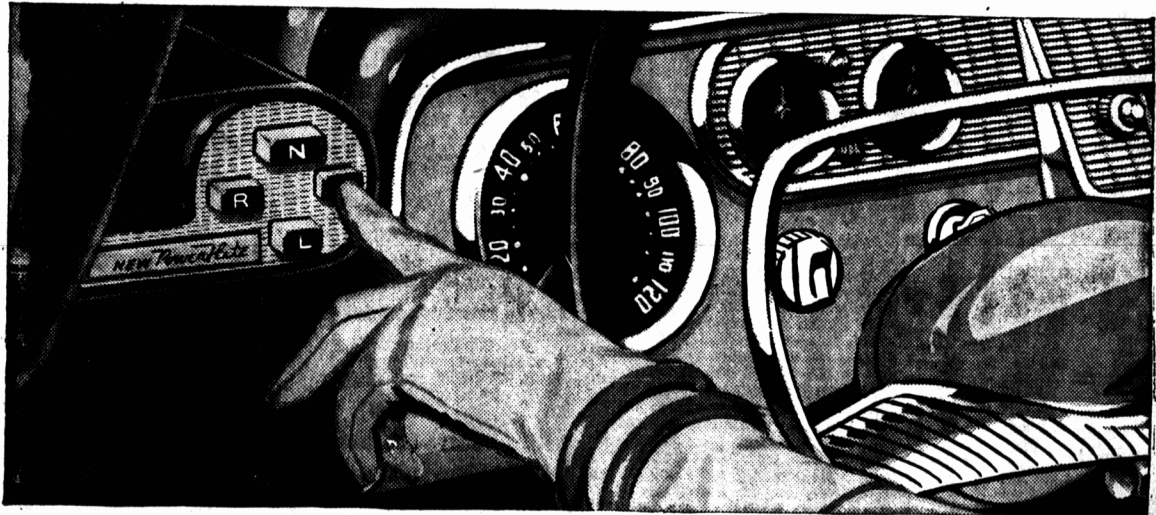
MONTREAL (CP)—A Montreal shipping official said Wednesday most of the grain that filled Montreal harbor elevators last fall has been consumed locally. The official said that the port's four elevators—with a storage capacity of 15,162,000 bushels—now contain only 5,000,000 bushels of grain, intended for export. He said the remaining grain is expected to be shipped out as soon as the shipping season gets fully under way.
