## Political Meetings in England.

The man who asks questions and insists on their being answered is a familiar presence at all party meetings. One of England's many debts to Scotland is the loan of the expressive word used to describe him. He is known as the heckler. The speaker is not allowed to disregard him. If a statement is disputed, it is the orator's place to make it good. Any member of the audience may rise to his feet and shout out a contradiction whenever he feels like it, and by the custom of English public life the speaker is expected to make some reply on the spot. He is not, of course, bound to, but, unless he has forgotten all the impromptus that shrewd men carry about with them for such emergencies, he usually does. Mr. Chamberlain was always a dangerous man to cross in debate, but the personal feeling against him was so bitter for years after his withdrawal from the ranks of the separatists that many an unhappy man was driven to tilt against his shield. It was delicious to watch Mr Chamberlain's handling of the situation. He would pause when the interruption grew serious, and give the heckler a chance to make himself well heard. "Now if you will allow me, I will ask that gentleman to get upon a chair, that we may all have the pleasure of seeing him." A dozen anxious hands would hoist the object into un- welcome prominence. "Now, sir," came the clear, passionate voice, "will you kindly speak up? I should be sorry if any one missed what you have to say." The heckler, now quite unnerved, would stammer out something, and Mr Chamberlain, listening with a malicious smile, would quietly readjust his eyeglasses, and turning to the audience, fling out a reply—cool, cutting, and decisive.—Sydney Brooks, in Harper's Magazine for August.

Cattle to compete in this class must be fed and owned by exhibitors in the Maritime Provinces for one year before the date of Exhibition.

DEATH BY LIGHTNING.—Wm. Lessor, a farmer of Sidney, Me., aged 31 years, was struck by lightning last week, while work- ing in a grainfield during a shower, and killed.

PIGS AT THE EXHIBITION.—\$19 are offered to sow and litter of each breed of swine at the St. John Exhibition. Ten dollars is the first prize. The litter must contain at least 5 pig.

SHEEP AT THE EXHIBITION.—In the sheep classes of the St. John exhibition prize list a pen prize has, this year, been added. For the best pen of ram and four ewes of each breed a first prize of \$8 and second prize of \$6 will be given.

A GOOD PRIZE.—\$45 00 is offered in the milk cow competition at the St. John Exhibition. The cows may be either pure bred, grade or mixed, and the award will be given to the cow giving the most milk and milk solids in twenty-four hours. The test will be in charge of an expert with sufficient assistants.

EXCURSION PARTY COMING.—A Ray- mond excursion party, numbering about fifty, are to arrive in Charlottetown by the Princess tonight and will remain in Charlottetown until Wednesday, when they leave the province by way of Summerside. The party will be in charge of Mr. Carl Hutchings, of Boston. They will make their headquarters at the Hotel Davie.


LEAGUE OF THE CROSS.—The League of the Cross picnic is taking place today at Emerald Junction. The day is a delight- ful one for such an outing, and the attend- ance is exceedingly large. Thirteen well- filled cars left Charlottetown at nine this morning, the League boys occupying the first five. Before going to the train the members of the League, headed by their band, paraded the principal streets, mak- ing a splendid appearance.
