After a honeymoon trip to their former home on P.E.I. the young couple returned to Toronto where they are now residing.

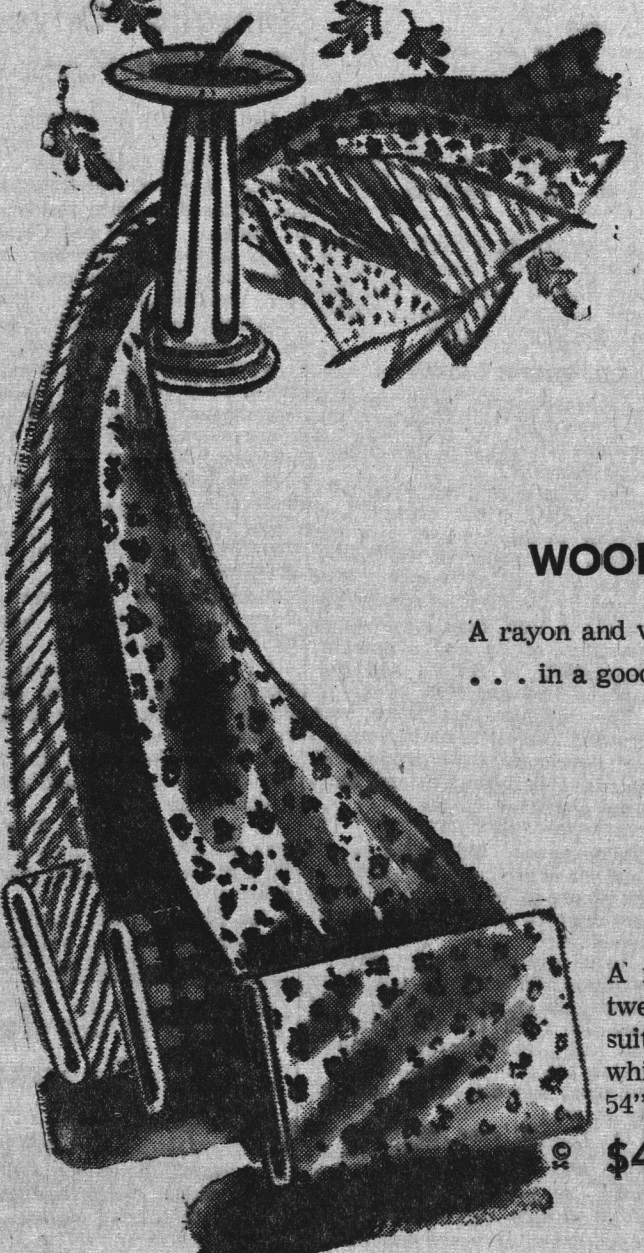
