## THE WAR LATEST NEWS.

### Official Statement from Ladysmith.

KIMBERLY BESIEGED BY THE BOERS

No News From Mafeking—Boers Hampered by Snow and Rain

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Oct. 16.—At 9 o'clock last evening (Sunday) the government had received news of fighting in South Africa and did not expect any, believing that no battle is probable except at Mafeking, communication with which has been cut and for which considerable anxiety is felt.

Elsewhere, it is believed, the British will remain on the defensive.

Lord Salisbury has issued a summons for a Cabinet meeting to-morrow.

DURBAN, Oct. 5.—(Afternoon) The following official statement has been published: "The general officer commanding at Ladysmith issued forth on Friday morning with a strong flying column and occupied a position covering Ladysmith. He reconnoitered for the enemy, who showed no disposition to advance. They are reported to be inside the Berg at the foot of Tentwa pass, in force with a second command at Oliver's Peak. The troops have returned to quarter.

It is reported from Glencoe that a large command, believed to be Free State Boers, under Commandant Viljoen is at the foot of Botha's Pass.

The Transvaal flag has been hoisted at Charleston and Commandant Viljoen has sent a message to Newcastle saying that the Boers will hoist the Transvaal flag there, but that the public need not be afraid as everything the Boers took would be paid for. They wanted to slaughter only cattle. A few people are left in Newcastle, including women and children.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The Daily Mail's Cape Town correspondent, telegraphing on Sunday evening says: "Kimberley is besieged and the Boers are massing in force. No details, however, are obtainable. The Boers have cut the railway at Belmont have seized Spytfontein and constructed fortified earthworks.

"There are strong defending forces on Meddar Bridge and Orange River Bridge. The object of these energetic operations is believed to be the capture of Cecil Rhodes.

"Kimberley is now isolated, both railway and telegraphic communication being cut."

The London Daily Mail's Glencoe camp correspondent, under date of Sunday says: "A force under Commandant Viljoen, from Spitzkop, occupied New Castle on Saturday afternoon and it is reported planted their flag over the town hall.

It is rumored that the Boers have captured a police patrol of six men at Dejugtra.

Drift on the Buffalo river, and rain and snow hamper the Boers.

So far as actual news is concerned there is very little change in the situation to be noticed."

The state of affairs at Mafeking can only be conjectured. The occupation of Newcastle by the Boers was prepared for and expected, the place having been abandoned by British. Very heavy rains and snows are reported which hamper the Boer's movements.

CAPE TOWN, Oct.—16.—The Boers have offered a reward of \$250,000 for Cecil Rhodes, capture dead or alive.

PARIS, Oct. 16.—Major Marchand, who commanded the French expedition into the Soudan, it is stated, wished to fight for the Boers as revenge for being obliged to withdraw from Fashoda, but the Government refused him permission to join the Boer's forces.

GLENCOE CAMP, Oct. 16. (night)—A Boer command has passed Ingagane marching South.

—There is evidently no truth in the report about the 2000 Boers.

## OUR CONTINGENT FOR THE TRANSVAAL

### To Mobilize at Quebec and Sail From There.

ALLAN LINER SARDINIAN IS CHARTERED TO CARRY TROOPS.

Col. Otter Will Likely Command Troops as far as Cape Town

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—The Canadian contingent will mobilize at Quebec and sail from there.

The Canadian Government have chartered the Allan line steamer Sardinian to carry troops.

Surgeon Neilson has left for Quebec to make arrangements for the contingent.

Lieut-Col. Otter, of Toronto, was here on Saturday. He will likely go in command of the contingent as far as Cape Town.

### REVULSION OF FEELING

Kruger's Ultimatum a Bad Stroke.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—The London correspondent of the Tribune says:—"There is a general revulsion of feeling throughout the country respecting the whole controversy. The nation is suddenly united as one man in defence of the Empire. The outgoing soldiers received the greetings of excited and enthusiastic multitudes. War is now welcomed, since Kruger has justified English resistance to a secession movement within the Empire. The English conscience is no longer disturbed by any misgivings respecting the justice and necessity of war. President Kruger, by a single bad stroke, has convinced everybody except Mr. Stead that the English have a righteous cause. The greatest English battle for the Empire since Waterloo is coming on, and with 85,000 regulars in South Africa victory is certain.

Revenge! Revenge!

PARIS, Oct. 14.—It is learned that Jose Luna, a brother of the Filipino General who was murdered last June, presumably by the order of Aguinaldo, has left Paris en route for the Philippines with a avowed purpose of assassinating Aguinaldo. Jose Luna swore a vendetta against the Filipino chief after news of his brother's murder reached him, but he has only now been able to procure funds to proceed to the Philippines.

They Sail Together.

VIENNA, Oct. 14.—The London correspondent of the Politische Correspondenz, says that the British and German squadrons now at Lisbon are likely to sail in Company for Delagoa Bay.

### ORANGE FREE STATE.

Proclamation Issued by the President Joining Kruger in a Declaration of War.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 15.—President Steyn of the Orange Free State, has issued a proclamation to the Free State burghers, in which he says: "Our sister Republic is about to be attacked by an unscrupulous enemy, who has long looked for a pretext to annihilate the Afrikaners. Our people are bound to the Transvaal by ties as well as by formal treaty." President Steyn declares solemnly and in the presence of the Almighty that he is compelled to resist the powerful enemy owing to injustice done his kith and kin. Solemn obligations, he declares, have not protected the Transvaal against the annexation conspiracy, and when the independent ceases the Free State's existence as an independent State is meaningless.

"The experience of the past," the proclamation says, "shows that no reliance can be placed upon the solemn promises and obligations of Great Britain as Administration is at the helm that is prepared to tread under foot."
