Bogart, Hepburn Due in 'The African Queen'



Katherine Hepburn is completely enchanting in the role of a prim English lady who gets embroiled in one of the most fascinating adventures of all time in John Huston's Technicolor adventure romance, "The African Queen."

Humphrey Bogart finds the African weather a bit tough to take in this inclement scene from John Huston's "The African Queen," filmed on location in Africa.

Humphrey Bogart, Katharine Hepburn and director John Huston, three of Hollywood's outstanding artists, combine their talents in a strikingly unusual drama, "The African Queen," which has its premiere at the Prince Edward Theatre on Monday through United Artists release.

Shot in Technicolor on location in Africa, it is the result of a ten-week trek of 6,000 miles which took the director, the stars and crew to the dangerously exciting

interior of the Belgian Congo. A starkly realistic film, "The African Queen" is based on the thrilling novel of the same title by C. S. Forester, author of the "Horatio Hornblower" stories. It stars Bogart and Hepburn as a romantic team, and they emerge individually in characterizations which hit new heights of excitement and tenderness, emotion and charm that have already won them widespread critical acclaim as the best performances of their talent-filled careers.

Extraordinary, too, is Huston's direction, marked by a spicy humor that reveals yet another facet of his all-around brilliance in relating a tale of suspense and high drama. "The African Queen" was produced by S. P. Eagle as an Horizon-Romulus Production, from a James Agee-John Huston screenplay. It tells the story of a tough little river-boatman, played by Bogart, and the prim, straight-laced sister of an English missionary who find love in a wild adventure which takes them down a danger-crowded African river in a small boat with the self-planned mission of destroying a fully-armed German gunboat in World War I.

Robert Morley, the noted English stage and screen star, heads the supporting cast as the missionary. At the top of the production crew was Jack Cardiff, Academy Award-winning Technicolor cameraman.
