The body of Mrs. John Hughes, who died at Little Minningish on Sunday night, was brought to the city by train last evening. A large number of people walked in procession from the station to the residence of Mr. James Hughes, King Street. The funeral took place this morning, and was largely attended. The Summerside Pioneer reports that Mr. Wm. Whitehead, of New London, hooked a marine curiosity of the rocks recently, while fishing in about 17 fathoms of water. It resembles a large sponge, is about 18 inches long and has 97 long fibres attached. The oldest fisherman says they never saw anything like it before. We have received the programme for the Dominion and Industrial Exhibition, which will this year be held at Toronto, commencing on the 3rd September and closing on the 17th. There will be hosts of special attractions for each day and evening during the exhibition. There will be cheap rates on all steamboat and railway lines. BUFFALO BILL, who has received much cordial attention from British royalty, has been in chancery. Different residents of the neighborhood of the Wild West show wished to restrain the performance on the ground that it was a nuisance by noise and by the objectionable conduct of Indians. The judge refused to restrain the performance. Don't forget the tea at East Point to-morrow. Expensive preparations have been made for the event, and all desirous of thoroughly enjoying themselves should make a point of attending. The distance from Harmony Station to the tea grounds is four and a half miles, and eighteen from St. Peter's Bay. Thus affording a splendid drive along a beautiful stretch of country. THE Cape Sable Advertiser's latest fish story is to the effect that Asa C. Atkinson caught a curious one the other day, the principal attraction of which was its head. On each side were what may be called wings, some 5 inches long and of very fine texture, resembling those of the flying-fish, while underneath were the regular fins. The whole length of the fish was about 10 inches. We are informed that a member of one of our best known dry goods firms collided with the fence surrounding the Dominion building last evening. As a result of the collision the dry goods man's coat was torn, and as a result of the tear it is said he talks of suing the Dominion Government for damages. Really, this business of leaving fences, boxes, etc., lying around loose is getting altogether too common and must be stopped!! THE railway traffic returns continue to indicate a good business. The Grand Trunk receipts this year to date show an increase of \$814,000 over 1886, and the Canadian Pacific an increase of \$490,000. The July statement of imports has been issued and shows some shrinkage in value, the amount being \$3,314,250 against \$4,007,057 in July, 1886, \$4,534,087 in 1885, \$5,282,596 in 1884, the decrease being being general through the list. The total value of the imports for the seven months ending July 31st was \$21,266,886, against \$20,877,602 in 1886, \$20,121,084 in 1885, and \$21,600,023 in 1884. The corn and bullion imports are included in these figures. The amount of duty collected was \$5,193,982, against \$4,810,256 in 1886, and \$3,970,000 in 1885.

A Very Flat Affair.

Laurier Fails to Connect.

CAPE TRAVERSE, Aug. 23. About one hundred and sixty people arrived here from Charlottetown this morning, and four pretty well filled cars from Summerside. The carriages are now beginning to arrive, and if very large numbers do not come in them the picnic will be a flat affair notwithstanding the propitious weather. Mr. Laurier is not here as many were led to expect. Speculation is rife as to what Mr. L. H. Davies will say about Commercial Union without compromising himself with his leader and party.

Another Seizure at Souris!

An Illicit Still Captured.

THE PROPRIETOR IN HIDING

SOME CONSEQUENT EXCITEMENT.

SOURIS, Aug. 23. Inland Revenue Collector Nash, Excise-man F. Moore and sub-collector Foley of Souris captured an illicit still this morning on the premises occupied by M. J. McCarthy, of Souris Line Road. The distiller, a son of the late Jeremiah McCarthy, of distillery fame, fled to the woods to escape arrest. As a warrant for his apprehension is in a constable's hands, it is hoped he will soon be brought to justice. The officers found his still in full operation with forty gallons of new made spirits in the boiler. They carried off the worm, goose neck and still head, destroying the liquor, one hundred gallons of wash and a keg of yeast. This is the third time for the Inland Revenue officers to raid the McCarthy distillery, which seems to be an institution of long standing, suspended only at intervals by the visit of officers. It is to be hoped that this will forever suppress what has been regarded as almost a standing evil in the community.

Another Manifesto.

LONDON, Aug. 22.

T. W. Russel, M. P., who left the Liberal-Unionists because of the proclamation of the National League, has written a letter in which he says: "I have done my best to persuade the Party and Government from proclaiming the League, but failed. The Government, in my opinion, have sped their last bullet and have handed over Ulster to Parnell. I confess my heart burned with indignation to see my friends sacrificing the Union and sacrificing loyal tenants to a handful of unreasonable landlords, deserving nobody's consideration." The discussion on the proclamation of the League is now fixed for Friday next before which time the Government will make a further explanation, with the view of retaining the support of Chamberlain or, at least, inducing him to be absent from the debate, instead of opposing the Government. The Conservatives are hopeful of obtaining a majority of from 50 to 60. If the Parnellites obstruct the passage of the Supply Bill to any great extent, it is rumored that Mr. Smith will endeavor to pass the vote en masse by the application of the cloture rule.

Affairs in the Northwest.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.

John Norquay, the giant Scotch Cree half-breed, Prime Minister of Manitoba, who has been here since Thursday last, left last evening for Toronto, from whence he will proceed to Winnipeg via the Canadian Pacific Railway, should signs of conflict in that quarter not disappear to-day. Before leaving he said there may be trouble even to the extent of a conflict of arms. He said he had been in St. Paul and Chicago for the purpose of raising a temporary loan on the credit of the Provincial Government, for the purpose of the new road and not to escape the service of an injunction warrant, as stated by a Winnipeg despatch. He would do all he could to prevent trouble. He even would go to Ottawa before returning home if necessary. However the road was undertaken and would be completed even at the point of the bayonet. He believed the federal authorities would resist them, and of course if such were the case, there would be bloodshed.

A Terrible Riot.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Aug. 22.

A fearful riot occurred here yesterday at Glen Lyon, five miles from Nanticoke, in which 300 miners, men and women, were engaged. The combatants were composed of all nationalities, the Poles, however, were largely represented. Sixty persons were seriously hurt, some probably fatally. The occurrence was inspired by a Methodist preacher named Daggart, against the custom of Sunday payment of wages by the Susquehanna Coal Company. An Official Announcement. ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 22.
