# Need For More Facilities Outlined At Rotary Meet

"Unless our facilities are greatly expanded, the Atlantic Association of Universities predicts, that by 1975, there will be as many students refused admission to university in this area as there are now in university."

This was the statement made by Dr. Frank MacKinnon when he addressed Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday.

Dr. MacKinnon pointed out that the enrollment in the Maritimes has increased from 3000 in 1945 to 19,400 this year and the AAU predicts there will be between 40,000 and 50,000 students in Maritime universities by 1975.

Getting closer to home, the speaker stressed that Prince of Wales, with only two years of university has more university students than many universities had in all four years only five years ago. PWC has more students in the freshman and sophomore years than several Maritime universities have right now. "It is hard to believe," he remarked, "that Dalhousie University is bigger now than McGill was a generation ago."

Dr. MacKinnon felt the importance of higher education on P.E.I. has evidently taken longer to be appreciated. He stressed that in the last ten years provincial revenue has multiplied four times; expenditure on education generally multiplied four and one-half times, whereas expenditure on higher education was \$230 per student ten years ago and \$215 per student last year. He reminded his listeners that the AAU figures indicated 153 university students in P.E.I. in 1943-44; there are now 924; there will be 2195 in 1970 and 8200 in 1975.

The PWC principal maintained that this island is no different from the other provinces in its need for higher education. "If its industry, commerce and culture are to develop, if it is to keep pace with the rest of Canada, it must encourage trained and educated personnel. The old idea that P.E.I. is different from

other provinces is one of our greatest obstacles to progress, for it is too often an excuse to do nothing or to spend money on the wrong thing. As the Economic Council of Canada has said so emphatically, it is impossible to develop an economy now without major attention to higher education."

Dr. MacKinnon pointed out that Prince of Wales is one of only four public institutions of its kind in the Maritimes. The others are University of New Brunswick, Memorial University and Nova Scotia Tech. There is one private non-denominational one - Dalhousie. There are 13 denominational ones, three Protestant and ten Roman Catholic.

**BRAIN DRAIN**

He maintained that Prince of Wales is following the national and Maritime trends. Its university enrollment has risen from 77 ten years ago to 410 this year. The graduation class of 1966 is double that of 1964. Ninety-five per cent of these graduates go to mainland universities now; this, he insisted, was too great a brain drain. The island, claimed Dr. MacKinnon, can't afford to lose so many of what is its greatest resource, its able young people.

The speaker insisted that Prince Edward Island needs two universities since our problems are no different than other provinces. He cited that St. Dunstan's is experiencing the prevailing expansion and predictions are that this university will have 1600 students by 1975.

Said Dr. MacKinnon: "A great deal of work has gone into the planning of Prince of Wales' development and help and advice have come from many quarters in the academic world. The changes are being made slowly so that the job will be done right and so that the PWC degree will enjoy first class standing and recognition."

**CO-OPERATION**

# Island Band Holds Publicity Spotlight

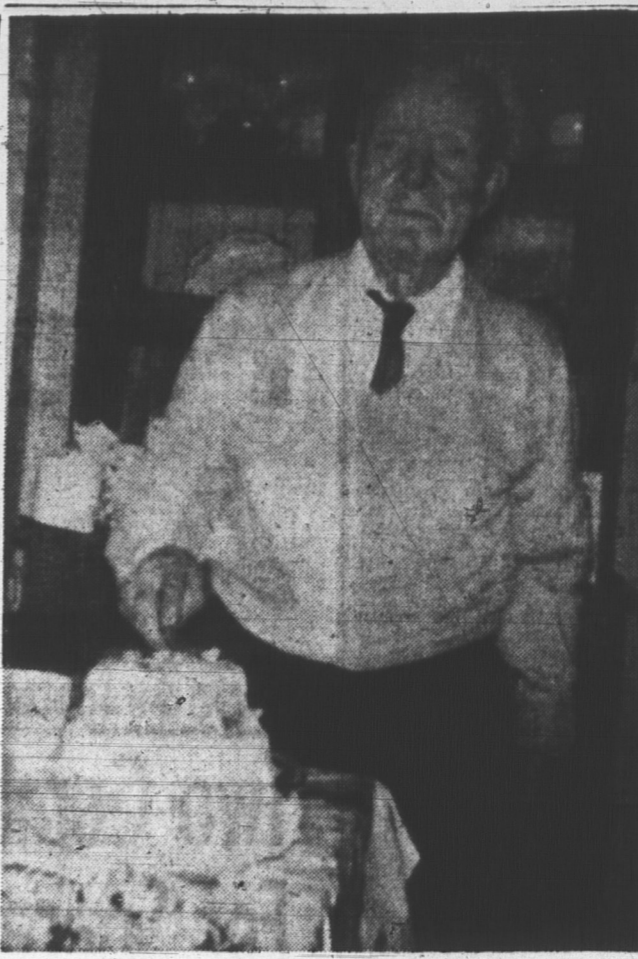
Prince Edward Island holds the publicity spotlight in New York this week where a series of street parades and several Scottish concerts are being staged daily by the Lovat Scots Pipe Band.

The Lovat Scots Pipe Band is selected to represent the Maritime Provinces in the largest promotion to date to publicize Expo 67, the 1967 Centennial and Canada's tourist attractions. It is officially known as the Expo 67 - Canada Today promotion and will serve to draw attention to next year's world's fair in Canada and also to the 1966 tourist season just around the corner.

Thousands witnessed the pipe band parading in the heart of New York Monday morning for the official opening of the publicity stunt arranged and planned by Macy's, one of the world's largest department stores, in conjunction with Expo, the National Centennial Commission, Air Canada and others. Macy's are running full-page advertisements in New York to draw attention to the parade and concert performances being put on three consecutive days by the Lovat Scots Pipe band.

The Lovat Scots band is made up of college and high school students from all three Maritime Provinces. The 24 band members were flown from Halifax on Sunday in a Vanguard aircraft to New York where they were met by officials of the Canadian Government, press, radio and television.

A new branch of the Lovat Scots band was formed in Halifax last week. The group trains each summer at the Highland College in North Rustico.

# Liberal Leader Pledges Break

A Liberal government will see to it "that better paid jobs are available to all who are qualified through carefully planned development of industry by and for Islanders", Liberal Leader Alex Campbell pledged in a speech at Hunter River High School auditorium last night in support of Liberal candidates for 2nd Queens, Sinclair, Outcliffe and Horace Willis, who also spoke on the new Liberal 12-point program.

"We shall implement energetically," said Mr. Campbell "a manpower training program so that our people can increase their maximum earning power and at the same time we shall greatly widen minimum wage provisions so that both men and women shall receive the protection they deserve."

Pointing out that present exemptions with respect to the minimum wage were so restrictive that few really benefited other than those working on government contracts, Mr. Campbell said that "we are one of the most backward provinces in all Canada with respect to labor legislation."

**PROMISES BREAK**

"We propose to give all classifications of labor, organized or not organized, a much better break than they have been receiving", he promised.

Mr. Campbell said that Island farmers and fishermen have received little help or encouragement from the Conservative administration.

"They will become our primary concern along with all other segments of our Island economy", he declared. "Where business and industry need help, we shall do our utmost to provide it. With all parts of our economy marching forward together there will be a much firmer basis for all to benefit."

"The Conservative government must really be desperate", the Liberal leader declared, "to come up now after years of inaction with a program which embodies so many of the opposition proposals which while in office they argued the province could not afford."

# Unemployment Book Renewal Disappointing

Returns of Unemployment Insurance Books for annual renewal has been very disappointing. C.L. Winchester, Insurance Branch Supervisor of the Charlottetown Office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, said yesterday that only 200 out of the first 800 employers contacted have sent in their employees books for renewal with the 1966-67 series.

There are approximately 1,600 employers in Kings and Queens Counties holding over 10,500 insurance books at the present time. In order to avert any delay at the Unemployment Insurance Commission Offices one half of the employers were sent letters a week ago, asking them to return the books of their employees. So far the response has been poor and this may result in a pile-up at the Unemployment Insurance Commission Office when the second half of the employers are asked to send in their books.

Mr. Winchester requested the immediate co-operation of all the employers to whom letters have been sent, so that delays can be kept to a minimum.
