News from the West.

News from Prince County continues to be gratifying. The result of the meeting at Tignish, on Saturday, was anxiously looked forward to by the Grits. The meeting proved a great triumph for Hackett and Rogers, whose nomination was unanimously endorsed by about four hundred electors.

New London and Rustico.

Messrs. Brecken and Jenkins returned on Saturday evening in excellent spirits and highly pleased with their reception by the people of New London and Rustico, etc. A correspondent writes:—"The meetings at Clifton, St. Ann's, Bradaltane and Rustico were quite a success for Brecken and Jenkins. At Rustico, the meeting continued open until 2 o'clock in the morning. Messrs. Laird and Davies were attentively heard, but they were simply tolerated by the electors. Ringing speeches were made by Dr. McNair, D. McKav, M. P. P. and Thomas Doyle. Dr. McNair followed Mr. Davies, and exposed his sympathy for the poor by a comparison of the two tariffs. A resolution was unanimously passed approving of the policy of the Government and pledging the hearty support of the meeting for Brecken and Jenkins."

Pisquid Road.

The Secretary of the Grit Club called a meeting of the electors of Pisquid Road last week. He posted printed notices all through the Settlement and the adjoining country. When the eventful evening arrived, the ambitious Secretary, accompanied by several Grit orators from Charlottetown, proceeded to the appointed place full of facts gleaned from the speech of Edward Blake on the Costigan resolutions, to enlighten the intelligent farmers of that fine section of the Province. Horrible to relate when the appointed place was reached there was not a single elector present to be enlightened. The people of that section are solid for Brecken and Jenkins, and being more intelligent, better informed, more respectable than the would be orators they showed a good deal of common sense in treating humbugs with contempt.

News from Vernon River.

The news from this flourishing settlement of Vernon River is cheering for the Liberal Conservative Party. The people are realizing the fact that there is now no FREE TRADE PARTY, and that Mr. L. H. Davies alone is running on this policy. The leader of the Opposition, Edward Blake, whom Mr. Davies worships, proclaims himself a moderate Protectionist. Perhaps, it may happen that, should L. H. Davies be returned, he will become the leader, and change the policy of his party. If this takes place, Blake will have to be dethroned. This will be rather rough treatment to such a giant, intellectually, as Edward Blake, after the arduous task he has had to perform leading the forlorn hope in the House of Commons. Mr. Davies is ambitious enough to assume the leadership; but unless he shows better qualities of statesmanship than he did during the two years he was leader of the Local Government of this Province, he will ruin the country in less time than no time. If the Liberal Party had not cast aside the Hon. Alexander McKenzie as leader, the chances of their party would be much better. He was faithful to his party and his policy of Free Trade; and, no doubt, his honesty lost him the leadership. Great efforts are being made in this section, as well as in the whole Belfast District, by the opponents of the Government, to get Liberal-Conservatives to split between Brecken and Davies. Many Liberals actually bargain with strong supporters of the Government to divide in this way, and say that they in turn will do the same. It is needless for Liberal-Conservatives to depend on such a promise; for it is only made to be broken. Let each voter vote the square ticket—for BRECKEN AND JENKINS.

Grit Rowdism at Souris.

MEN who resort to foul weapons whether of the tongue, the pen, or the hands and feet, may be set down as knowingly in the wrong; and so we may dismiss the Grit rowdies of Souris with a line. In 1878 their tactics were frowned upon by the electors of King's County; and the same result will follow now, only the frown will be deeper, from the fact that on this occasion the Sabbath was wilfully desecrated.

"THE EXAMINER has evidently got into bad hands lately. It has become utterly reckless in its statements. Its lies and misrepresentations are so gross and so stupid that none but the most ignorant and unthinking can attach any importance to them. THE EXAMINER has neither abused nor misrepresented any of these politicians—save the mark. It has simply called attention to facts—disgraceful facts—in which these unworthy candidates for Parliamentary honors have been personally concerned.

Very Management vs. Grit Economy.

FACTS FOR THE ELECTORS

CUSTOMS COLLECTIONS.

In 1873 under the Liberal Conservative, it cost only \$667,765 to collect \$12,954,164 of customs revenue. In 1877-8 under the Grits, it cost \$714,527 to collect a smaller amount of revenue, viz., \$12,782,324.

In other words it cost only \$438 per \$100 in 1873, under the "extravagant" Tories, while under the economical Grits it cost \$5.59 per \$100!

EXCISE.

The same is true with regard to the excise revenue. The "economical" Grits increased the cost of collection from \$3.84 per \$100 to \$4.42 per \$100!

POST OFFICES.

Another instance. Receipts from post offices do not balance the expenditures. Under the "extravagant" Tories in 1873-4 the deficit was \$234,209. Under the "economical" Grits in 1877-8, the deficit was \$517,148, or more than twice as much.

PUBLIC WORKS.

Public Works are in the same position as the post office. Until now the receipts have fallen below the expenditures. In 1873-4 (extravagant Tory year) the receipts were \$179,550 less than the expenditure. In 1877-8 (economical Grit year) the receipts were \$436,354 less than the expenditure—DEFICIT MORE THAN DOUBLED! In 1880-81 (extravagant, corrupt Tory year again) the receipts were exactly \$20,741 less than the expenditures—deficit almost nothing. In 1881-82 (another blighting Tory year) a respectable SURPLUS is expected from public works.

More than this. It is well known the Grits did not put the Act in force in anything like an efficient manner. They appointed the officials, but the work was not ready for them to do. For some reason or other the Government dilly-dallied with this as everything else, and the ninety-seven officials, paid at the rate of nearly \$2.00 per day, IDLED AROUND FOR 33,000 DAYS, or an average of about 350 days each, before they did an hour's work. To these men, all true Grit patriots, the country paid over \$62,000 for DOING NOTHING.

ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE.

The increase in the expenditure from 1873-4 to 1878, was just \$104,883!! or more than twice as much as the increase under the "extravagant" Tories. The account stands:

Hackett and Rogers

UNANIMOUSLY NOMINATED.

Grits joining the Conservative Ranks.

TIGNISH, June 12.

A monster meeting of the electors of Tignish was held on Saturday night. Over four hundred were present.

Telling speeches in favor of the Government policy were delivered by Messrs. Hackett, Rogers, Howlan and Gavin. Mr. Perry, the Grit Candidate, attempted to reply, but could not get a hearing.

Mr. Hackett was supported by Gilbert Baote, Esq., and seconded by Richard Kohoe, John Handrahan, Isidore Gaudet, Esq., and others.

The nominations were put to the meeting and carried unanimously, amidst the greatest enthusiasm. A large number of Perry and Yeo's supporters are coming over to the Conservative side.

The prospects of the Government candidates get brighter as the campaign goes on, and there seems to be no doubt of their election.

Stormy Meeting at Souris!

Grit Rowdism Prevailing!

W. D. STEWART'S SHODDY SAMPLES.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

SOURIS, June 12.

A large meeting of the electors of Souris and vicinity was held on Saturday night.

The Grits drummed up their forces from all parts of the District, and supplied them with liquor of all kinds, for the occasion. No stones were thrown by the Grit rowdies, as in 1878, for the simple reason there were no stones inside the building; but the Grit rowdy element, which prevailed from the first stage of the meeting, eliminated when the Government candidates and the chairman left—at midnight—in one of the most disgraceful scenes ever witnessed in King's County. The Grit candidates, finding themselves unable to match their opponents, in posted their party hack—W. D. Stewart—who commences a windy harangue on Sunday morning, and continued for an hour, speaking and exhibiting island copper and shoddy samples, to the delight of his party mob.

GENERAL NEWS.

DUBLIN, June 9.

Walter M. Bourke, a Galway landlord residing at Rahasane, was shot dead to-day while returning from Gort. His escort, a soldier, was also killed.

The murder occurred at Ardahan, seven miles north of Gort. Bourke was riding in front of his dragoon escort, when a volley from rifles was fired at them from behind a wall, and both fell dead. Bourke was a magistrate and son of the late Crown Solicitor for the Mayor. He possessed two estates in Ireland, one at Carragh, and the other at Rahasane. He had several disputes with his tenants, and had recently left London to carry out evictions. He took an active part in the prosecution of Father Conway some years since. A few months ago he entered the church at Carragh armed with a repeating rifle while Mass was being celebrated. The priest ordered him to leave the church, and he escaped by a side door in order to avoid being mobbed. Bourke was not a relative of late Under Secretary Bourke. Gort bears the reputation of being one of the worst places in Ireland for disputes.

LONDON, June 9.

The news of the murder of Bourke created a profound sensation in the Commons last night. Parnell and other Irish members expressed regret at the assassination. They stated that the Land League organization of Gort district had ceased to exist six months ago.

DUBLIN, June 9.

After the shooting of Bourke and his escort, six men were noticed going away from the scene.

BALINA, June 9.

At the inquest in the case of Melody, who was shot during a disturbance between people and constabulary, out of a jury of twenty-one persons fifteen returned a verdict that death was caused by a gunshot wound inflicted by Irish constabulary. The jury expressed sympathy for the relatives of Melody and recommended that the Government compensate them.

ALEXANDRIA, June 9.

All vessels of the British squadron, except the Alexandria, have left here.

DUBLIN, June 9.

In consequence of the statement of Mr. Gladstone, in the Commons, that he has received no remonstrances from Irish judges against provisions of the Repression Bill, the judges held a private meeting and passed resolutions protesting against the Bill being held by the commission of three judges without juries and sent the same to Gladstone.

Three persons have been arrested on suspicion of having been implicated in the murder of Mr. Bourke.

Sir William Harcourt, in the debate on the R. P. Bill, in the Commons, last evening, consented to introduce words denoting punishable intimidation of some person or persons.

LONDON, June 10.

John Scott Russell, the famous engineer, is dead aged 74 years.

In the Commons, last night, after several proposed amendments, to the Repression Bill had been rejected, progress was reported.

CAIRO, June 9.

All the Consuls-General separately visited Dervish Pasha to-day, except the representatives of England and France, who called upon him together. Dervish Pasha said he hoped to succeed in arranging the present difficulties.

Dervish Pasha gave an audience to-day to the principal Egyptian officers and afterwards to the President of the Chamber of Notables and a greater portion of that body; also to Sultan Pasha. He declared that he was resolved to restore order and, if necessary, would himself assume the Ministry of War.

WASHINGTON, June 8.

Mrs. Scoville writes as follows to Guiteau. The letter is given verbatim: "I hear through the papers you still keep up good courage, for which I am thankful; you certainly deserve the commendation of all people who profess to be Christians for your unwavering trust in God's power when you shot the President, as I sincerely believe you did. There can be no condemnation on God's part towards you, and no condemnation in your own heart towards yourself. You have nothing to do but continue as you have from the first, trusting implicitly in God and His protecting care, being willing to do and suffer if need be all He is pleased to demand of you; so shall you have in His eternal kingdom a still greater weight of glory. God will help you comfort you, protect you and cheer you every lonely hour my dear brother, as He only can. I shall not relax my efforts in your behalf for a moment and need will not."

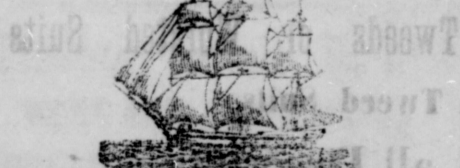
