### Temper Tantrum Husband Conceals Wife's Money

Dear Mary Haworth: My husband and I haven't been getting along too well. We are both 21 and have one child.

We argue quite often. My husband shouts and uses language that I don't want the baby to hear.

I have tried to establish ground rules, so that we might talk things over without unpleasantness, but my husband goes ahead and loses his temper, regardless.

When we were first married, my parents gave us a rather large sum of money they were saving for me. My husband put it in a joint savings account, but he won't let me know what bank it is in. He merely says it is in both our names, drawing interest.

Matters are getting worse and I am thinking of calling quits, as the quarrels and tensions aren't fair to the baby. But judging from my husband's actions as far as my education, I don't see how we can separate.

I've had only one year of college and have no business training. It probably would take me a while to find a good job and meantime I would need the money to support the baby and myself.

If I can manage, I would prefer to save the money for the baby's education. But my principal question is: Do you think I am entitled to have the money in my name only?

Dear I.S.: I have put you 9 questions to a legal specialist, who says it will be necessary for you to consult a lawyer first, to get explicit information concerning your title to the money from your parents.

If you have no funds of your own, wherewith to afford legal counsel, then you qualify for a free advice and representation from the Legal Aid Bureau. And there is a good one in

the city from which you write. To ease your frustration, the specialist and I concur in urging you to make an early appointment with your local Legal Aid Bureau, to determine ways and means of compelling your husband an exact accounting and fair distribution of the wedding gift money he has hidden away.

The gist of your story indicates that your husband has been lying, in claiming he has deposited the money in a joint savings account, presumably in his name and yours.

In setting up such an account, the wife's signature would have been required, together with the husband's. And if you didn't figure in a transaction of that sort, which would have introduced you to the banking institution automatically, then in all likelihood such a joint account does not exist.

As to what he has done with the money - who knows? May be it is deposited in his name only in a savings account; or maybe he has frittered it away in a checking account; or maybe he has speculated in investments. In any case, it behooves you to go to bat for justice in the matter; and don't let vague dread of his customary temper tantrums or spite reactions hold you back from seeing a lawyer.

If the marriage is going from bad to worse, craven silence or inaction on your part, about his glaring impropriety in denying you access to your money, won't help the situation.

More probably, if you show guts and stamina in using legal aid, you will win.
