LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.
 POLITICAL NOTES.
 Sir,—Notwithstanding that a Dominion Election may not take place prior to 1896, the Liberal-Conservatives should put their men in the field as soon as possible, as thereby the several candidates would be in a position to make a canvass of their constituency, and thus have a good foundation laid for the general campaign later on. Very often candidates are put in the field about the last moment, and the majority of the people know very little about them. The candidates should be before the people for one year if possible for that there is an opportunity to judge of their ability and integrity. There are no doubt many aspirants, but the candidates should be men of ability and integrity, able to cope with the great questions of the day. This province should be proud to have such able representatives at the Federal Capital as Hon. Senators Ferguson, Prowse, and McDonald, and Hon. Messrs. McLean and McDonald. There are very few men today in the Federal Parliament whose ability as statesmen exceeds that of Hon. Senator Ferguson; but, sir, I believe we have a man in West Queen who if he were elected would make a representative "worthy of his steel." I refer to Doctor R. McNeill of Stanley Bridge. I believe that if we have no reason to prove himself one of the ablest statesmen the province has ever sent to the Federal Parliament, and I further believe that if he should be the candidate of the Liberal-Conservative party for West Queen for the next general election, as I trust he will, and that the electors were true to their interests, as I am sure they will, he would certainly be elected by a handsome majority. It is surely time the province would send men to Ottawa in sympathy with the Conservative party and they will certainly be the dominant party in Canada after the next general election, too—with a little Independent element, perhaps—men in sympathy with Canada's great and progressive party, and therefore sincere in their demands—no weather-vanes changing with every wind and gale like the so-called present defunct Liberal Party. East Prince, too, has a man who, if he be the Liberal-Conservative candidate for that district, as I have no reason to doubt but what he will from what I know of the district, will be elected by a very large majority, and will make an excellent representative, viz., Richard Hunt, Esq., of Summerside. In West Queen, too, I believe the Prince County section will, though not personally acquainted in all of it, East Queen's Liberal-Conservative men. They have several good men, but I think they would be making an excellent choice by nominating Alexander Martin, Esq., of Valleyfield, as their candidate. In East Queen, too, I believe Doctor R. McNeill, Messrs. Richard Hunt and Alexander Martin in the House of Commons, and Hon. Messrs. Ferguson, Prowse and McDonald in the Senate, this Province would have excellent representatives, and would ere long have a representative in the Canadian Cabinet. May it be so at the next general election.

 Sir,—Notwithstanding that a Dominion Election may not take place prior to 1896, the Liberal-Conservatives should put their men in the field as soon as possible, as thereby the several candidates would be in a position to make a canvass of their constituency, and thus have a good foundation laid for the general campaign later on. Very often candidates are put in the field about the last moment, and the majority of the people know very little about them. The candidates should be before the people for one year if possible for that there is an opportunity to judge of their ability and integrity. There are no doubt many aspirants, but the candidates should be men of ability and integrity, able to cope with the great questions of the day. This province should be proud to have such able representatives at the Federal Capital as Hon. Senators Ferguson, Prowse, and McDonald, and Hon. Messrs. McLean and McDonald. There are very few men today in the Federal Parliament whose ability as statesmen exceeds that of Hon. Senator Ferguson; but, sir, I believe we have a man in West Queen who if he were elected would make a representative "worthy of his steel." I refer to Doctor R. McNeill of Stanley Bridge. I believe that if we have no reason to prove himself one of the ablest statesmen the province has ever sent to the Federal Parliament, and I further believe that if he should be the candidate of the Liberal-Conservative party for West Queen for the next general election, as I trust he will, and that the electors were true to their interests, as I am sure they will, he would certainly be elected by a handsome majority. It is surely time the province would send men to Ottawa in sympathy with the Conservative party and they will certainly be the dominant party in Canada after the next general election, too—with a little Independent element, perhaps—men in sympathy with Canada's great and progressive party, and therefore sincere in their demands—no weather-vanes changing with every wind and gale like the so-called present defunct Liberal Party. East Prince, too, has a man who, if he be the Liberal-Conservative candidate for that district, as I have no reason to doubt but what he will from what I know of the district, will be elected by a very large majority, and will make an excellent representative, viz., Richard Hunt, Esq., of Summerside. In West Queen, too, I believe the Prince County section will, though not personally acquainted in all of it, East Queen's Liberal-Conservative men. They have several good men, but I think they would be making an excellent choice by nominating Alexander Martin, Esq., of Valleyfield, as their candidate. In East Queen, too, I believe Doctor R. McNeill, Messrs. Richard Hunt and Alexander Martin in the House of Commons, and Hon. Messrs. Ferguson, Prowse and McDonald in the Senate, this Province would have excellent representatives, and would ere long have a representative in the Canadian Cabinet. May it be so at the next general election.
