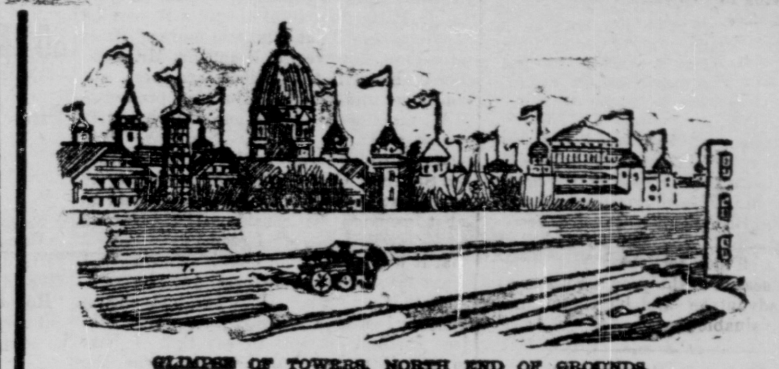
The Women's Congress.

Many noted foreign women have accepted the invitation to be present, and a programme has been arranged that will show the progress of woman along all the lines indicated.

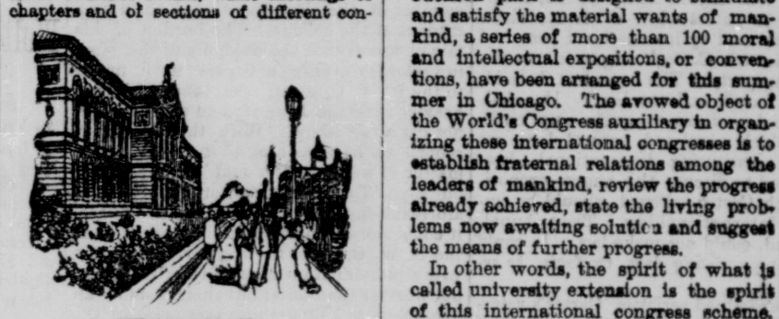


GLASS OF TOWERS, NORTH END OF GROUNDS.

INTERNATIONAL CONGRESSES.

Imposing Array of Conventions Arranged by the World's Fair Auxiliary.

A series of more than 100 international congresses, as planned by the World's Congress auxiliary, will be held during the months of the exposition in the permanent Memorial Art palace erected on the lake front at the foot of Adams street, through the cooperation of the Art Institute of this city, the World's Fair directory and the city of Chicago, at a cost of more than \$600,000. In this Memorial Art palace there will be two large audience rooms arranged to seat about 8,000 persons each, and more than 20 smaller rooms, which will accommodate from 500 to 700 persons each. Meetings of such a character as to draw a large popular audience will be held in the main audience rooms, while meetings of chapters and of sections of different con-

gresses for the discussion of subjects of a more limited interest will be held in the smaller rooms. It will thus be possible to have two general congresses and 80 special congresses or conferences in session at the same time and to have three times as many meetings within a single day by arranging different programmes for morning, afternoon and evening sessions, but it is not anticipated that so many daily meetings will be required in any department of the world's congress work.

The world's congresses will be of twofold order. There will be a series of general congresses for the presentation of the popular discourses suitable for a worldwide publication of the progress made in all the various departments of civilized life. The object of this presentation will be to promote the intelligence, culture and elevation of the people of all countries.

But a different class of congresses is also required. In addition to such general congresses there will also be special congresses for the consideration of scientific, technical or special subjects not suitable for each popular presentation. Such special congresses will be more directly in the charge of the organizations interested and represented by their respective committees of co-operation, which, acting in harmony with the auxiliary committees of arrangements, will arrange the programmes and conduct the proceedings. The special congresses of the religious denominations and the strictly scientific associations will be of peculiar interest.

Both the general congresses, planned for the people, and the special congresses, planned for the advancement of great special interests, may thus be made highly successful. As the material exposition at Jackson park is designed chiefly for the pleasure and benefit of the people of all countries and subordinately for the entertainment and advantage of the specialists in the different departments, so also is the intellectual and moral exposition to be made in the world's congresses primarily intended for the benefit of the people who will hear or read the proceedings.

The general assignment to the month of the exposition season of the world's congresses as arranged up to the present time is here given:

- May—Woman's Progress, The Public Press, Medicine and Surgery.
- June—Temperance, Moral and Social Reform, Commerce and Finance.
- July—Music, Literature, Education.
- August—Engineering, Art, Architecture, etc.; Government, Law Reform, Political Science, etc.; General Department, Science and Philosophy.
- September—Labor, Religions, Missions and Church Societies, Sunday Rest.
- October—Public Health, Agriculture.

The Behring Sea Court

SIR CHARLES RUSSELL REFERS TO THE PROPERTY RIGHT IN SEALS.

On the reopening of the Behring Sea argument at Paris on Tuesday, Sir Charles Russell continued the argument respecting the American claim of property.

Assuming that question five referred to the property right in seals, he asserted that there was no distinction between property in the seal herd and property in the individual. But American legislature never for a moment asserted that individual seals could be the property of a person. The power of possession was essential to a property claim. The company has no possession and cannot obtain possession of seals until they were killed.

Sir Charles discussed the natural history of seals. He put forward an estimate that the Alaskan seals consumed six million tons of commercial fish annually, supporting them to derive no sustenance from land.

Sir Charles pointed out that seals have no means of locomotion except in water. They spend the greater part of their time in the ocean. They are, there, essentially sea animals.

The question of the natural history of seals, showing the extreme brutality of the practice of driving seals on the islands, their progress being a series of rapid founders, succeeded by exhaustion. Many were smothered or otherwise fatally injured. In one case three thousand were precipitated over a cliff sixty feet high. The handling on the islands was unnatural and cruel. The alleged gentleness of seals arose from their helplessness while on land.

The British counsel ridiculed Carter's contention that the seals visit the islands voluntarily in order to submit themselves to human control. He turned the tables on the United States counsel by showing in like manner the seals return to the sea, and therefore by the same argument voluntarily submitted themselves to the condition of seal fishermen. The intention of returning was a fact greater towards the islands than towards the ocean.

Property right was never before claimed regarding migratory animals. An animal's return or disposition to return within the meaning of the law must be inspired by the act of man. The United States did nothing to induce seals to visit or return to the islands, and nothing for their comfort or sustenance while there. If the seals remained on land they would die. He proved by the evidence of London furriers that sick herds intentionally returned to the sea.

Sir Charles said that the institution of property so far from being based on the laws of nature, was really a restraint of nature's laws. This was an allusion to Carter's appeal to the work of nature. Such an appeal, Sir Charles Russell observed, was a worthless reference to the edition and page. He referred to the American charge of the wasteful character of pelagic sealing, and asked what that had to do with the property claim, and how could the waste on the part of the Canadian give the American a title.
