Railway Subsidies Passed.

OTTAWA, May 18. Sir Charles Tupper yesterday introduced resolutions granting subsidies to eleven Railway companies of \$3,200 per mile, including the Cape Breton, Bay Chaleur, Carquet, and Miramichi Valley Railways. The resolutions were passed by the H. use.

A Loan.

Sir Leonard Tilley, last night, in the House of Commons, announced that the Dominion Government had decided to loan the Montreal Harbor Commissioners, \$900,000, to be used in deepening the St. Lawrence River to twenty-seven feet.

Conspirators Sentenced.

DUBLIN, May 18. In Kilmainham Court yesterday, the prisoners Mullett, O'Brien, McCaffery, Delaney, Mooney and Doyle, found guilty of conspiracy to murder, were each sentenced to ten years imprisonment. The work of the Commission is now completed.

Cetewayo Defeated.

CAPE TOWN, May 18. The latest accounts from Zululand are to the effect that Cetewayo's forces were defeated by the forces of his brother, Ohama, both suffering great loss.

The Pope's Letter.

DUBLIN, May 18. The letter of His Holiness the Pope to the Irish Bishops has the effect of stopping subscriptions to the Parnell fund.

Telegraph Notes.

The British barque Arabia, Capt. Robinson, from New Orleans, March 2nd, has arrived at Rival, on the 16th. It is stated that 20 of the crew died of small pox. The captain attempted to enter the harbor of Hilsenjar and was fined 300 crowns for violating the regulations of the port.

Altogether six persons have been arrested at Ballina, Ireland, on a charge of conspiracy to murder landlords. An infernal machine and a number of firearms, belonging to the prisoners, have been seized. It is believed that the arrests and seizures were made through evidence given by an informer.

Judge O'Brien, in passing sentence on Fitzharris, said: "The crime for which you were convicted is morally the same as that of murder. The deaths of Cavendish and Burke were mainly owing to your act in inducing Smith to point out the victims." The prisoner appeared to be stupefied at the sentence.

The Freeman's Journal, commenting on the Pope's circular to the Irish Bishops, says His Holiness has been misled, if not entirely deceived, by emissaries of the British Government, who know that if the Parnell party remains unbroken it will hold the balance of power in the next Parliament.

A meeting was held in Dublin on the 16th in support of the Parnell testimonial. Thomas Sexton, member of Parliament for Sligo county, was one of the speakers. He violently attacked the Government, which he declared was the worst that ever ruled over Ireland. That the Parnell circular applied only to the clergy and not to the laity at all. He thought it might be desirable to send a deputation to Rome to explain to the Pope the true condition of affairs in Ireland; that the Irish people were sorry to lose the valuable services of the clergy, but that with or without allies the movement must go on.

The Markets.

POTATOES.—The American market is a shade better than last week, under lighter receipts; a fair quotation for large lots. Blue in Boston would be from 65c to 68c. They were sold here on Tuesday for in farmers' cuts, at from 24c to 26c per bushel. The outlook now is, that all farmers have to dispose of, will be taken at about these figures.

OATS.—Very few are offering on the streets, and the price is nominally 40 cents per bushel. Last year's crop is now mostly in dealers' hands, and as we have heard of no vessels loading for the British markets, the Provinces will be able to draw their full supply from the Island. The price in St. John is somewhat lower than last week—receipts being heavy. In Halifax, prices are unchanged.

EGGS are quoted at 16 to 17 cents in Boston. The price here is 12 to 13 cents. NEW YORK MARKETS.

Aquatics.

A Boston man has the following to say: "Kennedy is a perfectly-finished man in his execution; delicately even and true all through, and, although lighter than Hanlan, yet possessed, perhaps, of equal strength and speed."

"Hanlan has not a finished style, and an unprejudiced observer will see that he does not row evenly. He takes the water and leaves it one oar before the other; his boat does not travel on a fair keel; he has not availed himself of many changes of rig which are universally acknowledged as improvements, and he gets his speed from his great strength and practice in his present rig rather than from correct rowing. Hanlan, although so uniformly a victor, has been beaten in every race in which he has been well headed, and Kennedy's friends have a theory that the champion might not row through if crowded a good part of the way. Kennedy's staying powers have not been tried in public, but his opportunities for testing himself with Davis and others have been such that he must have fully assured those in his interests as to this requisite. He has been brought up in a highly scientific as well as practical school; he has seen Hanlan row under all circumstances; he has had better means of measuring than of being measured; he has had the blessing of a still tongue and the judgement and cool calculation of his phenomenal associate, Davis, to assist him in his estimates and reflections, and it is safe to say he has not undertaken the present task without his advice and co-operation. Many think Kennedy will be better headed, and in some way assisted by mechanical appliances. At all events, he can use only what is decided fair by a just referee, and will probably have no other handicap than the skill of his opponent. Now, who will win?"

There is always some one willing to make an ass of himself previous to one of Hanlan's races, but it has always been noticed that those who talk about what Hanlan's opponent is going to do never put up their money against Hanlan.
