

Mr. William Lefurgy, of Wilnot Creek, disposed of 2687 weight of Pork, on Wednesday last, for which he received 5d per lb.—John Lefurgy, Esq., being the purchaser. This was a very large quantity of pork for one farmer raise, but we believe that it pays well. We wonder that more of our farmers do not turn their attention to the raising of all kinds of stock, when the markets and prices are so good. We heard a farmer say the other day that nothing paid better than raising sheep, and no doubt Mr. Lefurgy will say the same of hogs.

We never have seen more shipping at the wharves than there is at present. At the wharf of J. L. Holman, Esq., there are no less than five large-rigged vessels, and two or three at Queen's wharf, all loading and bound for the Old Country.

A great many complaints have reached us lately from Lot 16, of the irregularity with which the mail bag for that place is delivered. Who's fault is this? We hope it will be looked into and remedied immediately.

Last night we had a heavy gale accompanied with frost and snow. Some three or four inches of snow is now on the ground.

The Brig Zuleika, Finlayson, master, arrived here from Liverpool, on Tuesday last, with a general cargo.

Captain James Moore, formerly of Lot 49, met with a very serious accident while taking in a number of grave stones at Shediac, a few days ago. By some mismanagement he unhappily got his hand entangled in the machinery connected with the crane on the wharf. On his return here, Dr. Price found it necessary to amputate two of his fingers.

A paragraph in the last Journal, informed the public that the "Ladies Benevolent Society in Summerside in connection with St. Mary's Episcopal Church," among other charitable acts, had relieved three Presbyterian families. This is, no doubt, the fact. There is, however, another fact connected with the above, which the paragraph referred to did not publish to the world, viz: that Presbyterians and other denominations, as well as Episcopalians, contributed to the funds of this Society, which was understood by the former at the time of its inauguration, "not to be in connection with any particular Church."—Com.

Lieutenant Colonel Peter Desbrisay Steward late of the Royal Artillery, Adjutant General of this Island, died this morning—Nov. 1st—at Spring Park, the residence of his son-in-law, Theophilus Desbrisay, Esq. The deceased gentleman was the son of Charles Stewart, Esq., formerly Her Majesty's Attorney General of this Island, and was born in Charlottetown, in 1785. In the year 1799—when but fourteen years of age—he received a Commission in Her Majesty's service, as Ensign, and in that year did duty in the old Barracks in this city. In 1807 he took part in the expedition against Copenhagen. In various parts of the world he served his country as an officer in the Artillery, and, in that service, subsequently attained the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Shortly after his promotion, Lieut. Colonel Stewart sailed out of the service, and returned to his native Island. The deceased will be deeply regretted by all his acquaintances.
