AGRICULTURE IN GREAT BRITAIN. British agriculture returns for 1893 show the remarkable fact that during last year some 150,000 acres of land in Great Britain went into pasture.

Comparing the present wheat area with that of 1873, the decline is 1,800,000 acres. The returns also show that fruit farming and market gardening are largely increasing. In 1893 there were 65,487 acres in this kind of cultivation, as against 62,148 acres in 1892.

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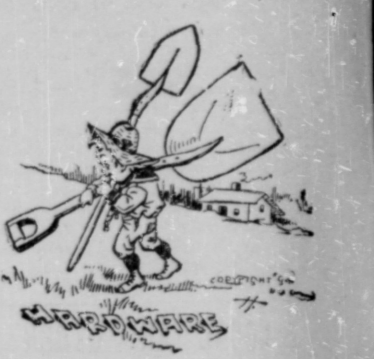
