STREET RAILWAY.—Yarmouth, N. S., is to have a street railway before the snow flies.

PARADE.—The City Militia Corps, with one or more bands, will parade to St. Paul's Church on to-morrow (Sunday) week.

THE STARR.—The steamer M. A. Starr sailed for Halifax at 3.30 yesterday, with a cargo of lobsters, oysters and pork. Master Thomas-James was the only passenger.

ARRIVAL OF THE UMBRIA.—By cable from Queenstown we learn that the steamer Umbria arrived this morning. Mr. A. W. Sterns, of the firm of Perkins & Sterns, was among the passengers.

BOUNTY MONEY.—The Fisheries Department has concluded the payment of the bounty claims to Canadian fishermen, who number 45,000. Forty thousand cheques, involving an expenditure of \$15,000, were issued.

THE WELCOME MEETING.

AMHERST, N. S., July 27.

The Welcome Meeting last night in the Baptist Church was crowded. Vice-President McKeen, of Amherst, presided and opened with an address. President McCallum responded, and Rev. Mr. Street, welcomed the delegates on behalf of the clergy. Rev. Mr. Bruce, of St. John, responded. Hon. Hiram Black spoke for the citizens, and Mr. Kelley, of Montreal responded. The addresses were all good, and the meeting most enthusiastic.

This morning the Convention met at 9.30. Rev. Wm. Brown, of Windsor, read an excellent paper on the Word of God, its place and its authority in our works. A lively and interesting discussion followed.

Reports from various associations were handed in. Mr. Diston, of St. John, reported a fairly successful year and encouraging prospects. Membership 415.

This afternoon, Rev. and Hon. Moreton, of Halifax, gave a very interesting Bible reading.

Mr. McIntosh afterwards read the report of the Executive Committee. There are 36 Associations in the Maritime Provinces. Receipts, \$101,171; expenditure, \$124,993; balance due treasurer, \$23,822.

The week of prayer will be held following the second Sunday in November. Travelling Secretary McLeod has given notice of his resignation.

COLCHESTER

Three Candidates in the Field.

HALIFAX, July 27.

Contrary to expectation, the Grit County at Truro to-day nominated a straight party candidate to contest Colchester Co. Their choice was Cyrus Eaton, hardware merchant, of Truro. Mr. Eaton's platform is Unrestricted Reciprocity and Prohibition. There are now three temperance candidates in the field. First, Sir Adams Archibald, Ministerialist, a life-long temperance man, formerly a prominent Son of Temperance, and who voted for prohibition in the Nova Scotia Legislature thirty-three years ago; second, Cyrus Eaton, Opposition, President of Truro Jubilee Temperance Society and a decided Prohibitionist; and third, Edward Fulton, the third party Prohibitionist. Possibly Fulton will withdraw.

VOLCANIC ERUPTION.

GREAT LOSS OF LIFE.

SHANGHAI, July 27.

A volcanic eruption at Bandaian, fifty leagues from Yokohama, destroyed several villages and killed 1,000 persons, including 100 visitors at Thermal Springs. A fresh crater has formed and the eruption is still active.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, July 27.

The value of postal traffic between England and Japan, via the Canadian Pacific, continues to increase at an amazing rate. So say advices to the Post Office Department.

The presence of Mr. Pottinger here has revived the rumor that Mr. Schreiber's services are to be dispensed with. Information has been received at the Marine Department to the effect that the Imperial Government no longer intend to use Sambro Island, Halifax harbor, as a signal station.

It is rumored that Lord and Lady Dufferin have announced their intention of making their return journey to England from India via Vancouver and the Canadian route.

Militia in the Northwest.

OTTAWA, July 27.

It is reported that the Government will ultimately transform the Northwest Mounted Police into a militia corps under the direction of the Militia Department. It is believed here that if the question is taken up and it is decided to have militia in the Northwest, that levies made will consist for the most part of cavalry, the opinion being entertained that the formation of troops at various points would be a very easy matter.

Knights of Labor.

LINDSAY, Ont., July 27.

The Convention of Local Assemblies of Knights of Labor in session here has passed resolutions condemning undesirable immigration and calling the attention of members of Parliament to the vast importance of the Government issuing all currency and establishing a National Bank, all benefits derived therefrom to go direct to the people.

More Dynamite.

CHICAGO, July 27.

An unsuccessful attempt was made shortly after 3 a. m. to blow up the house of Christian Kreuger, 675 Lincoln Avenue, with dynamite bombs. No cause is known.

The Pope Unwell.

ROME, July 27.

The Pope is suffering from liver complaint, and is losing strength. He has been ordered to take mineral waters before breakfast.

The Steamer Halifax.

HALIFAX, July 27.

A cablegram from England announces that the steamer Halifax was launched to-day. She is for the Halifax and Boston route.

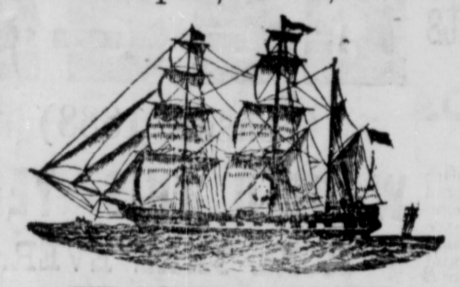
