FALSEHOOD REPEATED AND CORRECTED.

The falsehood of his unscrupulous friend, Mr. Sifton, that Sir Charles Tupper had apologized on account of his charges concerning the corruption of the officials in the Northwest, was repeated by Sir Louis Davies before the electors of North River, on Saturday evening, though Mr. Hugh John Macdonald's letter explaining the whole matter had been published and was before the public. We quote again from this letter:

His (Mr. Sifton's) only attempt to meet them (the Yukon charges) seem to have been to declare that Sir Hibbert's father had apologized to Mr. Philp for a statement made respecting that gentleman. I am glad to know that this disingenuous device of Mr. Sifton's to evade the issue did not impose on his audience, and I am sure it will not impose on the electors in other parts of the constituency.

"The statement Sir Charles Tupper apologized to Mr. Philp for having made was a repetition of a statement made by Mr. Sifton himself in Parliament. On the 4th of April, 1899, Mr. Sifton was obliged to admit in the House of Commons that he had given Mr. Philp the following permit: "This will introduce Mr. Philp, who will be permitted to enter the Yukon district with such provisions as he may choose to take with him, without regard to the regulations."

Mr. Sifton also stated "When Mr. Philp got to the coast he decided to become interested in the bringing of liquor into the Yukon. He telegraphed me, asking me to write him that the letter I had given him should include liquor."

Mr. Philp subsequently satisfied Sir Charles Tupper's solicitor, Mr. Phippen, that he had not endeavored to import liquor under the permit, as stated by Mr. Sifton, and that the telegram Mr. Sifton informed parliament he had received from Mr. Philp had not been sent by him, but was a forgery. According to Mr. Philp's statement to Mr. Phippen that permit was received by Mr. Philp's partner, Mr. Cameron, after Mr. Philp's departure from Brandon, and was forwarded by him to Mr. Philp at Vancouver. It reached Nancouwer two days after Mr. Philp had sailed for the Yukon, and was opened by Mr. Philp's brother, in whose custody it remained until Mr. Philp's return,

and it was while it was in his possession that the telegram was received by Mr. Sifton purporting to be signed by Mr. Philp, asking that the permit be specifically made to include liquor. Mr. Philp says he first heard of the telegram a few days after Mr. Sifton referred to it in the House of Commons, and that he at once communicated with Mr. Sifton, informing him that it was forged. Mr. Sifton up to the present time, however, has made no retraction of his statement that his late partner, Mr. Philp, had sent the telegram referred to.

Under these circumstances, Sir Charles Tupper naturally apologized to Mr. Philp for having been misled by Mr. Sifton into connecting him personally with the attempts which undoubtedly were made to import liquor into the Yukon under this permit. This, however, in no way affects the charge against Mr. Sifton, viz: that this permit was issued by Mr. Sifton illegally, that attempts were made to use this permit to cover the importation of liquor into the Yukon, as admitted even by Mr. Sifton himself, and that the permit was hawked about for large sums as a valuable franchise in that connection. Much less does Sir Charles Tupper's personal apology to Mr. Philp affect the numerous other most serious charges preferred by Sir Hibbert Tupper against Mr. Sifton in connection with his maladministration of the Yukon, and which Mr. Sifton has not attempted to answer.

We hope that Sir Louis Davies will not again attempt to deceive the electors with the bald statement that Sir Charles Tupper apologized for his charges in connection with the Yukon. He didn't apologize on that account, at all.

THEY GRASPED AT TOO MUCH.

It is contended, on the part of the Government, that there never were so many important questions submitted to any commission as there were to the International Commission appointed to adjust the differences between Canada and the United States. This may be true;—and this may be the reason why nothing whatever resulted from all the work, and the time lost and the money spent on account of this commission.

If the Government of Canada had proceeded in a business-like way and settled each question upon its own merits it might have accomplished much in its effort to improve the relations of the two countries. It might, at all events, have obtained a measure of Reciprocity. But like the boy who had his hand in his jar of nuts, the Government of Canada grasped at too much and lost all.

Who said Reciprocity?

SIR LOUIS told the electors of North River that he had been "black-guarded and abused." Now, really, Sir Louis, were you—and pray, by whom?

"The necessities of life are taxed to death," was the shout of the prospective knight errant in the campaign of 1896. "Let us in and we'll cheapen oil, sugar, tea, cotton, etc." Elector, are you getting oil, sugar, tea, cotton, etc. as cheap as you did in 1896? The fellows who told you so fooled you; they wear "tin-pot titles" now,—you pay the bills.

SIR LOUIS would have had the electors of North River believe that investigation had proved the charges against "dog biscuit" for our soldiers were fully investigated and found to be false. Now, really, did Sir Louis forget to mention that minority report of the committee of investigation, and did he ever read the letters from South Africa in which the so-called Emergency Rations were denounced as fraudulent?

A NEW prohibition organ, the Temperance Banner, says the Liberal leaders just used the prohibitionists to boost themselves into office. The Montreal Gazette remarks that, "In their discovery the dries have a lot of company. Those who were taken by the song "Ring the knell of boodling, boys"; those who wanted lower taxes and lessened expenditure; those who dreamed of a free trade tariff; those who desired reciprocity with the United States, and those who believed that a mutually preferential tariff arrangement with Great Britain were desirable things were all boosters of Liberalism in 1896. It is suspected that they feel differently now."
