Island Odds And Ends

A meeting of the Fish and Game Association will be held at City Hall on Friday evening. The number of fishermen on the Island must run into the thousands, but it is seldom that any Fish and Game meeting attracts more than a small fraction of these-50 or 75 people usually attend a Fish and Game Association meeting. Representing as it does a large body of people, both young and old, who love the sport, the Association does not wield the influence it could command if its well-wishers gave it more tangible support. On Friday night, the proposal to construct a number of new by-pass ponds, will be one of the most important topics on tap. There is now little doubt that these ponds wherever constructed have greatly improved fishing.

This Province, with its hundreds of streams running into the sea, is one of the most prolific breeding grounds of trout on the Atlantic coast. These streams unfortunately are filling in, and there are fewer and fewer deep pools where fish can hide, and where people can fish profitably. Trout face a hazard in these shallow streams from the ever present poacher; a trout in shallow water can be netted, speared or jigged quite easily. The by-pass pond affords the fish the protection of deep water which baffles the people who try to net them, and almost completely discourages the netter and jigger. Aside altogether from the improvement in all around fishing conditions, the by-pass ponds would afford local fishermen, they would provide our tourist bureau with an attraction worth thousands of dollars yearly. For many years we have advertised our trout fishing facilities, while stream after stream has deteriorated and non after pond has been leased and denied to the public. Definitely we have had little to advertise. The Fish and Game Association can do a great service to its membership and to the province by making forcible representation of its case for more by-pass ponds to the Government. Ten by-pass ponds in each County open to Islander and tourist alike would work a transformation in trout fishing conditions in the province. If 20 or 30 of these ponds were constructed on good streams, the (Continued on Page 11)
