



SCHOONER LOADS PRODUCE AT MONTAGUE

The Guy W. Adams, a 160-ton schooner out of Newfoundland, arrived in port at Montague Thursday morning to take on a cargo of potatoes, turnips, cabbage and carrots as well as food supplies to be transported from Charlottetown. The craft was built in Lunenburg and the captain is Sam Hardy of Newfoundland.

Arrangements For Plant Please Walter R. Shaw

Opposition Leader Walter R. Shaw has expressed his pleasure that the Abergville Maritime Industries have finalized arrangements with Industrial Enterprises Incorporated to establish a processing plant in this province. "This is another evidence," maintains Mr. Shaw, "of the value of the efforts of the industrial organization launched during the tenure in office of the late Shaw government."

However, it is almost impossible to correctly state the total membership of many industries which belong to more than one co-op and some belong to several. Part of this is due to the variety of types of co-ops in the field. For instance there are purchasing, marketing, production, service and fishermen's co-ops. The movement is not, however, confined to this province; it is Canada-wide and the total business volume is rapidly approaching the \$2 billion mark annually. In the country as a whole the province of Saskatchewan is tops so far as the volume of business done is concerned. In 1964 the co-ops there did a total of \$534,000,000 worth.

The co-operative movement is not very old, but it is not new by atomic age standards. However, it operates on a different principle. The co-ops are owned by the people who use them and they pay taxes the same as other businesses such as a property tax, tax on dividends on share capital, tax on general reserves. But it naturally does not put a tax on what it saves its members as this is not considered in the same classification as a company profit. In fact it is likened more to what a grocer would save on groceries by taking them from his own store—and this saving would not be taxable.

Accused Sentenced To Penitentiary

Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, sentenced Edward Callaghan, City, to three years in the city police court yesterday morning on twelve counts of uttering a forged document. The accused was sentenced to three years for each charge but the sentences are to run concurrently.

Minister Hopeful Despite Confusion

Honorable Gordon Bennett, minister of education returned yesterday following the federal-provincial conference on higher education at Ottawa. Mr. Bennett reported that premiers and representatives of all the provinces to be still somewhat confused about the package deal in education as proposed by Prime Minister Pearson. Exact comparisons in terms of dollars and cents are not yet possible but it is felt that this province is substantially better off under the new system of grants.

"When the conference was called," Mr. Bennett said, "it was felt that the discussions would deal primarily with grants to universities for both operating and capital costs. However, Prime Minister Pearson's initial statement expressed the concern of the federal government in all forms of post-secondary education—technical institutes and training centres, community colleges, and the re-training of adult workers to enable them to adapt to the demands of a rapidly developing industrial society. Consequently, much more time was devoted to a discussion of vocational and technical agreements than to university financing."

"Federal cost-sharing during the past five or six years has been a great encouragement towards the construction of vocational high schools in all provinces. The federal government now feels, however, that should this type of financing continue, there is a danger of producing a distorted effect in establishing priorities in the educational program. A province might feel more impelled to establish and operate a post-secondary institution that can qualify under shared training agreements than to provide additional university facilities, for which there is no shared cost incentive."

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Public Co-operation Asked On Halloween

Superintendent R.P. Harrison, commanding officer RCMP "L" Division delivered the following message to the citizens of Prince Edward Island on the approach of Halloween on Monday.

"With the advent of Halloween drawing near, in the interest of curbing malicious damage and unnecessary injury to innocent persons, the responsible public is requested to respond by removing temptations that may entice those destructively inclined."

"Additionally, motorists should be conscious of the antics employed by irresponsible persons and in the interest of avoiding serious injury and damage to property, due caution should be employed in the operation of vehicles. "Motorists should also be aware of the fact that children will obviously be frequenting the highways, many of whom will be dressed in disguise difficult to be envisioned by them. Alternatively, the type of apparel worn is sometimes conducive to vision obstruction and coupled with the excitement of the occasion, disregard for vehicular traffic by children becomes an inherent factor. "From a preventive viewpoint, the cooperation of the general public is solicited at this time to ensure that incidents of an unfortunate nature are kept at a minimum," stated Superintendent Harrison.
