S'side Makes Plans To Increase Water Supply

At the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening, the Water and Sewage Commission was empowered to spend \$15,000.00 for a new well. The motion for this was moved by Councillor J. L. Gorrill and seconded by Councillor H. B. Schurman.

Mayor Wedge explained that as a result of a survey of the Fire Underwriters, a previous report was amended and it is now advised that the Town does not have a sufficient water supply. He said that if sufficient water is reached with this new well it will take care of the needs of the Town for the winter at least.

His Worship, Mayor Henry Wedge presided and all members of the Council except Councillor J. L. Driscoll were present. On motion of Councillor Gorrill, seconded by Councillor Clarence Steele, the Town is authorized to borrow up to \$310,000.00 by way of overdraft. Of this amount \$60,000.00 is on current account and \$250,000.00 on capital account pending a proposed issue of debentures. Councillor Gorrill said that these debentures would be issued shortly.

Reporting for the streets committee, Councillor Schurman said that the permanent street work is held up due to a shortage of cement but it can be finished in a week when the cement arrives. He said that there is also some concrete sidewalk work to be finished and quite a bit of work is being done on the installation of new surface and storm sewers.
