

Mayor's Salary Bill Passes Third Reading

Meeting of Red Cross Executive

The following tribute to the late Mr. D. A. MacKinnon was embedded in the minutes of the regular meeting of the executive of the P. E. I. Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society held yesterday afternoon and presided over by Judge L. G. Lewis of Summerside.

"The Prince Edward Island Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society has sustained a severe loss in the death of Mr. D. A. MacKinnon, who has been the Society's Honorary Treasurer continuously for the past thirty-eight years—ever since it was granted its Charter in 1914. All through the years Mr. MacKinnon faithfully, cheerfully and meticulously watched over the Division's funds and was always ready to give his wise counsel to the many problems which presented themselves from time to time. It was his earnest desire to round out the even 40 years in this position, but God willed otherwise. In all these years he was present and read the Financial Statements at all but two annual meetings, and very seldom did he miss the regular meetings of the executive. He was beloved, respected and admired by all who were associated with him, and he will go down in the annals of Red Cross, as well as in those of the many other organizations with which he was connected, as a truly great gentleman. "Because we want to finish by Easter" Premier J. Walter Jones announced that the Legislature would sit again Monday morning. The announcement was made following adjournment of the Budget debate yesterday.

During the morning session two new bills were introduced and received first reading. They are amendments to the Public Health Act and the Village Service Act.

Three bills relating to the City of Charlottetown were all given third and final reading and passed. One amended the Act to incorporate by barring from the position of Mayor anyone who is nominated to contest a Provincial Election.

At the same time it permits increasing the salary of Mayor from \$325 per year to \$1,000 after the civic election of 1954.

Another Act permits the issuance of new debentures and the third makes valid the acts of the City Council during the time former Mayor B. Earle MacDonald held office from Declaration Day to the Special Session of the Legislature to which he was elected last April.

Also receiving final reading were amendments to an Act to incorporate the Provincial Sanitorium, the County Court Act, the Public Service Superannuation Act, the Teachers Superannuation Act and the Floral Emblem Act.

Removed From Order Paper

An amendment to the Public Works and Highways Act was given second reading and another in the same stage "An Act to Amend the Land Survey Act" was struck from the order paper on motion of Hon. A. W. Matheson. The latter bill which had received first reading on motion of Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, would have transferred authority over the Act from the Minister of Public Works and Highways.

Considerable opposition was encountered when the change in the Public Works and Highways Act was first introduced into committee. At that time progress was reported to the Speaker and the bill was changed. The original form gave authority to peace officers to arrest without a warrant anyone found operating a motor vehicle weighing more than the limits set. Many members thought this was giving too much authority to police officers who might be young and inexperienced. In its present form the bill authorizes the impounding of the vehicle until the case is settled.

Mr. J. W. Don Campbell asked what would happen if the vehicle was carrying perishable freight. It might easily be lost, he said, if the vehicle were to be held up for 10 days. Hon. W. E. Darby, Attorney General, said that the load could be transferred to a smaller truck. On objections from members he said that a big trailer vehicle weighing 40 or 50 tons would not be stopped from moving over the highway by a \$100 fine. And permitting it to go might mean \$100,000 worth of damage to the pavement.

He said the weight of the vehicles using the highway had to be controlled and impounding the vehicle was the only way to do it.

Library Receives Historic Sketchbook

The sketch book of Thomas Waitt May who surveyed the route for the Prince Edward Island Railway in 1872 has recently been presented to the P. E. I. Libraries for the provincial archives by Mrs. Fred B. May of Duncan, B. C. (formerly of St. Eleanor's), and is a valuable pictorial record of several Island localities as they appeared eighty years ago.

The Island sketches are in pencil and in some detail. They are titled as follows: A valley in Strathalbyn, Lot 30, P. E. I., 1872; North Shore, P. E. I., 1872; Strathalbyn Hills, 1872, surveying party of the railway going to work; Fisherman going to the fishing grounds, 1873; Keefe's Lake, Lot 49, 1872; View in Strathalbyn, Lot 30, P. E. I., 1872; Georgetown Square from the northwest corner, 1872; Georgetown harbour in 1872 "from the point where the railway wharf is built"; Georgetown Square in 1872 from the northeast corner; Souris harbour in 1874 from the rocks below the village; the old rink, Charlottetown, on the site of the present one, about 1883.

Included in the sketch book are three water colours done in 1850-60 in the vicinity of Granville on the Normandy coast of France, and two pencil sketches of the Yarrow Valley, Selkirkshire, Scotland.

Disputes Opinion Of Minister Re Split Log Drags

In the briefest speech on record for either the Draft Address or the Budget debates, Mr. George Kitson, Second Queens, disagreed with Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, on the use of the split-log drags on the roads. In his district, he said they worked very well.

However, he congratulated the Minister on the pavement laid from Cornwall to Clyde River which he said was a good job and standing up well. Hon. Mr. MacKinnon said that it had been laid there purely as an experiment which had proven successful.

Mr. Kitson said he had earlier heard the Premier mention the number of cars in a district. He thought his district had the most cars. He said that he had checked and learned that the first five in order were Charlottetown, Summerside, Bedeque, Second Queens and Fort Augustus district. He also said that the License Bureau had been told to ask all applying for registration to state their school district so in future members would know exactly how many cars there were.

The Budget debate was adjourned by Mr. Harvey Douglas, Second Kings, who will have the floor when the debate is resumed. The House will meet again Monday at 11 A.M.

R. ALLAN CAMPBELL

—News of the passing of Mr. R. Allan Campbell at his home at Long River on March 11th, 1952, brought sorrow and regret to relatives and friends both there and in other communities.

The late Mr. Campbell was born in Long River, a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Campbell, but lived and worked for a time in Montserrat before returning to settle on the homestead. He was 1947, and Archibald was killed during the first Great War.

YMCA Official To Visit Ch'town

On Thursday he will be guest speaker at the fifteenth anniversary of the Summerside Y's Men's Club. During his visit here he will also confer with the Y.M.C.A. executive and other Board members.

Mr. Baker Returns From Conference On Marketing Plan

The presentation of his views on the proposed Federal cattle marketing plan to the Legislature when it meets again next week is a possibility provided the idea receives an OK from Ottawa, said Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, who arrived home from Ottawa last night.

Mr. Baker had been attending the Federal-Provincial Agricultural Conference dealing with the cattle marketing situation arising out of the recent embargoes placed by several of the Provinces on the movement of cattle from the Western Provinces following the recent outbreak of the foot-and-mouth disease.

He said it would take the consent of the Provinces before a set of floor prices could be laid down by the Federal Government, but he believed that all the Provinces would agree. Mr. Baker believes a committee will be appointed to recommend price levels and stock movements. An advance committee would probably be named to set support prices so they could be announced for two months in advance.

The Minister stated that the conference had been a harmonious one with the proposals offered better than had been expected. The Maritime Provinces had been insistent that the plan apply in this area but he could not state the attitude of Newfoundland. He said it was desired to prevent a rush of cattle to market and added that approximately 20,000-30,000 pounds of pork had been canned due to conditions.

After twenty three years service as Regional Supervisor or the Veteran's Land Act here, Mr. E. W. Campbell began his retirement leave yesterday. Mr. Campbell is a veteran of World War I and went overseas with the Second Canadian Siege Battery under the command of Col. A. G. Peake. He is a native of Montserrat but now resides in Charlottetown. Thursday night fellow employees read an appropriate address to Mr. Campbell and presented him with a travelling bag.

Missing Boy On Holiday Jaunt

A tired but happy young lad was returned to his family by alert members of the R.C.M.P. who located the missing youth aboard the car-ferry Abegweit yesterday.

The boy, Donald Buchanan, thirteen, who had been missing from his home in Central Royal since early Wednesday morning and who was the subject of an intensive search, was located sitting placidly on the top deck of the ferry.

When questioned as to his whereabouts for the last two and one half days the young lad unfolded the following tale: After he left the home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. William Buchanan of Kensington, he hitched several rides to Borden where he climbed aboard the ferry. Arriving at Tormentine he got several more rides until finally he arrived in Moncton, where he spent the night in the Police Station.

When asked by police officials what he was doing there, the young lad promptly replied that he had missed the truck that brought him over and that was also going to take him back home. Believing this story the Police fed and housed the youth and let him go the following morning. He then headed for a service station, picked up a road map, and then "thumbed it" to Sackville. The man who gave the boy the lift to Sackville also presented him a dollar bill with

Scores Amendment To Social Assistance Act

During the various debates on the different measures in the Legislature last week Mr. R. B. Bell, Leader of the Opposition, was very critical of the amendment to the Social Assistance Act which permits the taking of a lien on the property of those assisted. He was opposed to such action on the general ground that the recipients under the Act would be very needy or even incapacitated people.

He maintained that a lien should not be taken against the little property they would own. Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare, assured Mr. Bell that the lien would be taken in cases where Mothers' Allowances were being paid, but that they might be instances where one should be taken under social assistance. Mr. Bell opposed the motion when it was put.

During his participation in the Budget debate, he cited the case of a prisoner in Queen's County Jail doing the painting there and being paid 65 cents per hour and when he was released he received a Government cheque for \$358. He said that the Premier has often maintained there was a need for a prison farm in this Province as prisoners should be made to work.

He did not believe that prisoners should be paid for work while in jail and told the Attorney General if this continued, he would soon have to build many more jails to accommodate all those trying to get in. He called this a glaring example of the waste of public funds. Hon. Mr. Matheson smilingly said that perhaps it was better to pay the prisoners for work than have to pay their families relief.

The Leader of the Opposition also referred to the Provincial Treasurer's report of the excellent sale of P. E. I. bonds on the New York market at a price to the Province of 4.21 which he considered very favorable. Mr. Bell said that last month the Province of Nova Scotia had sold an issue of \$12,500,000 in the New York market at a cost of only 3.82 and he thought this was a much better deal than we received.
