

Millionaires Score 7-4 Win Over Miners In Wide-Open Encounter

SYDNEY, Nov. 24 (CP) — Sydney Millionaires continued their jinx over Glace Bay Miners in the Maritime Major Hockey League tonight before a small crowd of 1,129 fans when they stopped their traditional rivals 7-4 in a wide-open game.

This was the seventh meeting of the season between the teams and coach Cliff Roach's Money-men pushed their record to six wins and one loss.

The strongest scoring string on the ice, the Robertson - McDonagh - Rowe unit, knifed through the Bay defenders for six goals. Robertson led with three. Rowe had two and McDonagh one. Reg Campbell scored the other.

Bob Verrier led Miners with a pair of goals and singles went to playing-coach Hub Macey and defenceman Dennis Lambert, back from a shoulder injury. Miners' captain Bob Cooper was sidelined with an eye injury suffered in a game at Halifax Saturday.

The league's lowest average goalie, Don Lockhart, had a jittery night when Mills built up a 3-1 lead on goals by Robertson, McDonagh and Rowe while Verrier was shooting his first.

The Bay came right back in the second frame, outplaying Sydney most of the way and at one time evened the score at 3-3 on goals by Macey and Lambert. Campbell broke the stalemate late in the period.

Miners showed up better than the score indicated, raising 38 shots on goalie Nick Gardiner while Lockhart handled 22. The game at times flashed some fine hockey and roughened up in spots.

There were nine penalties, six of them to Sydney.

The Islanders, according to a report from coach Murph Chamberlain at Halifax last night will have only two defencemen ready for action in Glace Bay tonight. Chamberlain, in a telephone conversation with Gilbert A. Gaudet of the Islanders executive, stated that Lou Kiley twisted his knee early in the game against Halifax Atlantics and would be out of action at least for tonight and possibly for a longer time. Lou was unable to play after he received the injury and will probably return home today. This leaves only Bob Gray and George McLagan to look after tonight's defense chores at the Bay.

Murph was hoping to receive word yesterday which would clear up his defense problems. He is hoping to hear from the Islanders executive that the Halifax game around four o'clock in the afternoon and apparently did not get word on anything last night in Halifax. The injury to Kiley means that he needs two blueline men and needs them soon. It could be that he will receive word about them today.

The Boosters Club with almost \$1,000 in the safe as the result of their first week's work are now in a position to pay the major portion on one player. The Boosters have done quite a job in the past few days despite the fact that only the ten members working. They want more members in order to contact all the people and they also need the continued support of the fans to put this drive over the top.

Col. Victor Oland came through for the Islanders yesterday when the local club was unable to reach Halifax by plane. Bad weather stalled over Halifax before the Islanders left here in the afternoon with the result that it was impossible to fly into the Garrison City. The Islanders notified Oland and he promptly sent his bus to Debert where the Islanders landed and brought them to Halifax for the game. This morning Oland's bus will take the players back to New Glasgow where a number of Island owned cars will be waiting to take the boys to Glace Bay.

Officials at Glace Bay will be hoping for a big turn out of fans tonight. Last week in two games at home the Miners averaged only 1,000 fans per game which is not nearly enough to support M.M.H.L. hockey team. Glace Bay officials have started a share-selling drive to aid their hockey club. The shares are valued at \$2.00 each and fans are asked to take as many as they can afford. "Unless this campaign goes over in a big way, the future of Maritime major hockey in Glace Bay is doubtful," states the Sydney Post-Record.

Sydney Millionaires have also been having their financial troubles. Last night's crowd of 1,129 was the smallest of the year at Sydney and this, coupled with their loss of the Islanders' gate last week, must put them in a hard way. Before that game with the Islanders was cancelled, the Millionaires were complaining about losing money. The only team in the circuit which is not in the red this season is the Islanders. They, according to Murph Chamberlain, are about square for the season's operations.

Len "Comet" Haley, who led the Maritime Major Hockey League in point-scoring last year has decided to quit hockey. Haley went with Bud Poile to the Edmonton Flyers this season but Len could not produce in the Western Hockey League. Another player who may be let out of the same league is Jimmy Anderson. Jimmy is playing for Bud Poile at Edmonton but has not been going well. Poile told Hub Macey the other day that he might be sending Anderson back to the Bay for the remainder of the season.

The player in the M.M.H.L. last year, who looks most likely to succeed at present, is Willie Marshall or Ray Frederick. Willie has scored five goals and seven assists in fourteen games with the Pittsburgh Hornets in the American Hockey League during 14 games. Owner John Harris of the Hornets predicts that Willie, along with Elliot "Specs" Chorley, will lead the next six days' fans in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are going to be given a lot of basketball thrills. They play at Fickville, N.B. on Wednesday night.

Halifax Atlantics Edge Charlottetown Islanders 3-2 In Close Game

HALIFAX, Nov. 24 (CP) — Defenceman Bob Hayes' goal with less than two minutes of playing time left, tonight gave Halifax Atlantics a 3-2 win over Charlottetown Islanders in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here before 2,907 fans.

The victory moved Atlantics eight points ahead of Charlottetown, who haven't been able to win a game on Halifax ice this season. Although outplayed in the first period, Halifax managed to outshoot Islanders in the other periods.

Billy Good led the winners with two goals. Marcel Clements and veteran Buck Whitlock scored for Islanders.

The first period was scoreless and there was only one penalty—to Lou Kiley for elbowing.

Atlantic were hard pressed at the start of the second when Hayes was penalized for holding Bellinger. Islanders launched a strong power play but spectacular goaltending by Roy McMeekin blunted the attack.

Good, a smooth skater, banged in Muckle Hollett's rebound at 5:37. Two minutes later Clements, on a pass from Ron Hurst, tied the score.

Halifax were one man short and Islanders had two in the penalty box when Good scored again, assisted by Hugh Campbell and Billy Watson.

Whitlock, parked near the crease, deadlocked the score again at 12:07 when he whipped Clements' pass into the net. Hayes was in the penalty box for elbowing at the time.

The third period — interrupted by a power failure — saw Islanders swarming inside the blueline in the early minutes but Halifax

gradually took over.

The winning goal was at 18:55 when Bob Hayes raced down the right wing, became trapped in the corner and passed out to Hayes, streaking goalward across the blueline unopposed. His shot from 20-feet out was successful.

NEW GLASGOW, Nov. 24 (CP) — Sydney Millionaires have been awarded the \$1,000 they claimed it cost them when Charlottetown Islanders failed to show up for a scheduled Maritime Major Hockey League game in Sydney.

The claim against Islanders will be lifted when the game is played. The League executive decided at a meeting here yesterday. Millionaires will set the date for the game.

The executive voted to continue the four games a week schedule during the Christmas season in lieu of dropping to three as previously planned. The decision will shorten the league schedule by one week.

Charlottetown was fined \$150 for failing to meet a date in Sydney.

The league went on record as being opposed to all travel and in future a club that files and fails to appear for a scheduled game will be fined \$1,000.

Picks Goal-Tending As Toughest Job In Sports

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 (AP) — What's the toughest job in sports? If you ask Chuck Rayner of New York Rangers, who has been at it for 12 years in the National Hockey League, it's goal-tending.

"If I had a boy," said the veteran who was once named the most valuable player in the game, "I'd never raise him to be a goalie. Any other position in hockey is great. The game has been good to me. But I've taken my share of bumps, and for that matter what goalie hasn't."

Rayner was in the opposite net at Madison Square Garden the other night when a sizzling drive crashed off the jaw of Detroit's Terry Sawchuk.

Sawchuk was stunned and bleeding when Rayner skated over to him.

"I know how you feel," Chuck said.

"Thanks," said Terry, "I'll be all right."

"We goalies gotta stick together," muttered Rayner.

From his television booth, as a hushed crowd watched Sawchuk stagger to his feet, Bud Palmer produced a small bottle showing 30-odd bone chips in an alcohol solution.

"Sawchuk let me borrow these chips," Palmer said. And before his audience could determine where the chips came from, Palmer added: "They're a memento of Sawchuk's elbow operation last summer."

Every year seems to be a rough year for goalies, and this one is starting out the same way.

Already Gerry McNeil of Montreal has had a broken cheekbone. He stopped a puck the wrong way. Rayner himself missed the greater part of the season with a severe charley horse.

But Sawchuk had the worst luck. The elbow operation was his third in as many summers. At 170 pounds, he is 15 pounds under his normal weight.

"Now it looks as if I might lose some front teeth," he rued. "I guess there's easier ways of making a living. But I still like this best."

Bowie's reputation as a long-shot player's paradise remained. In the seventh race, the three-year-old Towncastle not only got into the money for the first time in 10 races but won at the staggering odds of \$273.80 for \$2.
