LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FIRE.—The alarm about four o'clock yesterday afternoon was for a slight fire at the residence of Nathaniel DeCourcy, off Easton Street West.

AFRO SALE AND TEA.—The "Impromptu" Circle of King's Daughters intend (D. V.) holding an apron sale and tea, in aid of their work, in the P. E. Island Hospital, on Thursday, December 7th.

MISSIONARY MEETING.—Miss Hart, of Fort Simpson Home, B. C., will address the missionary meeting this evening in the Methodist Church basement. The work among the Indians is very interesting. Come and hear about it.

A CUT IN CITY.—The Montreal Transcript says: Mr. J. W. Oulton has a curiosity in his shop in an ordinary potato which lying in the cellar all this summer without rot sent out a vine eight feet long bearing twenty small potatoes about the size of grapes.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.—Quigley's Mills, about a mile and a half from St. Peter's Bay, were destroyed by fire last night. The mills comprised an excellent grist and saw mill in good order. We learn that the insurance will not amount to much. Mr. Quigley's loss is severe.

STEAMER SOLD.—The steamer St. Pierre, formerly of the Anglo-French company, has been sold for \$12,000, nominally to Sears, Son & Murray, Halifax. She will be run to the south coast of Newfoundland by several members of the old company, for whom, it is understood, the purchaser was acting.

THE WHEEL.—Both world's records for the mile on the bicycle were lowered at Hampden Park, Springfield, Mass., on Wednesday, Oct. 6. The record from a standing start is 2:25, beating his own record of 2:31. He also broke the three-quarter mile by 2-5 seconds, and the half by a second. Wandle's mile in 1:56 4-5 broke his record of 1:53 1-5.

A HEAVY LOSS.—We regret to learn that Mr. John McQuaid lost upwards of a hundred of the beautiful birds shown by him at the Provincial Exhibition. As he was returning from the exhibition, he placed them, for safe-keeping for a short time, in the station house at York. The person in charge of the building in a fire to make them comfortable, and left them, the cage being placed near the stove. The fire soon became too hot, and the heat radiating from the stove killed the birds in the upper part of the cage before relief came. The loss of the product so much care is severely felt by Mr. McQuaid; but he is thankful to have a number of his pets left.

HE STOLE FOR HIS MOTHER.—While Sanford Parker, a boy of eleven, was locked up for stealing to get food for his sick mother, on Friday, she was dying in their poor room, 2 Bartlett street, Brookhaven. She did not live to learn of his theft. The boy was arrested for stealing a brass brake handle from an electric car. He gave an excuse that his mother was sick and in want, and he was determined to help her. Officer Meyer went to the house to see if his story was true, and found Mrs. Parker sitting in the only chair in the house dead. When the neighbors heard of the matter they started a subscription to pay the funeral expenses. The boy was paroled yesterday in the care of one of the kind-hearted neighbors' car.—New York Press.

SNEAK-THIEF AT LARGE.—We are informed that some thief entered the granary of William F. Fraser, Linwood, Lot 21, one night this week and stole about twenty bushels of oats. Mr. Fraser will be obliged to the party if they will return the empty bag, as he does not wish to supply them with bags every year. THE CURLEW'S ENGINEERS.—Engineer Thors, late of the cruiser Curlew, is now on the new tug Spring Hill in charge of her engine. Mr. Malcolm Morris has been promoted to first engineer on the Curlew. POLICE COURT.—This morning Thomas Williamson, charged with obtaining money and goods under false pretences, failed to respond to a summons and a warrant for his arrest was ordered to issue. The complainant in the case is John Oiler, saloon keeper, Queen Street. He charges that Williamson entered his saloon on Wednesday and purchased a glass of ale, for which he gave in payment a \$1 Bank of Prince Edward Island bill, and received 95 cents in change. Oiler subsequently asked Williamson to redeem the note, and the latter refused to do so.

DISREPUTABLE DOINGS.—The Salem, Mass. News, of the 10th, contains an article concerning the doings in that city and Boston of a "highly" named William M. Dwyer, said to be formerly of Prince Edward Island. It appears that for a time Dwyer kept a broker's office in Salem. He wore good clothes, the best that Macdonald, the tailor, could make, and had other extravagant tastes. The gratifying of these tastes "came very high," and he soon found his creditors pressing him so hard that he packed his grip and stole silently away, leaving unpaid debts amounting to several hundred dollars behind him. A few days ago he was arrested in Boston on a charge of forging orders for whiskey. He had victimized nearly all the hotels and several liquor dealers.

THE SOUTHERN RACES.—A correspondent at Souris takes exception to the paragraph which appeared in THE EXAMINER a few days ago, concerning the recent races at that place. While admitting that the races results reported, the correspondent characterizes the report as "misleading." He says: "The day and track being poor, the race was called off. The horses entered in the 3-minute class started, or five of them, in a 2-minute race, which resulted as reported. There was no match race between Harry C. and Billie McKie. 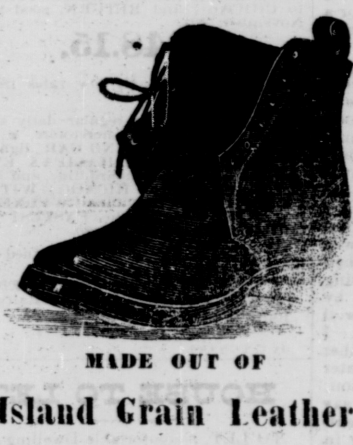

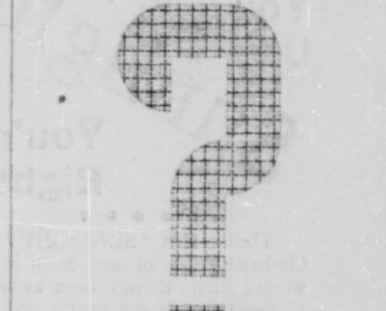
