#### Political Meeting at Wood Islands.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

Sir,—Pursuant to public notice a large  
and influential meeting of the electors of  
Wood Islands and vicinity was held in the  
Wood Islands Schoolhouse (west), on Wed-  
nesday evening, the 26th inst., for the pur-  
pose of nominating two candidates to re-  
present this District at the forthcoming  
election.

James A. McMillan, Esq., was elected  
Chairman, and the undersigned to act as  
Secretary. The Chairman, in opening the  
meeting, briefly stated that he had been  
requested by a large number of the leading  
electors of the District to call the meeting  
for the above mentioned purpose.

Mr. Crawford, our late representative,  
being present, addressed the meeting. He  
thanked the electors for their late sup-  
port; said a new election was again be-  
fore us, of which he was not aware until  
he saw the writs; he did all in his  
power to serve his constituents faithfully;  
he was again before them seeking their  
support, and if returned would serve them  
to the best of his ability as heretofore.  
He then showed the financial state of the  
Island, and also the amounts spent by the  
Government in public works.

Mr. Nicholson, another of our late re-  
presentatives, being present, next ad-  
dressed the meeting. He thanked the  
electors for their late support, and was  
again before them; if returned he would  
serve them as heretofore.

Mr. D. Taylor next addressed the meet-  
ing. He spoke at considerable length on  
the actions of the Davies and Sullivan  
Governments.

Duncan Munn, Esq., of Little Sands,  
was next called upon. He said he did  
not attend the meeting for the purpose  
of speaking; but would not like to refuse,  
and instantly sprang to his feet, and in  
his usual humorous style gave the present  
Government a severe castigation for several  
actions, and particularly the repeal of the  
Assessment Act, and starving the public  
works, and springing the election on the  
people at such an unpropitious season of  
the year, necessitating loss of time to the  
farmers, who are the bulk of the people of  
this Province. He could not approve of  
the Government's actions, and considered  
the School Act worse than ever.

Angus D. McMillan addressed the meet-  
ing. He asked the late members what  
amount was available for revenue purposes  
in 1879, and also at the present time,  
which the members could not do satisfac-  
torily; he found fault with the manner in  
which the present Government acted  
towards our public works in this district;  
also for the manner in which the election  
was forced upon the people at this busy  
season; said he would oppose the present  
Government to the utmost of his power.

Mr. William McKenzie spoke with con-  
siderable ability; said he would contra-  
dict Mr. Crawford's statements in saying  
that the present Government kept the ex-  
penditure within the revenue, as they had  
exceeded the revenue to a very great extent.  
Mr. Duncan Taylor then submitted the  
following resolution, seconded by Mr.  
William McKenzie, Selkirk Road:

That Whereas, The Dominion Government  
has not fulfilled the terms of Confederation,  
and has unjustly deprived this Island of its  
share of the Fishery Award.

Resolved, Therefore, That our Representa-  
tives make a demand on the Dominion Gov-  
ernment for our just share of the Fishery  
Award, together with the damages sustained  
by this Island on account of the non-  
fulfillment of said terms, and in not keep-  
ing continuous communication with the  
mainland, &c., and in the event of said de-  
mands not being acceded to by the Govern-  
ment of Canada, that the Government of  
Great Britain be appealed to for a cessation  
from the Government of Canada, and a resto-  
ration of our former constitution, together  
with the above mentioned demands and  
damages—which was carried unanimously.

Moved by Archibald Bell, of Wood  
Islands, and seconded by D. J. R. Mc-  
Millan, of the same place, that Angus  
McMillan be nominated to represent us at  
the forthcoming election, in the interest of  
the District.—Carried with two dissenting  
voices only.

Moved by Mr. Duncan Taylor, of Wood  
Islands, and seconded by Mr. John Mc-  
Rae, of Wood Islands Road, and supported  
by D. Munn, Esq., that D. C. Martin,  
Esq., of Charlottetown, be nominated as  
another candidate to run at the forth-  
coming election, in the interest of the  
Opposition.—Carried by a large majority.

Moved by Mr. George Young, of Wood  
Islands, seconded by Donald McMillan  
(miller), that James Nicholson, our late  
representative, be nominated to run the  
forthcoming election in the interest of the  
Government. On the motion the chair-  
man could not decide how the vote stood,  
as he considered it unnecessary to go to  
the confusion of dividing the House; but  
was under the impression that the nays  
would carry it.

Moved by Duncan Munn, Greg's Road,  
seconded by John Saunders, Belle Creek,  
that Duncan Crawford, Esq., be nominated  
to represent the District at the forth-  
coming election. On the motion being  
put to the meeting, the chairman could  
not decide between the yeas and nays.

After which, a motion was put and car-  
ried that the proceedings of the meeting be  
published in the Patriot and EXAMINER  
newspapers.

On motion, the chair was vacated, which  
was resumed by D. Munn, Esq., when a  
vote of thanks was cordially extended to  
the chairman for his able and impartial  
conduct in the chair.

#### Meeting at Eldon.

PURSUANT to notice, a meeting of the  
electors of the Belfast District was held at  
Eldon this afternoon, for the purpose of  
nominating candidates to represent the  
District in the House of Assembly.—  
About eighty electors present.—John Mur-  
chison in the chair.

Our late representatives being called  
upon, Mr. Nicholson first addressed the  
meeting, and in his usual honest and  
straightforward manner, clearly defined the  
policy of the present Government, which  
he ably defended.

Mr. Crawford next came forward, and  
gave an account of his stewardship, and  
forcibly defended the actions of the Gov-  
ernment, and challenged the Opposition to  
show where there was any mismanagement  
or extravagance of the public money of the  
Province.

Hon. R. Munn, the exponent of the  
Opposition, in a lengthy speech, failed to  
convince any one present that they better  
"Let his party inside"

Messrs. Malcolm McMillan, Jas Stewart  
and Charles McMillan addressed the meet-  
ing in favor of the Government.

The Government candidates were put in  
nomination.  
JAMES NICHOLSON, Esq., proposed by  
William Forbes, seconded by Alex. Dixon  
and Alex. McMillan, Esq.

DUNCAN CRAWFORD, Esq., proposed by  
Donald McLeod, seconded by Patrick  
O'Donnell, Esq.  
Both nominations carried unanimously.  
In the interest of the Opposition, Angus  
D. McMillan was proposed by Donald R.  
McDonald, and seconded by John S. Mc-  
Donald; and D. C. Martin, Charlottetown,  
by Hon. R. Munn, seconded by Angus  
McDonald.

Motions put to the meeting and lost.  
After the usual compliments the meeting  
quietly dispersed.

#### The English Budget.

Mr. Gladstone, in the House of Commons  
on the 24th ult., introduced the budget,  
and said the actual surplus of the revenue  
over the expenditures for the past year was  
£352,000. The condition of trade could  
not be considered unsatisfactory. He called  
attention to certain permanent increase  
of expenditure, such as increase of £450,-  
000 required for Irish riots, including those  
for police, resident magistrates and Land  
Court, and increase of £107,000 for charges  
on account of postal telegraphs, and  
another of £25,000 for reduction of debt.  
Mr. Gladstone regretted the growing popu-  
lar indifference in England to the increase  
of expenditure. The Americans had shown  
extraordinary vigor and fortitude in reduc-  
ing their debt and in bearing a heavy  
taxation for that purpose. He thought our  
modern history hardly creditable. The  
revenue for the coming year was estimated  
at £84,935,000, showing an estimated sur-  
plus of £305,000. Mr. Gladstone said the  
meagreness of this surplus was such that he  
had to abandon hope of a great financial  
re-adjustment. In connection with the  
County Government Bill and in order to  
fulfill promises in regard to the re-adjust-  
ment of the highway rate, he proposed to  
raise £250,000 more by a slight increase of  
carriage duty. This was the only novelty  
in the budget. He stated the national  
debt had been reduced by £7,169,000 dur-  
ing the year. Gladstone concluded by as-  
suring the House and the country he had  
concealed nothing. Sir Stafford Northcote  
said he would defer criticism on the budget  
speech of the right hon. gentleman.

Among others referred to in a recent  
issue of the Norristown (Pa.) Herald, were  
the following cases of special interest.  
They are their own commentary. Mr.  
Samuel C. Nyce, resides at 308 Marshall  
St., and holds the responsible position of  
journal clerk in the Pennsylvania Legis-  
lature, at Harrisburg. While Mr. Nyce  
and family were in the country recently,  
his boy, aged three years, fell and broke  
the limb. He recovered, but a very  
troublesome stiffness set in and he could  
scarcely use the leg. The injured limb

A very unpleasant account is given by a  
Brazilian paper of the proceedings of a huge  
water snake called the "securu" which is  
to be found in some of the rivers of Brazil.  
An accident occurred the other day on the  
banks of the Rio Arasuaçu, owing to the  
voracity of one of these reptiles. A slave,  
with some companions, was fishing with a  
net in the river, when he was suddenly  
seized by a securu, and in spite of his  
resistance was dragged under the water in  
the presence of the horrified spectators.  
He never appeared again, and no doubt is  
entertained that he was swallowed by the  
securu, who made an effort with his  
hinder coils to carry off at the same time  
another of the fishing party. It is the ex-  
ception for the securu to attack human  
beings; but it loses no opportunity of seiz-  
ing deer, calves, and other quadrupeds  
when they come to drink.

Despatches of the 26th ult., from Winni-  
peg say:—"The Red River is still rising  
and the water is higher than known for  
twenty years. Emerson is almost under  
water, and all the stores on Dominion street  
are flooded. Great floods also prevail at  
Brandon and Portage La Prairie. Winni-  
peg is threatened from the east side and  
part of Main street is three feet under  
water. At St. Vincent the water is so high  
that steamers sail right across the prairie  
to the railway station.
