**114th ANNIVERSARY OBSERVANCE BY VALLEYFIELD CONGREGATION**



The 114th anniversary of the Valleyfield United Church congregation will be observed on Sunday, August 8th with services at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. The guest preacher will be Rev. J. M. Sheen, B.A., Vernon Bridge. At the evening service the Orwell-Vernon choir will take the service of praise.

The Valleyfield congregation, one of the oldest in the Province, has a history of intense interest to many. The first settlers of Valleyfield were immigrants from the Highlands of Scotland. Immigrants from Scotland, most of them from Skye, settled in Lyndale in 1829. Bellevue in 1838, Valleyfield in 1840, Heatherdale in 1841. Other districts were settled later. Those fine Christian people held their own family worship.

Their first public worship was held in the home of William Martin in 1840. A log meeting house was built in 1845, later enlarged to accommodate the growing congregation. A new large church was built and opened for worship in 1855. The present church was built and opened for divine service on December 26th, 1909. Besides the service conducted in English, a service every Sunday was conducted in the Gaelic, the language so dear to the heart of the Highlander. After the close of the ministry of Rev. D. M. Sinclair, in 1936, Gaelic services were held only on stated occasions. The Long Communion—still observed in this historic congregation—was a great occasion, for people gathered from near and far, so that at each service from Thursday morning until Monday noon, the large school and the tent erected for this occasion, were filled with devout, reverent worshippers.

Following is a list of the ministers who served Valleyfield congregation:

Rev. Alexander MacIntyre, 1845-1850; Rev. Alexander Munro, 1851-1884; Rev. Roderick MacLean, 1885-1906; Rev. Alexander S. Stewart, 1907-1914; Rev. John M. MacLeod, 1915-1919; Rev. J. A. MacLellan, 1920-1928; Rev. D. MacLean Sinclair, 1928-1936; Rev. Arthur Ebbutt, 1936-1941; Rev. J. Milton Fraser, 1941-1944; Rev. A. D. Stirling, 1944-1947; Rev. E. C. Evan (supply), 1947-1948; Rev. A. C. Fraser, 1948 is the present pastor.

The congregation has made a worthy contribution to the world in sending forth young men and women who served faithfully and with marked ability in their generations—ministers, doctors, nurses, lawyers, educationalists, in the political field, the business world and all various callings of life. During the first World War forty-two men and women answered the call of their country and the second war, forty-four. Twelve made the supreme sacrifice.

"During the past," states Rev. Mr. Fraser, "there has been a decrease in the number of families connected with the congregation, for farmers closed out and sought employment—mostly in Central Canada—a loss to the church and the schools. At the present time we hear good news, that many of our young men who are away, wish to return to their Province to live among the friends and companions of their youthful days. Every encouragement and help should be given these excellent young people, so that they may be able to establish themselves in our fine Province—the Garden of the Gulf."

**May Produce Tree To Flourish In Barren North**

MONTREAL (CP)—J. A. Breton, manager of the Quebec Forestry Association and executive secretary of the 4-H Club movement in Quebec, says Canada may some day produce a tree that will thrive in the barren north.

The conservation of forests is a that will not be solved for "at least another 25 years," Mr. Breton said in an interview Thursday.

Fire, exploitation and other factors are depleting the nation's forest wealth twice as fast as it is being replaced, he said. But "we can look forward to tree genetics which will enable us to grow trees in many areas of the country where they do not grow now."

Mr. Breton, who had visited the Scandinavian countries last year, said that Norway, Finland and Sweden have solved their conservation problem and are "some 50 years ahead of us."

"One has to have special permission from the government there to cut a tree on one's own land, where only 20 per cent of the timber limits are government owned," he said.

**Moncton To Try Ice Free Chemical**

MONTGTON (CP) — Moncton will be the first city in Canada to experiment with a new chemical treatment designed to give ice-free roads.

Officials of Ice-Free Roads, Ltd., announced Wednesday night that they would give the city 100 gallons of the chemical to experiment with. The company says when the chemical is mixed with road asphalt it will dissolve snow in a matter of hours.

Several areas in Canada are experimenting with the mixture but until now, the chemical had always been used on open county roads. Moncton will be the first city to try it on curbed streets.

**Uranium Mines Report Profits**

TORONTO, (CP) — Rix-Athabaska Uranium Mines Limited, with properties in the Lake Athabaska region of Saskatchewan, reports operating profit for its first quarter-year of operation of \$104,594.

The company statement says its report, authorized by the security board, is the first post-war report of uranium production from a privately-owned mine. Tonnage of ore produced was not disclosed.

The profit picture should be encouraging, the statement says, to all those going into uranium production "since it reveals the Eldorado yardstick of payment to be sufficiently generous to allow substantial profit."

The 400-room hotel was one of several owned by the Schine Hotel Corp., whose president is P. G. David Schine, central figure in the recent McCarthy-army hearing. Sheraton owns 19 hotels in the United States and six in Canada.

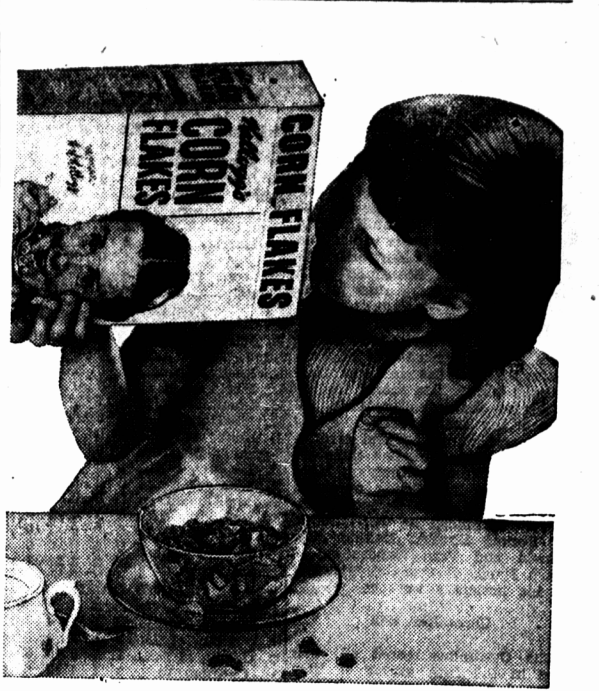

**Jap Fishermen Pass Critical Stage**  
TOKYO, (AP)—Japanese doctors say the critical stage has passed for 25 Japanese fishermen showed by radio-active ash after a Bikini hydrogen bomb blast last March.

The doctors picked the eve of the anniversary of the dropping of the atom bomb on Hiroshima to let reporters interview and photograph the fishermen. They had blocked previous attempts to interview the fishermen.

Dr. Kazuo Miyoshi, spokesman for the doctors, said: "Many of the patients still lack white blood cells and bone marrow cells and suffer from continuous slight fever."
