Local Staff Re-Organizing With NES Dept. Transfer

With the transfer of the National Employment Service to the department of labor to take place April 1, officials of the local national employment office are busily engaged in re-organizing staff, premises and equipment.

George W. Cheverie, local office manager, said yesterday that permanent structural changes will not be made to the office for some time, but that temporary changes will be made at once. These involve changing the office layout to place National Employment Service staff in the Richmond Street side of the office, with Unemployment Insurance Commission staff to occupy that part of the office now used by NES.

All NES personnel, including placement officers, special services officers, supervisory and clerical staff now employed in the employment function, will be transferred to the department of labor. Mr. Cheverie stated, while all the staff engaged in the insurance function will remain with UIC. These will include the local office insurance branch staff, enforcement and audit staff.

The temporary division of the local office will be carried out in such a way as to clearly separate the two functions, and to provide for autonomous administration of NES and UIC, Mr. Cheverie said. Eventually two separate telephone systems will be set up, but, for the interim period, the

present system will be operated by NES, with connections to UIC, using the phone numbers now listed in the directory. Mr. Cheverie said that the change over has already begun, and will be continued quietly, without disruption of present services by NES and UIC.

Canada's Constitution Agreement Supported

The action of Canadian premiers in agreeing to amendments to the Canadian Constitution received unanimous approval in the Prince Edward Island Legislature yesterday morning.

The resolution, "Be it resolved that this Legislative Assembly approve the enactment by the Parliament of the United Kingdom of an act to provide for the amendment in Canada was passed without a dissenting voice.

M. Alban Farmer, attorney-general, outlined the proposed formula. Mr. Farmer indicated it was the best arrangement that had been proposed to date. Although far from perfect, he indicated it was an excellent basis from which further amendments can be developed.

A. W. Matheson (Lib - 4th Kings) readily endorsed the resolution and felt that there was nothing in it which could possibly harm Prince Edward Island.

He was delighted that the Canadian premiers had reached agreement on the matter.

However, the former leader of the opposition felt that although opting out principles had nothing to do with the resolution, the province would encounter difficulties along this line. Attorney-General Farmer also viewed the opting out procedure with apprehension.

First reading was given to several bills at the morning session. Included in the list were: An act to establish a P.E.I. water authority, an act to amend the School Act, and The Roads Act, 1965.

Later the house went into committee on act to incorporate The Mutual Trust Company. Promoter was A. W. Matheson.

Police Training Course Is Set

Supt. A.S. McNeil, commanding officer "L" Division RCMP, has announced the dates for the Prince Edward Island Municipal Police Training Course. The course will run from April 20 until April 23 and will be comprised of lectures and demonstrations.

The course will be conducted by members of "L" division and the agenda has been prepared under the sanction of the Attorney-General of P.E.I.

The three-day training school will feature lectures in first aid, criminal law, the liquor control act, civil defense, accident investigation, the new traffic act and the care and handling of prisoners.

Besides the lectures, RCMP officers will conduct clinics on the firing range and numerous practical demonstrations.

The lecturers for the course include S.M. H.G.E. Chipman, Supt. A.S. McNeil, Cpl. R. MacKenzie, Cst. J.W. Coase, Cpl. C. A. Bungay, Sgt. E. Tedford, Cst. C. Clark, Cpl. R. Williams, Cst. S. Tibbo, Chief Sterns Webster, James B. Johnston, QC, and A. James Haslam, QC.

Island Potato Marketing Board Staff Changes

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae announced changes in the personnel of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board following the current crop year. The information was learned yesterday morning and the changes will take place when a new board is named to take charge of the organization.

The new board will be named after April 21, though the present board will continue to operate until the present crop year is completed.

The board will comprise three producers, apparently producer dealers, which will be named by the P.E.I. potato dealers association; and six producers named by the potato growers in each of the three counties. Producers from each county will name two men to the new board, the minister revealed.

Each board member will be subject to the re-election each year, and no member shall serve for longer than three years in a row, the minister explained.

MLA Critical Farm Engineer Not Available

During consideration by the Legislature of department of agriculture estimates for the 1965-66 year, Harold Smith (L-4th Kings) was critical of the fact that the department does not employ a full-time agricultural engineer.

He said "with the score of new and denovated piggeries built in the province during the past few years, farmers found difficulty in getting advice on such things as insulation, ventilation and costs of erection. Farmers need the services of a fully qualified agricultural engineer."

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae pointed out that the agricultural representative for Prince County is a qualified engineer and his services are available to all parts of the province.

Registration Delay Brings Fine of \$50

A fine of \$50 and costs was handed out to James Russell Gunn when he pleaded guilty to not registering a motor vehicle within 10 days after it was brought into the province.

Two other people were charged with speeding in Queens County traffic court yesterday morning. James Alex Ferguson, Victoria, and Joseph Leon Gaudet, New Haven, were each fined \$10 and costs.

Bill Approved To Incorporate Mutual Trust Co.

Approval in principle was given in the Legislature yesterday to a bill to incorporate Mutual Trust Company, an island company that will have authorized capital stock of \$1,000,000.

The bill was promoted by A.W. Matheson (L-4th Kings) who will be a member of the incorporated group. Other members will be Frederic A. Large, Charlottetown, and W. Chester S. MacDonald, Summerside.

The authorized capital stock of the company shall be \$1,000,000, divided into 100,000 shares of a par value of \$10 each.

The affairs of the company are to be managed by a board of directors, the number of whom shall be determined by the shareholders. Mr. Matheson, Mr. Large and Mr. MacDonald are to be the first directors of the company until replaced by others duly appointed in their stead.

Uttering Charge Brings 2-Year Suspension

Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, handed down a two-year suspended sentence to Robert Vernon Barlow, Summerside, for uttering forged documents, after the accused pleaded guilty to the charge in city police court yesterday morning.

The accused was required to post a bond in the amount of \$2,000 made up of two sureties of \$1,000 each and ordered to pay the M.F. Schurman Co. Ltd. the sum of \$1,177.68 by March 8, 1965.

Stanley Webster, Cardigan, charged with drunken driving pleaded guilty to the lesser charge of impaired driving and was fined \$125 and costs or 30 days.

Louis Carl Moore, Winsloe, also appeared on a charge of drunken driving. He pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned until March 26.
