ARREARS OF PAY, BOUNTY, ETC.

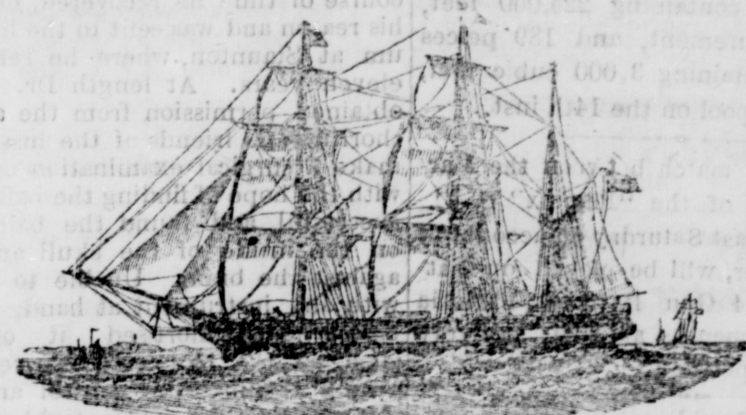

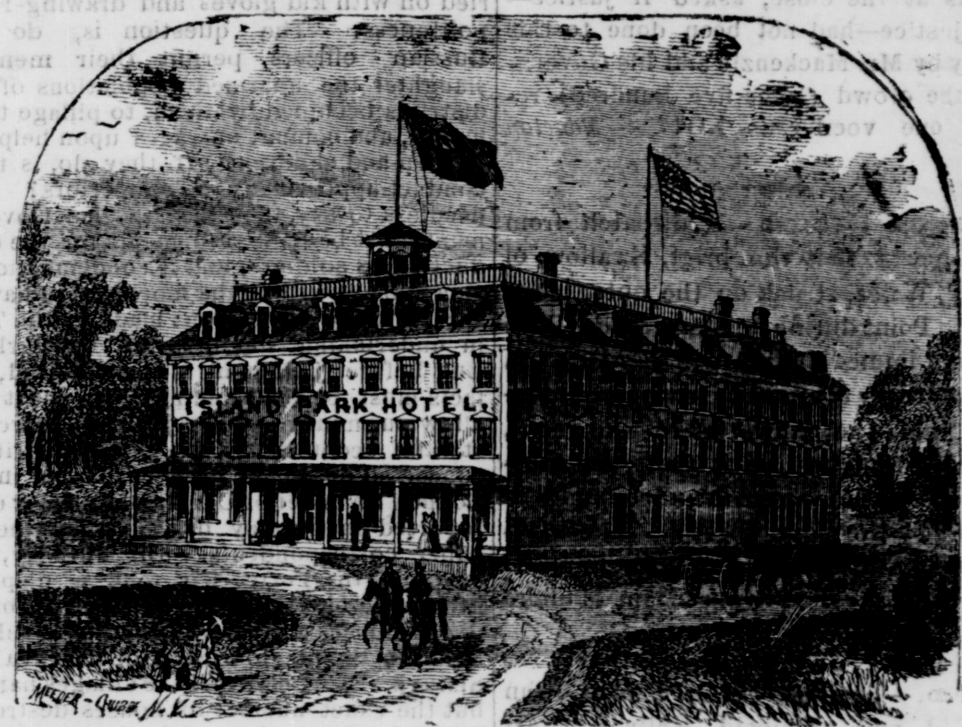
