

Islanders In 5-4 Overtime Victory Over Millionaires

SYDNEY, Jan. 6 — (CP) — Hub Beaudry's overtime marker at 6:41 of the sudden death extra session gave Charlottetown Islanders a 5-4 decision over Sydney Millionaires in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here tonight.

The Charlottetown win pushed their second place margin over the Moneybags to six points. This was the third overtime game in the last four starts for Sydney, and they got an even break, a win, a draw and a loss.

Charlottetown had things much their own way for two periods. Suddenly in the third the Sydney power struck.

Eddie Marineau, Bill McDonald and Loene Pirie scored. It was the second of the night for Pirie.

Charlottetown jumped the gun in the first period and built up a three-goal lead with Beaudry opening. Before the period closed Buck Whitlock and Walt Pawlshyn also scored.

Islanders extended their lead with the only goal of the middle canto. Ronnie Hurst drawing the light early.

Islanders kept the pressure on most of the time in the third, and had several good chances early in the overtime. Sydney then took over, but when Coach Johnny Horrocks brought on the Robertson-McDonagh-Rowe line, they no longer hit the ice when Beaudry uncovered in front of the net, blasted a puck past Nick Pidsodny that the Sydney cage cop never saw.

IN THIS CORNER

Hub Beaudry, who has always been noted as the Islanders' ace penalty killer, stole the offensive spotlight last night in Sydney. The hard-working centre came through with the big goal in overtime to give the Islanders a 5-4 victory. The goal was the second of the night for Beaudry. A glance over the M.M.H.L. point scoring parades shows that Hub has been doing very well for himself this season. He is twelfth man from the top in the league and fourth high scorer in the Islanders team. In the last three games he has picked up five points out of a possible thirteen which is a pretty fair percentage. Better, we venture to say than his batting average with the Garson Greyhounds last summer although he claims he led his team in R.B.I.'s.

There are eight days remaining in which clubs in the M. M. H. L. may add to their rosters and it seems that practically every club in the circuit will bring in some new faces. The Islanders are dealing for at least another player and have clearance by the M. A. H. A. and C. A. H. A. to do so. Islanders President Dr. F. C. Dougan stated last night he had a C. A. H. A. wire to the effect that the club had not used up its quota of cards. Walter Lawlor, President of the M.A.H.A. said that the Islanders were in the clear to go ahead and deal for at least two more players.

Tom Rokey, who was supposed to join the Sydney Millionaires, is reported to be playing hockey with the New Haven Ramblers in the Eastern Amateur League. Both Johnny Horrocks of Sydney and Morrey Hamilton of the Monctou Hawks were negotiating for the fast-kating defenceman. Last week Moncton officials attempted to get in touch with Rokey and found from his relatives that he was down in New Haven, Sydney especially ar keen to get his services as he would relieve either Dunc MacIntyre or Eddy Marineau for forward duties.

Carl and Tom Smelle, who starred with the Saint John Beavers last year, are big favorites around the Quebec League. The Smelle Twins are playing with Valleyfield Braves and every time the Braves play in Montreal Carl and Tom come in for headlines. Last Saturday Lloyd McGowan in the Montreal Star had this to say about them. "The itinerant Smelle Brothers Carl and Tom are playing their first season for the Valleyfield club under Toe Blake. Toe insists that he still can't tell them apart. They are twins of course, rather stocky with jet-black hair. Carl plays on defense, Tom is a left wing. They are very hard workers and they earn their pay." That was Toe's tribute.

McGowan goes on to say how well the Smelle's play in the rough going and of the part they played in defeating the Ottawa Senators last week. He quotes Toe Blake as saying about his Braves. "We have a touch team now. Vitale is the biggest man in the league although possibly not as tall as Beliveau. Our team can take it and give it. Aldo Guidolin who belongs to the Rangers is one of the roukiest forwards in the loop." Guidolin was elated for the Islanders at one time this season. He started the season with Vancouver Canucks.

There is no hard feeling between Mill Schmidt of the Boston Bruins and Teeter Kennedy of the Maple Leafs following last week's brawl in the Boston Gardens during which Kennedy was seriously injured. As soon as Kennedy could talk following his brain concussion he stated "It was not bear any grudge. I certainly don't bear any grudge. I am amity towards Schmidt." The great Boston play-maker had this to say about the incident "I had to get out from the headlock, twisted and grabbed him, and we fell to the ice with me on top. His head hit the ice and he went limp. I got an awful scare, because the white of his eyes was showing. I lifted his head and called for a doctor. As a result of the accident Kennedy is to be out of action for the remainder of the season.

The Islanders, by virtue of their win last night have stretched their unbeaten streak to six games. They do not play again until Friday night when they are at home to the Glace Bay Miners. In contrast to the Islanders the Sydney Millionaires won but two of their last ten games. In that time Johnny Horrocks' charges have lost seven and tied one of all which accounts for the Islanders healthy hold on second place.

Forecasts Shake-Up In Quebec Junior A Hockey League

TORONTO, Jan. 6 — (CP) — The Globe and Mail says today the Quebec Junior A Hockey League may be in for a severe shake-up at the end of this season.

In a sports page story from Montreal, the newspaper quotes Frank Selke, managing director of the Montreal Canadiens, who is sponsor two of the four clubs in Quebec, as saying the shake-up is under "serious consideration."

Such a move would mean dissolving the present group in favor of a "house" league with two Montreal teams and new A teams from Verdun, St. Laurent and LaSalle. If the Rivers wanted to come in it would be welcome, Selke says.

The newspaper says the Canadian organization is pleased with the effect generally of the interlocking schedule between Quebec and Quebec Citadelles "but is dissatisfied with the junior picture in the province."

The dispatch says the dissatisfaction arises from the Montreal rivalry with Frank Burne and Quebec Citadelles "who are making nothing but money out of junior hockey."

"I don't see why we should continue operation just to fill the Quebec Arena," Selke says. "We're probably the only ones who haven't reaped any benefit from the interlocking schedule although I still think it's a fine thing."

The dispatch adds that junior hockey in Montreal is not drawing well. A big reason is that major hockey is booming.

Try Mediation In New York Bus Strike

NEW YORK, Jan. 6 — (AP) — The Transport Workers Union (TWU) ended a boycott of City Hall today to mediate for the first time a six-day strike of private bus lines. No immediate progress was reported.

"We'll negotiate around the clock, if need be," strike leader Matthew Guinan told 2,500 cheering strikers who picketed city hall during the opening two-hour mediation meeting.

Meanwhile, the TWU strike against eight big private bus lines in Manhattan, the Bronx and Queens fizzled for the second day in a row—at least as far as its city-wide effect was concerned.

As they did yesterday on the first full work day after the New Year's holiday, the city's high-speed subways took up the slack of 2,500,000 persons a day displaced from the buses. There was some overcrowding but not much more than usual during New York's fabulous underground rush hours.
